the southern boundary of the house and premises known as Number 63, Castle Road, and extending thence first eastward to and along the said wall or fence and then northeastward along the wall or fence forming the eastern boundary of the same premises for a distance in all of 6 chains or thereabouts to the point where it meets the wall or fence forming the southern boundary of the Salisbury Bowling Green, and extending thence first eastward and then northward along the walls or fences forming the southern and eastern boundaries of the said Bowling Green for a distance of 2½ chains or thereabouts to the point where the last-mentioned wall or fence reaches the western side of Devonshire Road, and extending thence northward along the western side of Devonshire Road, the western side of Cornwall Road and the wall or fence forming the western boundary of the house and premises known as 'St. Giles,' Cornwall Road, for a distance in all of 61 chains or thereabouts to the point where the last-mentioned wall or fence meets the wall or fence forming the northern boundary of the houses and premises situate on the northern side of Cornwall Road, and extending thence north-eastward along the lastmentioned wall or fence for a distance of 122 chains or thereabouts to the point where it meets the fence forming the north-western boundary of the close numbered 13 upon the Ordnance Survey Map of the Civil Parish of New Sarum published in the year 1925 on the scale of 25 inches to a mile and also upon the map or plan annexed to this Scheme, and extending thence north-eastward along the last-mentioned fence and along the fence forming the north-western boundary of the close numbered 193 upon the Ordnance Survey Map of the Civil Parish of Laverstock and Ford published in the year 1926 on the scale of 25 inches to a mile and also upon the said map or plan annexed to this Scheme for a distance in all of 26 chains or thereabouts to the point where the last-mentioned fence reaches the western side of the road called Bishopdown, and extending thence first eastward to and then first northward and then north-westward along the middle of Bishopdown for a distance of 41½ chains or thereabouts to the point where it is crossed by which divides the said New the boundary Parish of Saint Mark, Salisbury, from the said Parish of Stratford sub Castle, and extending thence first north-eastward and then northwestward along such boundary for a distance of II2 chains or thereabouts to the point where it diverges north-eastward from following the northern side of Bishopdown, and continuing thence north-westward along the northern side of Bishopdown for a distance of 5 chains or thereabouts to its junction with Castle Road, and extending thence first westward to and then south-westward along the boundary which divides the said Parish of Stratford sub Castle from the Extra Parochial Place called or known as Old Sarum, in the said County and Diocese (thereby following in part the middle of Castle Road) for a distance of 181 chains or thereabouts to the point where it crosses the middle of the road called Portway, and extending thence south-westward along the middle of Portway for a distance of 36 chains or thereabouts to a point opposite to the north-eastern end of the fence forming the south-eastern boundary of the close numbered 172 upon the Ordnance Survey Map of the Civil Parish of

Stratford sub Castle published in the year 1926 on the scale of 25 inches to a mile, and also upon the said map or plan annexed to this Scheme, and extending thence first south-westward to and along such fence and then northwestward along the fence forming the south-western boundary of the same close for a distance in all of 10% chains or thereabouts to the point where the last-mentioned fence reaches the eastern bank of the eastern branch of the River Avon, and extending thence first-west-ward to and then south-westward along such branch of the River Avon for a distance of 5 chains or thereabouts to its junction with the main stream upon the boundary which divides the said Parish of Stratford sub Castle from the said Parish of Fugglestone Saint Peter with Bemerton."

And whereas drafts of the said Scheme have, in accordance with the provisions of the secondly hereinbefore mentioned Act, been transmitted to the Patrons and to the Incumbents of the Parish of Stratford sub Castle and of the New Parish of Saint Mark, Salisbury, out of which it is intended that the District recommended in such Scheme to be constituted shall be taken, and such Patrons and Incumbents have respectively signified their assent to such Scheme:

And whereas the said Scheme has been approved by His Majesty in Council:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said Scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts.

And His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said Diocese of Salisbury.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Union of Benefices Measure, 1923, duly prepared, and laid before His Majesty in Council, a Scheme bearing date the 28th day of January, 1937, in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, acting in pursuance of the Union of Benefices Measures, 1923 to 1936, have prepared, and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council, the following Scheme for effecting the union of the Benefice (being a Vicarage) of Leeds, Christ Church, and the Benefice (being an United Benefice) of Leeds, Saint John the Evangelist with Saint Barnabas, both of which Benefices are situate in the County of York and in the Diocese of Ripon:
