road leading to the house and premises known as High Belasis, and extending thence northward to and along the middle of the said bridle road for a distance of 30 chains or thereabouts to a point opposite to the southern end of the fence forming the western boundary of the premises attached to the said house known as High Belasis, and extending thence northward to and along the said fence for a distance of $2\frac{1}{2}$ chains or thereabouts to the point where it meets the fence forming the southern boundary of the close numbered I upon the map or plan annexed to this Scheme or Representation, and extending thence first westward along the last mentioned fence, then northwestward along the fences forming the western boundaries of the said close numbered I and the close numbered 2 upon the said map, and then north-eastward along the fence forming the northern boundary of the said close numbered 2 for a distance in all of 18 chains or thereabouts to the point where the last mentioned fence reaches the boundary which divides the Civil Parish of Billingham from the Civil Parish of Cowpen Bewley and extending thence first north-eastward and then in various directions along such civil parish boundary for å distance of I mile and 19 chains or thereabouts to the boundary which divides the said Parish of Billingham from the said New Parish of Haverton Hill."

And whereas drafts of the said Scheme or Representation have been transmitted to the Patrons and to the Incumbents of the Cures affected by the arrangements which are contemplated by such Scheme or Representation and such Patrons and Incumbents have respectively signified their assent thereto:

And whereas the said Scheme or Representation has been approved by His Majesty in Council:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said Scheme or Representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts.

And His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said Diocese of Durham.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the 6th and 7th years of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, Chapter 77, and of the Act of the 5th and 6th years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, Chapter 26, duly prepared, and laid before His Majesty in Council, a Scheme bearing date the 22nd day of July, 1937, in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the 6th and 7th years of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, Chapter 77, and of the Act of the 5th and 6th years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, Chapter 26, have prepared, and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council, the following Scheme for authorising certain improvements at the Episcopal House of Residence belonging to the See of Southwark which is known as Bishop's House, Kennington:

"Whereas the Right Reverend Richard Godfrey, Bishop of Southwark, is desirous that certain improvements should be made at the said Episcopal House of Residence and has submitted to us the particulars of such improvements and we have specified our general approval of the same:

"And whereas the said Bishop is also desirous and it appears to us to be expedient that towards the cost of effecting the aforesaid improvements a sum of f_{300} (being a sum which together with the outstanding balance of the sum already borrowed upon the same security under the authority of the statutes hereinbefore mentioned, does not exceed two years income of the See) should be provided by his borrowing the same by way of mortgage upon the security of all and every part of the lands tenements and hereditaments endowments or emoluments which now belong or may hereafter belong to the Bishopric of Southwark:

" Now therefore with the consent of the said Richard Godfrey, Bishop of Southwark (testified by his having affixed his signature and Episcopal Seal to this Scheme), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, humbly recommend and propose that the said Bishop be authorised to borrow from the Governors of the Bounty of Queen Anne, and that the said Governors be empowered to lend under the provisions of the above mentioned Acts any sum not exceeding £300 and that as a security for the same the said Bishop do mortgage all and every part of the lands tenements and hereditaments and endowments or emoluments which now belong or may hereafter belong to his said See to the said Governors by deed for a term of twelve years or until the said sum of £300 with interest for the same as hereinafter mentioned, and all costs and charges which may attend the recovery thereof, shall be fully paid and satisfied and that such principal sum shall be repaid with interest in the manner following, that is to say, during and in respect of the first period of 12 months of the said term computed from the day of the date of the mortgage, no part of the said principal sum shall be repayable but the said Bishop or his successors shall yearly at the end of the second period of 12 months so computed and at the end of every such like period of 12 months thereafter pay to the said Governors their successors or assigns one tenth part of the said principal sum of £300 until the whole thereof shall be repaid, and shall also at the end of the first and each succeeding period of 12 months, computed as aforesaid, pay interest at the rate of £4 per centum per annum on the said principal sum or on so much
