**T**HE Pope has appointed the Cardinal Buoncompagno, Bishop of Bologna, to Complement in his Name the Queen of the Romans upon her Marriage, for which purpose he is ordered to repair immediately to Modena with the Character of the Pope's Legate a Latere, and he is to present to the new Queen several Relicks, and other Things. In a Consistory held the 5th Instant, the Pope performed the Ceremony of Shutting and Opening the Mouth of Cardinal Pauluzzi, and gave him the Title of Cardinal St. John and St. Paul of Mount Celio. The Cardinal Bouillon received this week an Express from Paris, and had afterwards an Audience of the Pope, wherein he renewed his Instances for a speedy Decision upon the Arch-Bishop of Cambray's Book, which does somewhat embarrass this Court, where there are very different Opinions concerning this Matter. The Queen-Dowager of Poland is shortly expected here; she designs to continue her Journey incognito, and has therefore excused her self from being met by a Cardinal Legate, or having any publick Honours paid her, as has been ordered by the Pope.

Venice, Jan. 16. An Express arrived here last Wednesday from Carlowitz, and brought an Account, that the Venetian Ambassador there having on the 18th of the last Month received the last Instructions sent him by the Senate, had the same day a Conference thereupon with the Imperial Ambassadors, and on the 19th with the Mediators; On the 30th he had a Meeting with the Turkish Plenipotentiaries, but they could not adjust the Treaty upon the Terms proposed by the Senate, who insist to keep all the Places they are possessed of in Dalmatia and the Morea in the Condition they are at present, whereas the Turks demand that Lepanto and Castell-Novo be dismantled, offering in consideration thereof, to yield to the Venetians some small Places on the Frontier of Dalmatia: The Ambassador sent this Express to represent the same to the Senate, and receive their further Orders, who have had several Meetings thereupon, and intend to dispatch him back in a few days. Signior Foscarini, whom the Senate have appointed to receive the Queen of the Romans, and conduct her through the Venetian Territories, intends to go from hence to morrow with a very splendid and numerous Attendance, and to wait for her at Verona. The Queen-Dowager of Poland is come incognito to Padua, and is expected here this evening. A Convoiy failed from hence this week with a Supply of Money, Provisions and Ammunition, for the service of the Venetian Garrisons in the Morea.

Warsaw, Jan. 7. The King of Poland is still at Gradno, where he has been attended by a solemn Deputation from the Gentlemen of that Country; And the Sieur Wailoviz, who was at the Head of them, returned the King their Humble Thanks for his great Care, in putting an end to the Differences between the two Parties of Oginsky and Sapieha, which had occasioned so much confusion, and gave him Assurances of their Gratitude and Fidelity. The Bishop of Wisna, who was very instrumental in the finishing of this Work, and whose Estate, among others, was several times plundered during these Disorders, has a Sum of Money given him by the King, both as a Reward for his good Services, and to repair the Losses he has sustain'd; And the Sieur Dzialinsky and the Weywode Wittepsky are appointed Commissioners for regulating divers Matters about the Forces, which by the late Agreement are ordered to be taken into the Service of the Republick. The Town of Breslaw being made choice of for the Place where the Ministers are to meet for adjusting the Affair of Elbing, 'tis believed they will forthwith repair thither, and that this Business will in a short time be brought to a good Conclusion. The General Diet of this Kingdom is to meet here on the 2d of February next, to the good Success whereof, the Pacification of Affairs in Lithuania will, in all appearance, contribute very much.

Vienna, Jan. 17. Our Letters from Carlowitz of the 11th Instant give an Account, That 'twas agreed the day before at a Conference between the Imperial and Turkish Ambassadors, that the Treaty for a Truce of 25 Years between the Emperor and the Ottoman Port shall be signed on the 26th of this Month; And that in the mean time all possible Endeavours shall be used to adjust Matters between the Venetians and the Turks, and that to this effect neither side shall be at liberty to go back from any Proposals they have made, which may contribute to the speedy Conclusion of the Treaty. All the Points between the Poles and the Port being adjusted, and the Muscovites consenting, in case their Treaty be not settled by the time that the rest of the Allies conclude theirs, to make a Provisional Truce with the Turks for two Years, it's not doubted but they will both sign at the same time with the Imperialists; And it's hoped the Venetian Ambassador, who only expects the last Orders of the Senate concerning the Points in Dispute between him and the Turks, will be ready likewise to sign then, or soon after. An Express is arrived here from Modena, who left that Place on the 19th Instant, and brings Advice, that the Cardinal de Medicis was come thither from Florence to Compliment the Queen of the Rg-

