WHEREAS by Section 659 of the Merchant Shipping Act, 1894 (which is a Section in Part XI of that Act), it is (among other things) enacted that His Majesty may, by Order in Council, fix the establishments to be main-tained by each of the General Lighthouse Authorities, on account of the services of lighthouses, buoys and beacons, or the annual or other sums to be paid out of the Mercantile Marine Fund in respect of these establishments, and that an increase of any establishment or part of an establishment so fixed shall not be made without the consent of the Board of Trade:

And whereas by Section 738 of the Merchant Shipping Act 1894 it is provided that where His Majesty has power under that Act or any Act thereafter to be passed amending the same, to make an Order in Council His Majesty may from time to time make that Order in Council and by Order in Council revoke alter or add to any Order so made:

And whereas by Section 1 of the Merchant Shipping (Mercantile Marine Fund) Act, 1898, it is (among other things) provided that references in Part XI of the Merchant Shipping Act, 1894, to the Mercantile Marine Fund shall be construed as references to the General Lighthouse Fund by the now reciting Act constituted:

And whereas by an Order in Council made on the 22nd day of October, 1937, in pursuance of the above recited powers, the engineering establishment which might be maintained by the Corporation of the Trinity House of Deptford Strond (hereinafter referred to as "the Corporation"), being one of the General

Lighthouse Authorities referred to in the Merchant Shipping Act, 1894, and the amount of the salaries to be paid out of the General Lighthouse Fund in respect of the said establishment were (among other things) duly

And whereas it is expedient that the engineering establishment of the Corporation should be varied in manner hereinafter appearing:

And whereas it has been made to appear to His Majesty that the Board of Trade have

consented to such variation:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by virtue of the power vested in Him by the Merchant Shipping Act, 1894, and of any other powers Him thereunto enabling, and by and with the advice of His Privy Council, is pleased to

order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:—

1. This Order may be cited as the Trinity
House (Variation of Establishment) Order,

The post of Marine Engineer Inspector mentioned in the Second Schedule to the Order in Council dated the 22nd day of October, 1937, shall, as from the 1st day of April, 1938, be regraded as Engineering Assistant (Grade I) and the minimum salary attaching to the post shall be £450 per annum rising by annual increments of £18 to a maximum of £550 per
- 3. The number of Engineering Assistants Grade III mentioned in the Second Schedule to the said Order in Council dated the 22nd day of October, 1937, shall as from the 4th day of

July, 1938, be increased to four.

4. The salaries payable under the provisions of this Order shall be paid out of the General

WHEREAS by Section 214 of the Merchant Shipping Act, 1894 (57 & 58 Vict. c. 60) it is provided that a local authority, whose district includes a seaport, may, with the approval of the Board of Trade, make byelaws relating to seamen's lodging houses in their district, and that those byelaws shall be binding upon all persons keeping houses in which seamen are lodged, and upon the owners thereof and persons employed therein; and further that such byelaws shall, amongst other things, provide for the licensing, inspection, and sanitary conditions of seamen's lodging houses, for the publication of the fact of a house being licensed, for the due execution of the byelaws, for preventing the obstruction of persons engaged in securing that execution, for the preventing of persons not duly licensed holding themselves out as keeping or purporting to keep licensed houses, and for the exclusion from licensed houses of persons of improper character, and shall impose sufficient fines, not exceeding fifty pounds, for the breach of any byelaw; and further, that whenever His Majesty in Council orders that in any district or any part thereof, none but persons duly licensed in pursuance of byelaws under the
