Caalix, Nov. 30. N. S. The 3 Ships that are fitting out here for the West-Indies, will be ready to sail in a few days; They are to call at Carthagena, and to carry thither considerable Supplies for that Garrison. On the 25th Instant came in here the Sea-Horse Man of War from the Ca-

nary Islands, having been separated in a Storm from the Seaford, which was in her Company. The 27th, a Dutch Merchant-ship put into this Port, bound home from Tangier, having on Board divers Dutch Seamen redeemed out of Slavery in Barbary.

Madrid, Dec. 10. The Marquis de Castell dos Rios, who is lately returned hither from his Embassy to the Court of Portugal, is appointed by the King to go Ambassador to the Court of France, and is accordingly preparing his Journey to Paris. Don Carlos Boffau, the King's Ambassador to the Duke of Savoy, has Orders to repair with the like Character to Venice; and Don Juan Antonio d'Albiza, Baron of Burroy, who was lately at Genoua as Resident from Spain, is appointed to succeed him. The Bishop of Solsona, Ambassador from this Crown at Vienna, is removed to the Bishoprick of Lerida, the Revenues of which exceed double the Value of that of Solsona. The Baron of Chauviray, Envoy from the Duke of Lorraine, is gone to Lisbon, having Orders to notify at that Court the Marriage of the Duke his Master with Mademoiselle the Duke of Orleans's Daughter. A considerable Sum of Money was sent this week to the Prince of Darmstadt, Vice-Roy of Catalonia, to pay the Forces in that Country. The Regiment of Horse of Estradamura is gone into Winter Quarters in that Province. Count Grajal, Vice-Roy of Navarre, went hence the last week to Pampeluna. Don Juan Pimienta is gone to Cadiz in order to embark there, and to repair to his Government of Carthagena, which the King has lately given him, and he carries with him a Reinforcement of 500 Men and 86 Pieces of Cannon for the Garrison of that Place. The late Governor of Carthagena, Don Diego de los Rios, is removed from that Employment, for not defending the Place as he might have done, when the French attacked it under Monsieur Pointy, and for his Disobedience to the President of Sta. Fé, under whose Jurisdiction he was, in causing the City-Gates to be shut against him, when the said President came to Carthagena to enquire into this Matter. Don Francisco Perez de Taguada died here some days ago, in the 11th year of his Age.

Venice, Dec. 14. We expect in a short time to receive the welcome News, That the Treaty for making a Truce with the Ottoman Port is signed by all the Parties engaged in the present War, the Imperials having already settled the Articles which relate to them, and the rest of the Allies seeming to be well-disposed towards the finishing of this important Negotiation. It's said, the last Instructions of our Senate to their Ambassador at the Congress at Carlowitz, sent to him some days ago by the return of the Express he had dispatched hither upon some Difficulties that were arisen in the Treaty, will not a little contribute to the speedy Conclusion of it. Our last Letters from the Levant confirm the return of Chevalier Desifao with the Venetian Men of War under his Command

mand to Napoli di Romania, where he had already begun to lay up part of his Ships for this Winter, having received a certain Account, that the Turkish Fleet is returned to Constantinople. General Mocenigo, Governor of Dalmatia, having with part of the Forces under his Command reinforced the Garrisons on the frontiers of that Province to prevent the Incursions of the Turks of Bosnia, has sent the rest into Winter Quarters. Our Letters from Rome say, the Queen-Dowager of Poland was shortly expected there, and Preparations were making for her Reception; The Pope has sent her a Brief, in Answer to a Letter he had received from her, and has appointed Signior Zantedari to meet her on the Borders of the Ecclesiastical State, and to conduct her to Rome.

Paris, Dec. 27. N. S. His Excellency the Earl of Jersey, Ambassador Extraordinary from His Majesty of Great-Britain, intends to make his Publick Entry on this day sevenight. Divers Persons, who had advanced considerable Sums of Money towards the fitting out of the Squadron commanded by Monsieur Pointy for their Voyage last year to the West-Indies, nor having yet received their share of the Booty which those Ships brought home, they have Petitioned the King, That he would order the Sieur de Vanolles, who was Treasurer for the said Expedition, to make up his Accounts. The Count d'Estrees, who commanded a Squadron of French Men of War the last Summer in the Mediteranean, is returned to Court. It's said, that the Marquis de Harcourt, Ambassador from this Crown to the Court of Spain, will shortly return home. We have received the News, that on the 28th of the last Month a Truce of 25 years between the Emperor and the Turks was concluded at Carlowitz in Hungary, and that 'twas not doubted but the Venetians and the rest of the Emperor's Allies would likewise conclude their particular Treaties in a few days. They write from Strasbourg, that the Count of Fugger is come thither from Vienna, being appointed to take Possession of the Lands in Alsace that belong to the Teutonic Order. The late King Lewis XIII. having made a Vow to dedicate to the Blessed Virgin an Altar to the Value of 300000 Livres in the Cathedral Church of Nostredame of Paris, and dying before he had performed it, the King being lately put in mind thereof by the Arch-Bishop of Paris, has resolved to make good the same, and to add to it 200000 Livres more as his own Gift; Upon which, the Chapter appointed six of their Canons to return their Thanks. A Declaration has lately been published here, by which, the King commands, That his Edict made in the year 1685, for Repealing the Edict of Nantz, be strictly put in Execution; And divers Rules and Orders are therein contained, obliging all his Subjects who have professed the Protestant Religion to go to Mass, and to observe the Discipline of the Church of Rome, as also to cause their Children to be Christned and bred up in that Communion; under very severe Penalties to be inflicted on such as shall act contrary hereto.

Falmouth, Dec. 19. Yesterday arrived here the Spanish-Expedition Pacquet-Boat with one Mail from the Groyne. On Friday night two Ships were lost near the Lizard, and all the Men on board drowned; It's not known what Vessels they were.
