Cadiz, Octob. 5. N. S.

HE Count d'Estrees, with 13 Men of War, sailed from hence the 2d Instant for Thoulon. The Sieur de Coetlogon, who commands another Squadron of French Men of War, at present in this Port, intends to fail likewife as foon as two of his Ships are arrived, that are gone to Sallée to fetch the Amballador the Emperor of Morocco is fending to France. Yesterday came in here the Nathaniel and Robert, Captain John Smith Commander, in 13 days from the Downes, bound for Turky. The Centurion Man of War, Captain Price Commander, sailed from hence this day to cruize. The Ships which arrived here the 20th of the last Month from the West-Indies, are unlading; it's said, they will be worth to the King above 300000 Dollars in Cu-floms. Vice-Admiral Aylmer, with the Squadron of Men of War under his Command, is hourly expected here, some Merchant-men being arrived which came from England in Company with him.

Madrid, Octob. 15. The King of Spain's Health

Madrid, Octob. 15. The King of Spain's Health is very much mended, and he recovers Strength every day. He has ordered the Almirant of Caffille a confiderable Sum of Money, as well to pay the Arrears due to the Two Squadrons of Horse-Guards, and to a Regiment of Foot that is fent for from Catalonia, as to raise Two new Regiments; all which he is to Command in Chief, Independent of any other General Officer. The Count de Harrach, Ambissador from the Emperour, made his Publick Entry the 8th Instant; and the next day the old Count de Harrach, who before resided here with the same Character, began his Journey to Vienna. They write from Malaga of the 7th Instant, that the Count d'Estrees with 13 Men of War under his Command, put into that Port the 4th Instant, and the 6th sailed from thence for Theulen.

Danzick, Offab. 17. On the 14th of this Month, very early in the morning. General Brandt, with a Body or livile of the Elector of Brandenburgh's Forces, came into the Neighbourhood of the Town of Elbing. (figure in that part of Pruffia which is under the Protection of the Crown of Poland,) with an intention to put forme Troops into the Place at the opening of the Gates, of which the Migistrates having notice, they ordered the Gates to be kept flut, and put the Burghers on their Guard. The Elector returned them an Answer, in which he tells them, That he had received their Letter, defiring he would dely the putting himself in possession of his Mortgage, and offering toendeavour themselves to fari-sie him. That as to the first, the Justice of his Proceedings was sufficiently known to them, as well as the Treity, by virtue of which he acted, that after so long and fruitelss Expectation of having Right done him, he found himself obliged to make use of these Means to procure it himself, to avoid the Brame of having neglected the Interest of his Dominions; That it lay in their Power to have Satisfaction given him without any Prejudice to their City, by admitting his Troops into Garison; And he assumed them, that he will maintain them in all their Rights and Privileges, and preserve and coun enance their Trade, and withdraw his Troops so soon as the said Money is paid him; Upon all which he defired to know their Resolution, and that in the mean while he had given Orders to his General to sorbear all Acts of Hottility; And as to their Offers of giving him Satisfaction, that he looks upon them but as an Artisice they make use of to gain time. What the Magistrates may have resolved thereupon, we are yet to learn. The Elector has likewise writ Letters to the King and Republish of Poland concerning this Afriair; and in the mean time we hear, more of his Forces with a Train of Artillery are marching to reinforce General Brandt.

Vienna, Octob 23. The Pope's Nuncio had yesterday a long Audience of his Imperial Majesty, touching the Difference between this Court and the Court of Rome, with relation to the Imperial Fiefs in the Ecclesiastical State, which Affair is not yet adjusted. The Bishop of Rach is shortly expected here from Poland. Our last Letters from Hungary give an Account, that Prince Eugene of Savoy having fent General Truchfes with a Detachment of 5 Regiments of Horse, (which were to be joined by 5 others that lay on the Borders of Transilvania) to Upper-Hungary, to cover that Frontier from the Enemies Excursions; He had repass. fed the Thay so near sablia, and having divided his Army in two Bodies, was marched himself with all the Horse and some Regiments of Foot towards Segedin, to encamp near that place; and Count Guido of Staremberg, with the rest of the German Forces, was gone to do the like near Peter-Waradin. The Turks continue near B lgrade, but it's believed they will likewife very quickly feparate their Forces, and that the Campagne will end without having produced any Action of Moment, each Party being now more intent upon negotiating a Peace which may secure their present Possessions, then continuing a hazardous and Expentive War. In the mean time all Things are in a very favourable Disposition for carrying on the Treaty, and we expect to hear by our next Letters from Peter-Waradin, that the Conferences are be-
