

FACTORIES ACT, 1937.

The Secretary of State for the Home Department hereby gives notice that on the 15th November, 1938, he made Regulations under the Factories Act, 1937, extending the provisions of Section 66 of the Act to compressed air illness.

The Regulations, which may be cited as the Factories (Notification of Diseases) Regulations, 1938, will come into force on the 1st January, 1939.

DANGEROUS DRUGS ACTS, 1920 TO 1932.

CANCELLATION OF SUSPENSION OF
WITHDRAWAL OF AUTHORITIES.

(JOHN JOSEPH COGHLAN.)

Whereas in pursuance of the powers conferred on me by Regulation 7 of the Dangerous Drugs Regulations, 1937, and by Regulation 5 of the Raw Opium, etc. Regulations, 1937, the Authorities granted by the said Regulations to duly qualified medical practitioners to be in possession of and to supply the drugs or preparations to which the Dangerous Drugs Regulations, 1937, and the drugs to which the Raw Opium, etc. Regulations, 1937, apply, were, by Notice published in the London Gazette and Edinburgh Gazette on the 24th June, 1930, withdrawn from John Joseph Coghlan, M.R.C.S., L.R.C.P., then of 98, Station Road, New Barnet, who had been convicted of an offence against the Dangerous Drugs Acts:

And whereas by the said Notice it was directed that it should not be lawful for the said John Joseph Coghlan to give prescriptions for the purposes of the Dangerous Drugs Regulations, 1937:

And whereas the operation of the said Notice was by Notice published in the London Gazette and Edinburgh Gazette on the 8th May, 1936, suspended until further Order:

And whereas I am of opinion that the said John Joseph Coghlan cannot properly be allowed for the purposes of the Dangerous Drugs Regulations, 1937, and the Raw Opium, etc. Regulations, 1937, to remain an authorised person or to give prescriptions:

Now therefore I hereby cancel, as from today's date, the Notice of Suspension published in the London Gazette and Edinburgh Gazette on the 8th May, 1936.

COUNTY OF BEDFORD.

THE CORONERS (AMENDMENT) ACT, 1926.

*Order for the Alteration of the Division of the
County into Coroners' Districts.*

Whereas it is provided by section 12 of the Coroners (Amendment) Act, 1926, that a County Council may submit, after complying with such requirements as to notice and consideration of objections as may be prescribed, to the Secretary of State a draft Order providing for such alteration of any existing division of the County into Coroners' districts as appears to them to be suitable and that the Secretary of State, after taking into consideration any objections to the draft Order made in the prescribed manner and within the prescribed time, may make an Order, either in the terms of the draft submitted to him or with such modifications as he thinks fit:

And whereas by an Order of the Secretary of State dated the 10th day of June, 1929, the County of Bedford was divided into two Coroners' districts known as the West District and the North, East and South District:

And whereas the Council of the said County consider it suitable that the County should no longer be divided into Coroners' districts and have, pursuant to section 12 of the said recited Act, submitted to the Secretary of State a draft Order to provide for the alteration of the division of the County into Coroners' districts:

And whereas the requirements of the Coroners (Orders as to Districts) Rules, 1927, have been complied with:

Now therefore, I, the undersigned, one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, in pursuance of the power vested in me by section 12 of the said recited Act, do hereby order that the West Coroner's District and the North, East and South Coroner's District of the County shall cease to exist and that the County shall no longer be divided into Coroners' districts.

This Order shall come into operation on the first day of December, 1938.
