"And whereas the said James Falconer Durrant died on the 30th day of October, 1931:

"And whereas Emily Gwendoline Durrant, widow of the said James Falconer Durrant and executrix of the said Will did on the 9th day of February, 1932, signify her assent to the said devise:

"And whereas it is desired that anything which by way of further assurance or otherwise may be required effectually to complete the said devise may be done and application has been made to us, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, that a Scheme under the Acts hereinbefore mentioned may be prepared for the said purpose and submitted to Your Majesty in Council:

"And whereas the said Emily Gwendoline Durrant, now Emily Gwendoline Nunns, wife of Robert Denys Nunns, of the Old School House, Dedham, in the County of Essex, Esquire, and the Right Reverend Walter Godfrey, Bishop of Saint Edmundsbury and Ipswich, are consenting to this Scheme, the Bishop of Saint Godfrey, said Walter Edmundsbury and Ipswich, in token of his willingness to accept the transfer of the patronage of the said Benefice of Freston which is hereinbefore mentioned and hereinafter recommended and proposed and also in token that the same transfer has that consent of the Bishop of the Diocese which by the hereinbefore mentioned Acts or by some or one of them is made necessary:

"And whereas such transfer will in our opinion tend to make better provision for the Cure of Souls in the Parish or District in or in respect of which the right of Patronage or Advowson so recommended and proposed to be transferred as aforesaid arises or exists, that is to say, in the Parish of Freston:

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the said Emily Gwendoline Nunns (in testimony whereof she has signed and sealed this Scheme) and with the consent of the said Walter Godfrey, Bishop of Saint Edmundsbury and Ipswich (in testimony whereof he has signed this Scheme and sealed the same with his Episcopal Seal), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, humbly recommend and propose that upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this Scheme and without any conveyance or assurance in the law other than such duly gazetted Order the whole Advowson or perpetual right of Patronage of and presentation to the said Benefice of Freston, shall be transferred to the said Walter Godfrey, Bishop of Saint Edmunds-bury and Ipswich, and his successors in the same Bishopric, and shall thereupon and thenceforth become and be absolutely vested in and shall and may from time to time be exercised by the said Walter Godfrey, Bishop of Saint Edmundsbury and Ipswich, and by his successors in the same Bishopric for ever.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any further or other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts or of any of them or of any other Act of Parliament."

And whereas the said Scheme has been approved by His Majesty in Council:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said Scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts.

And His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said Diocese of Saint Edmundsbury and Ipswich.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the 3rd and 4th years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, Chapter 113, of the Act of the 6th and 7th years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter 37, and of the Act of the 19th and 20th years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter 104, duly prepared, and laid before His Majesty in Council, a Scheme, bearing date the 18th day of March, 1937, in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the 3rd and 4th years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, Chapter 113, of the Act of the 6th and 7th years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter 37, and of the Act of the 19th and 20th years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter 104, have prepared, and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council, the following Scheme for constituting a separate District for spiritual purposes to be taken partly out of the Parish of Stratford sub Castle and partly out of the New Parish (sometime District Chapelry) of Saint Mark, Salisbury, both in the County of Wilts and in the Diocese of Salisbury:

"Whereas we are satisfied that the said Parish of Stratford sub Castle and the said New Parish of Saint Mark, Salisbury, are Cures wherein or in parts whereof the provision for public worship and for pastoral superintendence is insufficient for the spiritual wants of the inhabitants thereof and it has been made to appear to us that it would promote the interests of religion that the particular portions of the said Parish of Stratford sub Castle and of the said New Parish of Saint Mark, Salisbury, which are hereinafter mentioned and described, should be constituted a separate District in the manner which is hereinafter set forth:

"And whereas there is not at present within the limits of the said proposed separate District any consecrated Church or Chapel in use for the purposes of Divine Worship:

"And whereas by Instruments published in the London Gazette on the 28th day of October, 1932, the 30th day of October, 1934, the 29th day of October, 1935, and the 30th day of