was in the Name of the Great Duke of Tuscany his Brother. The Cardinal Bascapaga was expected there with the Character of Legate & Legation from the Pope; The Marriage was to be on the 15th, and on the 17th the Queen would begin her Journey thither. Great Preparations are making for her Reception, the Inhabitants of this City are on this occasion to appear in Arms, and 6 Troops of Horse composed of Gentlemen of *Bavaria* and 2 of Gentlemen of *Hungary*, are expected from those Kingdoms to assist at this Solemnity. The Baron *Oserch* is gone Post for *Rome*, to Compliment the Queen at her arrival there in the Name of the Elector of *Hannover* his Master. And the Arch-Bishop of *Salzburgh* intends to meet her himself on the Borders of that Arch-Bishoprick, and to entertain her very splendidly.

*Frankfurt, Jan. 25.* The Landgrave of *Hesse-Darmstadt* is gone for *Brugard*, to assist at the Funeral of Duke *Charles of Wirtemberg*. They write from *Wurtemberg*, that the Baron *Wills*, Envoy from the Emperor, is arrived there, in order to be present at the Election of a Bishop of that Place, which is put off till the 9th of *February*. The Count of *Wolkenstein*, Envoy from the Emperor to the Most Christian King, is arrived here on his Journey to *Paris*.

*Brussels, Jan. 29.* Count *Tirmon* and the *Sieur Brucelbrun*, Commissioners from *Spain* for Treating with the *French* about settling the Limits in the *Netherlands*, who came hither last week, are returned to *Lisse* to renew those Conferences. *Don Quirus* is come to this Place from the *Hague*, being appointed to reside as Ambassador from his Catholick Majesty at the Imperial Court.

*Hague, Jan. 30.* The States of *Holland* and *West-Friesland* met on *Wednesday* last, and have had under Consideration divers Matters relating to the Publick Revenues of this Province; they intend to adjourn to morrow for 3 or 4 weeks. The States have not yet ratified the Agreement made by their Commissioners at *Paris* for Regulating the *Tariffs*, and other Matters of Trade, by reason there are some Things in it which are not approved of here, and therefore are to be further considered. The *Sieur Pacheco*, Envoy from the King of *Portugal*, is on his departure for *Rome*, where he is to reside with the same Character. Our Letters from *Venna* give an Account, that the Imperial Ambassadors at the Congress at *Carlowitz* had declared, they would sign their Treaty with the *Turks* on the 26th of this Month, and 'twas not doubted but the *Venitians*, the *Poles*, and the *Moscovites*, would sign theirs at the same time, or soon after; And that in the mean while, the Imperialists did contribute all they could to the adjusting of Matters between the *Venitians* and the *Turks*.

*Paris, Jan. 31. N. S.* On *Tuesday* last his Excellency the *Duke of Jersey* made the Visit of Ceremony to the Prince of *Conde*, and afterwards returned the Visit he had received from the *Venitian* Ambassador, and yesterday did the same to the Ambassador of *Savoy*. We have an Account, that the Prince of *Conde* is arrived at *Besnon*, where he intends to stay till he has received an Answer from the *Chevalier d'Anguleme*, whom he had sent with Letters to the Magistrates of *Neuf-Chatel*. They write from *Marsettes*, that four Vessels are come in there with Corn from *Tunis*, and two from *Tripoli*.

*Paris, Jan. 24.* *Sir William Norris*, His Majesty's Ambassador to the Great *Mughal*, went last *Saturday* on board His Majesty's Ship the *Harwich*, where the Union Flag was thereupon put up; and on *Sunday* his Excellency sailed from *Spithhead* with the Squadron of His Majesty's Ships, commanded by Captain *Warren*, bound

to the *East-Indies*. The same day His Majesty's Ship the *Roupe* set sail for the *Caribbean*.
