

No person actually serving in the Army, Navy or Air Force will be eligible for consideration unless he produces, when called upon to do so, the permission of his Commanding Officer to apply for appointment, dated before his appearance before the Selection Board, and given in accordance with such orders as may from time to time be issued.

Persons upon whose training for the occupation of teacher public money has been spent cannot be appointed until the consent of the appropriate education authority has been notified to the Civil Service Commissioners.

4. Candidates must have attained a satisfactory standard of general education, and must have passed the Final Examination of the Chartered Surveyors' Institution, or the corresponding examination of the Auctioneers' and Estate Agents' Institute or of the Land Agents' Society or of the Faculty of Surveyors of Scotland. They must have had at least four years' professional experience which may have been obtained in—

(a) The Office of a F.S.I., F.A.I., or member of the Land Agents' Society or of the Faculty of Surveyors of Scotland in professional practice, or in Government or Municipal service; or

(b) The Office of any other Surveyor, Estate Agent or Land Agent which in the opinion of the Civil Service Commissioners and the Department gives an adequate training.

Candidates who have passed the examinations qualifying for a University degree in Estate Management (B.A. Cambridge or B.Sc. London) will be exempt from the requirements of this regulation.

5. H.M. Office of Works will take such steps as they think most appropriate to make known the existence of any vacancies which they desire to fill, and the Civil Service Commissioners will satisfy themselves that the steps taken have been such as to secure all desirable publicity.

6. Applications shall be addressed in the first instance to the Secretary, H.M. Office of Works, and shall be made on a form to be obtained from the Establishment Officer of that Department, which must be stamped by the applicant with a "Civil Service" stamp or stamps of the value of five shillings; this fee is payable in respect of the application and will not be returned in any circumstances.

Applications will be scrutinised by the Office of Works in association with the Civil Service Commissioners and the Candidates who appear to be best qualified under the regulations will be summoned to appear before a Selection Board, who will recommend for the vacancies existing those candidates who appear to them to possess the highest qualifications, provided they find them qualified. The Selection Board will be nominated by the Civil Service Commissioners in consultation with the Office of Works who will be represented thereon. The decision of the Selection Board will be final.

7. The appointment of selected candidates will be subject to their satisfying the Civil Service Commissioners of their eligibility in respect of age, nationality, health and character, and will not be confirmed unless and until they have passed the prescribed period of probation to the satisfaction of the Commissioners of H.M. Works.

Women candidates must be unmarried or widows and will normally be required to resign their appointments on marriage; but exception to the rule requiring resignation on marriage may, in individual circumstances, be made where the employment of a married woman is considered advisable in the light of her special qualifications, or special experience in relation to the duties required of her, or of the special requirements of the Department.

8. A candidate selected for appointment will be required to pay a fee of £8, towards which the fee paid on application will count, before the issue of the certificate of qualification.

9. Any attempt on the part of candidates to enlist support for their applications through Members of Parliament or other influential persons will disqualify them for appointment. The Selection Board will disregard spontaneous recommendations from persons who are not personally acquainted with the candidates' work, whether at school, at the University, in industry or business, in the Forces, or otherwise.

#### RULES PUBLICATION ACT, 1893.

##### IN THE MATTER OF THE LONDON TRAFFIC ACT, 1924.

The Minister of Transport hereby gives notice under the Rules Publication Act, 1893, that he proposes after the expiration of at least 40 days from this date in pursuance of the powers conferred upon him by Section 10 of the London Traffic Act, 1924, to make the London Traffic (Prescribed Routes) (No. ) (Enfield) Regulations, 1938, in regard to a scheme of "one-way" traffic working at the junction of London Road (A.105) and The Town, Enfield.
