

Loo, Nov. 4. On Saturday last the Elector of Bararia arrived here from Brussels; And yesterday being St. Hubert's day, his Electoral Highness hunted with the King, and after having killed two Stag, supped with His Majesty. The Count de Tallard and the Pensioner of Holland are returned from hence, the former to Utrecht, and the latter to the Hague. His Majesty has been pleased to declare Monsieur d'Allone his Secretary for the Dutch Affairs, in the Place of Monsieur de Zuylcoem deceased.

Hague, Novemb. 4. The States of Holland and Westfriesland are to meet on the 12th Instant, and the Deputies from the Colleges of the Admiralty are appointed to be here at the same time. The Sieur d'Odyck made Report in the Assembly of the States-General, of his Embassy to France on the first Instant, and is gone for Loo to wait on His Majesty. A Placat has been published here, to forbid the Importation of Copper Money from Foreign Parts.

Paris, November 5. N. S. The Earl of Jersey, His Majesty of Great-Britain's Ambassador Extraordinary, had on Friday night last a private Audience of the King at Fontainebleau. On Saturday his Excellency returned hither, and on Sunday began his Journey to Loo. On the first of November, being All-Saints day, the King disposed of several vacant Benefices. This day the Dauphin entering into his 38th Year, received the usual Compliments of the Court. Our Letters from Thoulon of the 26th of the last Month say, the Count d'Estrees was arrived there with his Squadron from Cadiz. And from Brest we have an Account of the 27th, that Monsieur Coctlogon was returned thither from the same place with 4 of the 7 Frigats under his Command, two were put into Port-Louis, and the 7th was hourly expected, having on Board the Admiral of Sallé, who is sent by the Emperor of Morocco to treat a Peace with this Crown.

Westminster, Octob. 27. This day the Parliament met, and was further Prorogued to the 29th of Novemb. r next.

London, Octob. 29. Sir Francis Child, Elected Lord Mayor of this City for the Year ensuing, went this day by Water to Westminster, accompanied by the late Lord Mayor, Mr. Recorder, the Aldermen and the Sheriffs, and attended by the several Companies in their respective Barges, and was according to Custom sworn before the Barons of the Exchequer. After which, they returned in the same manner to Dorset Stairs, where at their Landing, Chairs being placed for the Lord Mayor and Aldermen, they were Entertained by the Right Honourable the Earl of Dorset with Sweetmeats and Wine, the King's Musick playing all the while. From thence they proceeded with the usual Solemnity to the Guildhall, where a splendid Entertainment was provided, at which were divers Lords of His Majesty's most Honourable Privy-Council, the Judges, and other Persons of Quality. The Act of Parliament against throwing of Squibs was strictly observed on this Occasion.
