Genova, Dec. 14. N.S.

THE Duke of Turis is returned hither by Land from Naples, and two Gallies of his Squadron arrived here yesterday with his Servants and Equipage; The rest of the Gallies under his Command continue at Naples. A Ship is likewise come in here from thence bound for Barcelona, having on board divers Spanish Officers, who are going to Spain to raise Recruits for their Regiments which serve in that Kingdom. They write from Milan, that the Prince of Vaudemont intended in a few days to go to Final to view the Town and Garrison, and to give Directions for making of several Works for the conveniency and security of that Port; These Letters add, That the King of Spain has made the Marquis of Casnedi General of the Artillery, and Overseer of the Fortifications of that State; and had sent thither a Commission to Count de Soissons to be General of the Horse in Catalonia, who is thereupon gone for Spain to take possession of that Employment.

Leghorne, Dec. 18. The Weymouth Man of War, Captain Tho. Poulden Commander, which came in here some days ago, being Convey to the English Merchant-ships from Newfoundland, continues in this Port. They write from Florence, that the Marquis of Lenoncourt is arrived there with the Character of Envoy Extraordinary from the Duke of Lorraine, being sent by that Prince to notify to the Great Duke of Tuscany his Marriage with Mademoiselle the Duke of Orleans's Daughter. An Ambassador is also come to the Great Duke's Court from the Republick of Lucca. The Great Prince and Princess of Tuscany are come to Pisa, and are shortly expected at this Place, where they intend to spend the Carnival.

Rome, Dec. 20. Yesterday was held an Extraordinary Congregation of Cardinals, in which the Pope disposed of the two Cardinals Caps, which he had reserved in Petto at the last Promotion, to Signior Morigia, a Native of Milan, formerly a Monk of the Order of St. Barnaby, and now Bishop of Florence, and to Signior Fabritio Paluzzi of Forli, Bishop of Ferra, and late Nuncio Extraordinary in Poland. The Pope still refusing to give Audience to Count Martinitz, the Emperor's Ambassador, his Excellency has sent an Express to Vienna, to desire his Imperial Majesty's Orders how to behave himself in this Juncture. The Examination of the Arch-Bishop of Cambray's Book, which was for some time laid aside, is now renewed at the Request of the Cardinal of Bouillon, and the Congregation of the Inquisition have frequent Meetings about this Affair, but we do not hear that they have yet made any considerable Progress therein; In the mean time the Cardinal

of Bouillon continues to press very much for a speedy Conclusion of it, that so a stop may be put to the Schism it occasions among the French Clergy. The Queen-Dowager of Poland is shortly expected here, and Prince Livio Odeschalci's Palace is made ready for her Reception. Directions have been sent to the Cardinals Legates, the Vice-Legates, and other Magistrates of the Places through which she shall pass, concerning the manner of her Reception. 'Tis said, the Legates are directed to receive her at the distance of about half a Mile from the Places of their Residence, and that all other Governors are to meet her on the utmost Limits of the Territories under their Jurisdiction.

Venice, Dec. 27. Signior Aluizio Mocenigo, appointed by this Republick to go as their Ambassador to His Majesty of Great-Britain, prepares for his Departure. The Senate being informed, that the Princess of Hanover intends to pass through the Territories of this State in her Journey to Vienna, have sent Orders to the Governors of the several Places, to Treat her with the Respect due to her Quality. By several Expresses lately arrived here, both from the Congress at Carlowitz, and from the Venetian Ambassador at Vienna, we have so good an Account of the Progress made in the Treaty for a General Truce between the Emperor, this State, and their Allies on one part, and the Ottoman Port on the other, that we expect in a very short time to receive the News, that this great Work is happily compleated. Signior Pietro Businelli, lately chosen Great Chancellor of Venice in the room of Signior Belarini deceased, is arrived here from Milan, where he resided on the part of this Republick, and has taken possession of that Employment. The Noble Venetian Andrea de Lezze is made a Procurator of St. Mark, he paying the Sum of 25000 Ducats towards the Expences of the War. An Order is published here, by which the Men and Merchandizes that come hither from our Fleet, or from the Morea, or the Isles of Zant, Corfu, and Cefalonia, are obliged to continue but 28 days at the Lazeretto, whereas all other Persons and Merchandizes that come from the Levant are to perform the whole Quarantain. A French Merchant-ship arrived here last week from Napoli di Romania, where she left Captain-General Cornaro and the Chevalier Delfino with all the Ships and Gallies of the Venetian Fleet; The Hercules and Nostra Seniorsa de! Salute, two of the Venetian Men of War that suffered most in the late Engagement with the Turks in the Archipelago, were preparing to sail home in order to their being rebuilt in our Arsenal. By another Vessel from Zant, we have a Confirmation of the Death of the Chevalier Bartolo Conarini, Governor-

General of the Islands belonging to this State; This Ship met on the 8th Instant in the Gulph of Cattaro the last Convoy that sailed from hence for the Morea. They write from Daimatia, that all Things continue very quiet on that Frontier, and that the Bassa of Bosnia, who had obtained Leave of the Sultan not to join the Turkish Army with the Forces under his Command during the last Campagne, upon his Promise to make some considerable Enterprize on the Venetian Territories, which he did not perform, is sent for by the Grand Visier to give an Account of his Proceedings.

Berlin, Jan. 3. The King of Poland having accepted the Emperor's Mediation for adjusting the Affair of Elbing, a Treaty to that effect will shortly be set on foot, and 'tis said, that Dantzick or Breslau will be appointed for the Place of Meeting of the Ministers that are to be employed in this Negotiation; The King of Denmark (who, together with the Emperor and the States-General, is Guarand of the Treaties of Velau and Bidgost, on which the Elector of Brandenburg sounds his Pretensions) has writ a Letter to the King of Poland, desiring him to forbear all Acts of Hostility, and offering his Mediation in order to bring Matters to a friendly Composure; And we hear, the King of Sweden has ordered Baron Welling, his Minister at the Court of Poland, to use his Endeavours to the same effect. They write from Prussia, that several Regiments of the King of Poland's Saxon Forces are quartered in the Neighbourhood of Dantzick, Mariembourg, and Thorne.

Frankfort, Dec. 28. The Chapter of Wurtzburg have appointed to meet on the 9th of February next, to chuse a Successor to the late Bishop of that Place, who died some days ago; We hear, the principal Candidates are the Elector of Mentz, the Dean of Wurtzburg, the Dean of Mentz, and the Heer Fuchs, President of the Chamber of Wurtzburg. We have Advice from Dusseldorp, that the Elector Palatine is returned thither from Vienna.

Hambourg, Dec. 26. N. S. The Ministers of his Imperial Majesty, and of the Princes Directors of the Circle of Lower Saxony, have again called upon the Magistrates of this Place, to know their Resolution as to their submitting to the Imperial Commission for enquiring into the Disorders of this City, and the Burghers not being yet come to any Determination therein, they have allowed them a Fortnight longer to consider of it.
