His Brother. The Cardinal Elector was re-
presented there with the Character of Legate & Envoy
from the Pope; The Marriage was to be on
the 17th, and on the 19th the Queen would begin
her Journey hither. Great Preparations are making
for her Reception, and Inhabitants of this
City are on this occasion to appear in Arms, and
a Troop of Horse composed of Gentlemen of
Belgium, and of Gentlemen of Hungary, are ex-
pected from those Kingdoms to assist at this Sc-
hemery. The Baron Gourch is gone Post for
Paris, to Compliment the Queen at her arrival
there in the Name of the Elector of Hanover his
Master. And the Arch-Bishop of Salzburg in-
tends to meet her himself on the Borders of that
Arch-Bishoprick, and to entertain her very splen-
didly.

France, Jan. 25. The Landgrave of Hesse-
Darmstadt is gone for Strasburg, to assist at the Fun-
eral of Duke Charles of Wurtemberg. They
write from Wurtemberg, that the Baron Wills, Envoy
from the Emperor, is arrived there, in order
to be present at the Election of a Bishop of that
Place, which is put off till the 9th of February.
The Count of Willems, Envoy from the Em-
peror to the Most Christian King, is arrived
here on his Journey to Paris.

Brussels, Jan. 29. Count Trimont and the
Sieur Brueckeborn, Commissioners from Spain for
Treating with the French about settling the Li-
mits in the Netherlands, who came hither last
week, are returned to Lise to renew those Confe-
rences. Don Quirós is come to this Place from
the Hague, being appointed to reside as Ambas-
sador from his Catholick Majesty at the Imperial
Court.

Hague, Jan. 30. The States of Holland and
Westfjord met on Wednesday last, and have had
under Consideration divers Matters relating to
the Publick Revenues of this Province; they in-
tend to adjourn to morrow for 3 or 4 weeks.
The States have not yet ratified the Agreement
made by their Commissioners at Paris for Regula-
ting the Tariff, and other Matters of Trade, by
reason there are some Things in it which are
not approved of here, and therefore are to be fur-
ther considered. The Sieur Pachet, Envoy from
the King of Portugal, is on his departure for
Rome, where he is to reside with the same Charac-
ter. Our Letters from Vienna give an Account,
that the Imperial Ambassadors at the Congress at
Carlowitz had declared, they would sign their
Treaty with the Turks on the 26th of this Month,
and 'twas not doubted but the Venetians, the Po-
landers, and the Muscovites, would sign theirs at
the same time, or soon after; And that in the
mean while, the Imperialists did contribute all
they could to the adjusting of Matters between
the Venetians and the Turks.

Paris, Jan. 31. N. B. On Tuesday last his Excellency
the Earl of Jersey made the Visit of Ceremony to the
Prince of Condé, and afterwards returned the Visit he had
received from the Venetian Ambassador, and yesterday
did the same to the Ambassador of Savoy. We have an
Ac^d v^e that the Prince of Condé is arrived at Béziers,
where he intends to stay till he has received an Answer
from the Chevalier d'Auguistin, whom he had sent with
Letters to the Magistrates of Neuf-Châtel. They write
from Martigues, that four Vessels are come in there with
Corn from Tunis, and two from Tripoli.

Fonthorpe, Jan. 24. Sir William Norris, His Majesty's
Ambassador to the Great Turk, went last Saturday on
board His Majesty's Ship the *Warrwick*, where the Union
Flag was therupon put up; and on Sunday his Ex-
cellency sailed from Spithead with the Squadron of His
Maj. Ry's Ships, commanded by Captain Warren, bound

to the East-India. The same day His Maj. Ry. gave the
Order for Landing on the Continent.
