H E Accommodation between the Parties of Sapieha and Oginsky, which had been for some time Negociating, was at length concluded on the 20th Instant, when 'twas least expected. The Forces on both sides being drawn out into the Field with a design to Engage, Major-General Fleming, the Bishop of Wilna, and the Castellan Witepsky, with a Body of the King's German Forces marched in between them, and through their Mediation an Agreement was concluded and figned, by which, among other things, it was stipulated, That part of Prince Sapieha's Forces should be immediately Disbanded, and the rest taken into the Service of the Republick; that a Regiment of 1600 Men should be given to the Sieur Oginsky: and that at the same time, those who sided with Oginsky should separate and march home; Which was performed accordingly, to the great Joy of all the People of this Country, who had fuffer'd very much by the Disorders to which an End is now put; And the Lithuanians, by a particular Compliment to General Fleming, have acknowledged his acceptable Services on this Occasion. General Sapicha is come hither to wait upon the King, and the Sieur Oginsky is expected to morrow. The King has ratifi'd the said Agreement, and having so happily finished this great Work, will in few days return to Warfaw.
Vienna, Jan. 10. Yesterday the Emperor gave

a folemn Audience to the Deputies of the Elector of Hanouer. His Imperial Majesty was seated on his Throne, the High Steward being placed on his right hand, and the Vice-Chancellor of the Empire on his left, and the other Great Officers, the Foreign Ministers, and other Persons of principal Quality at Court, being likewise present. The Quality at Court, being likewise present. The Sieurs Oberch and Erasmi, the Elector's Deputies, approach'd the Throne with the usual Reverences, and being come to a convenient distance, they kneeled down, and Monsieur Oberch, the first in Commission, made a Speech, desiring in his Matter's Name, that the Emperor would be pleased to give him the Investiture of the Electorate; which his Imperial Majesty granted, and the Vice-Chancellor adminstred to them the usual Oath, which they took on their Knees; after which, the Emperor received a Sword from the hands of the High Steward, and delivered the same to the Deputies, who in the name of his Electoral Highness returned Thanks to the Emperor; The whole being performed with the Ceremonies usual on such Occasions. Last night arrived here 2 Expresses from Carlowicz with Letters of the 6th Instant, by which we have an Account, that the Turkish Amballadors have conferred that the Venetians shall keep Lepanto, and the other Places in the Morea which they demanded the Restigation of, provi-

ded the Fortifications be demolished; But the ν_e metians insisting to keep those Fortresses in the Condition they are at present, the Turks have thereupon fent an Express to Andrinople, as the Venetians have likewise done to Venuce, for further Orders. The Amhassador of Muscovy having no Orders to comply with the Demands of the Port concerning the Forts on the Boresthenes, he has likewise sent an Express to Moscow for more particular Directions in this Point, and that the Conclusion of the General Treaty may not be delayed thereby; he has offered to agree to a Cessation of Arms between the Czar his Master and the Sultan for two years, during which time Matters may be further adjusted between them; And he contents, that ar present the rest of the Allies may enter into the Truce of 25 years. The States of Lower Austria are to assemble here to morrow, to consider of a Supply to be given to the Emperor. An Envoy is arrived here from the Duke of Moderna, to Compliment the Emperor on the Marriage of the King of the Romans with the Princess of Hanouer, to whom that Duke is related. It's faid, the Ceremony of her Publick Entry here will be deferred till the 22d of February, because the Preparations that are making here cannot be ready before that time:

Berlin, Jan. 13. Mon-fieur d'Odyke is gone to his House at Zeyst, and will go from thence in a few days for Zeland, to pre-fide at the Assembly of the States of that Province. The Count de Frize, Envoy from the King of Denmark, is preparing for his Publick Audience, which he is to have in few days.
