2. The requirements contained in Subsections (3), (4), (5) and (7) of Section 22 of the Act as respects hoists or lifts constructed or reconstructed before the passing of the Act in warehouses to which the provisions of Section 22 are applied by Subsection (3) of Section 105 of the Act, subject to the condition that the hoist or lift shall be securely fenced so far as is reasonably practicable.

COAL MINES ACT, 1911.

The Secretary for Mines gives notice that on the 29th day of June, 1938, the Board of Trade made General Regulations for Quarries under the powers conferred by Section 86 of the Coal Mines Act, 1911, as applied to quarries by the Factories Act, 1937.

The Regulations, which are operative from 1st July, 1938, are divided into six parts.

Part I. requires notice to be given to His Majesty's Inspectors of the opening and closing of quarries, lays down general requirements for the safe working of quarries, and defines in general terms the respective duties of the Owner, the Agent or Manager and the persons employed.

Part II. deals with health and welfare, and includes requirements with regard to first-aid; sanitary, messing and changing accommodation; and the suppression of dust which may be injurious to health.

Part III. deals with the employment of women and of young persons under sixteen years of age, and, as required by Section 158 (3) of the Factories Act, 1937, applies without change the provisions of the Coal Mines Act, 1911, relative to the employment of women and young persons above ground.

Part IV. regulates the use of machinery and plant and contains provisions about the cleaning, oiling and fencing of machinery, the use of cranes and other lifting machines, the care and maintenance of chains, ropes, etc., and the use of steam boilers and compressed air receivers.

Part V. is a code of rules, substantially the same as those already applying at coal mines and factories, to provide for the safe working of railway lines and sidings of standard gauge.

Part VI. prescribes the date on which the Regulations are to come into force and directs that they shall be in addition to and not in diminution of the provisions of Special Rules.
