

“ III. And also all that contiguous portion of the said New Parish of Saint Mark, Kemp Town, which is bounded upon the east by the above described portion of the said Parish of Ovingdean, and upon the remaining sides, that is to say, upon the south-west and upon the north, by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said Parish of Ovingdean from the said New Parish of Saint Mark, Kemp Town, at the junction of Whitehawk Road with Whitehawk Crescent, and extending thence north-westward along the middle of Whitehawk Crescent for a distance of 2½ chains or thereabouts to its junction with Hervey Road opposite to the south-eastern end of the wall or fence forming the south-western boundary of the house and premises known as Number 1 Hervey Road, and extending thence north-westward to and along such wall or fence and then first north-westward, then northward and then again north-westward along the wall or fence forming the western boundary of the houses and premises situate on the western side of Hervey Road, for a distance in all of 24½ chains or thereabouts to the point where it reaches the southern side of the footpath leading from Whitehawk Crescent to Whitehawk Road, and extending thence first north-westward to and then first northward and then in various directions along the middle of the said footpath for a distance in all of 6 chains or thereabouts to a point opposite to the southern end of the wall or fence forming the western boundary of the houses and premises situate on the western side of Whitehawk Road, and extending thence north-westward to and along such wall or fence for a distance of 17 chains or thereabouts to the point where it reaches the southern side of the footpath leading towards White Hawk Camp, and extending thence first northwards to and then eastward along the middle of the said footpath for a distance of 2 chains or thereabouts to the point where it reaches the western side of Whitehawk Road, upon the boundary which divides the said New Parish of Saint Mark, Kemp Town, from the said Parish of Ovingdean.”

And whereas drafts of the said Scheme have, in accordance with the provisions of the secondly hereinbefore mentioned Act, been transmitted to the Patrons and to the Incumbents of the Cures out of which it is intended that the District recommended in such Scheme to be constituted shall be taken, and such Patrons and Incumbents have respectively signified their assent to such Scheme:

And whereas the said Scheme has been approved by His Majesty in Council:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said Scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts.

And His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said Diocese of Chichester.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Ecclesiastical Commissioners (Powers) Measure, 1936, duly prepared, and laid before His Majesty in Council, a Scheme bearing date the 14th day of January, 1937, in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

“ We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, acting in pursuance of the Ecclesiastical Commissioners (Powers) Measure, 1936, have prepared, and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council, the following Scheme relating to the re-endowment of the Bishopric of Bradford:

“ Whereas the investments and property which are particularly described in the Schedule hereunder written are now held by us, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, as the Endowment Fund of the said Bishopric of Bradford:

“ And whereas no part of the said investments and property is specifically allotted to the provision or maintenance of an episcopal residence for the Diocese of Bradford:

“ And whereas it appears to us to be expedient that the said investments and property should be transferred to us and that in exchange for such transfer we should pay out of the Common Fund created by the Act of the 3rd and 4th years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, Chapter 113, a fixed annual income for the said Bishopric as a re-endowment thereof:

“ And whereas the Right Honourable Stanley Baldwin, First Lord of Your Majesty's Treasury, acting on behalf of Your Majesty, and the Right Reverend Alfred, Bishop of Bradford, have respectively signified their consents to the exercise in relation to the said Bishopric of Bradford of the power conferred upon us by Section 2 of the said Measure:

“ And whereas the Bradford Diocesan Board of Finance, the Cathedral Commissioners for England and the Cathedral Council of the Cathedral Church of Bradford have respectively signified their approval of the submission of the said Scheme to Your Majesty in Council:

“ Now, therefore, we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, humbly recommend and propose that, upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this Scheme and without any conveyance or assurance in the law other than such duly gazetted Order, the investments and property described in the said Schedule shall be transferred to us, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, freed and discharged from all or any trusts previously affecting the same to be held by us for the benefit of our Common Fund and that in exchange for such transfer we be authorised to pay out of the said Common Fund by equal quarterly payments on the 1st day of February, the 1st day of May, the 1st day of August and the 1st day of November in every year a fixed annual sum of £2,767 to the said Alfred, Bishop of Bradford, and to his successors in the same Bishopric, as a re-endowment of the said Bishopric, the first of such
