His Majesty The KING has been graciously pleased to award the Edward Medal to Fred Haller, in recognition of his gallantry in the following circumstances:

An abandoned heading in Rossington Main Colliery, Yorkshire, had been fenced off as dangerous on account of gas. About 1.30 a.m. on the 8th October, 1938, a driver named Dakin, employed with a contractor named Godfrey and his son in enlarging the road, was Planks composing the fence which shut off the dangerous heading were found to have been pushed on one side and a light was seen some distance up the heading. Godfrey and his son concluded that Dakin must have entered the heading for some reason and got into difficulties, so the son went for assistance. A man named Durkin arrived first, followed by Haller, the Deputy for the District, and another Deputy. Godfrey had turned on a compressed air hose but it failed to reach the fence by two yards. Haller sent for more hosepipe, and taking a singlet which Godfrey had saturated with water went up the heading to try and rescue Dakin. He could see that Dakin was some forty yards beyond the fence, and he knew that the atmosphere in the heading was likely to be irrespirable, as he had been present a few weeks previously when tests made in the heading revealed the presence in large quantities of methane and carbon dioxide. As a trained Deputy, Haller was able to appreciate the risk he was running by venturing over forty yards up an incline of one in seven, without breathing apparatus of any description, through such an atmosphere. Advancing cautiously up the heading, so as not to exhaust himself, he reached Dakin who was unconscious and with considerable effort succeeded in dragging him up to the fence where he arrived in an exhausted condition. It was some hours before Dakin recovered complete consciousness after the application of artificial respiration, and there is no doubt that if the rescue had been delayed he would have been asphyxiated.
