Ipswich, Saint Mary at the Quay, belongs to one and the same body of trustees:

"Now, therefore, we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, with the consent of the said Walter Godfrey, Bishop of Saint Edmundsbury and Ipswich (in testimony whereof he has signed this Scheme), do humbly recommend and propose to Your Majesty as follows, that is to say:—

"I. That the said Benefice of Ipswich, Saint Peter, and the said Benefice of Ipswich, Saint Mary at the Quay, shall be permanently united together and form one Benefice with Cure of Souls under the style of 'The United Benefice of Ipswich, Saint Peter with Saint Mary at the Quay' but the Parishes of the said Benefices shall continue in all respects distinct.

2. That if upon the day when any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this Scheme shall be published in the London Gazette both of the said two Benefices shall be vacant, the union of the same two Benefices shall take effect forthwith: and if one only of the said two Benefices shall be then vacant the said union shall also take effect forthwith if the Incumbent of the other of the said two Benefices shall with the approval of the Bishop consent to become the first In-cumbent of the United Benefice, but, if he shall not so consent, or if the Bishop shall not approve, then the said union shall take effect upon the next avoidance of his Benefice and the then Incumbent (if any) of the other of the said two Benefices shall be the first Incumbent of the United Benefice: and if neither of the said two Benefices be then vacant then the said union shall take effect on the next avoidance of either of the said two Benefices if the Incumbent at that time of the other of the said two Benefices shall, with the approval of the Bishop, consent to become the first Incumbent of the United Benefice, but if he shall not so consent or if the Bishop shall not approve then the said union shall take effect immediately upon the next vacancy of his Benefice and the then Incumbent (if any) of the other of the said two Benefices shall become the first Incumbent of the United Benefice.

"3. That upon the said union taking effect such one of the Parsonage Houses at present belonging to the said Benefices as shall be designated in writing by the Bishop of the Diocese for the purpose shall become and be the house of residence for the Incumbent of the United Benefice and so soon as conveniently may be the other one of the said Parsonage Houses and the site and appurtenances thereof and the grounds heretofore usually occupied and enjoyed therewith shall be sold and disposed of by us, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, at such time or times and in such manner in all respects as to us shall seem expedient and that the net proceeds of such sale shall constitute and form part of the Expenses Fund established pursuant to the 32nd Section of the Union of Benefices Measure, 1923.

"4. That with the consents of John Francis William Deacon, of Mabledon Park, Quarry Hill, Tonbridge, in the County of Kent, Esquire; the Venerable Ernest Newton Sharpe, Archdeacon of London; the Reverend Canon John Ralph Strickland Taylor, Principal of Wycliffe Hall in the University of Oxford; the

Reverend William Leonard Bertram Caley, of Salisbury Square, in the City of London, Clerk in Holy Orders, and Mervyn Gurney Talbot-Rice, of Number 88, Leadenhall Street, in the said City of London, Esquire, as the Patrons of the Rectory of the said Parish of Ipswich, Saint Clement, and also as the Patrons of the Rectory of the said Parish of Ipswich, Saint Helen, with the consent of the Reverend John Christopher Knapp, being the present In-cumbent of the said Rectory of the Parish of Ipswich, St. Clement, and with the consent of the Reverend Llewelyn Cradock Roberts, being the present Incumbent of the said Rectory of the Parish of Ipswich, St. Helen (all which consents are testified by the signing of this Scheme by the consenting parties) upon the union taking effect there shall be transferred for all ecclesiastical purposes to the said Parish of Ipswich, Saint Mary at the Quay, (a) all that detached portion of the said Parish of Ipswich, Saint Helen, which lies to the west of Foundation Street, (b) all that said Extra Parochial Place called or known as Shire Hall Yard and (c) all that portion of the said Parish of Ips-wish, Saint Clement, which lies to the north-west of the middle of Salthouse Street and to the south-west of the middle of Fore Street.

"Provided always that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from making any other recommendations and proposals relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Measures, or of any other Measure of the National Assembly of the Church of England, or of any Act of Parliament."

And whereas drafts of the said Scheme have been duly published in accordance with the provisions of the said Measures, and Notices have been transmitted to the persons or bodies, entitled under the said Measures to receive Notice requiring any objections to such draft Scheme to be stated or transmitted in writing to the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners within the time prescribed in the Statutory Rules applicable to proceedings under the said Measures:

And whereas an objection has been so stated or transmitted to the said Ecclesiastical Comcissioners within the time prescribed in the same Rules:

And whereas the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners after giving full consideration to such objection have deemed right to make no alterations in such draft Scheme:

And whereas public notice of the certification to His Majesty in Council of the said Scheme and the consent thereto in writing of the Bishop of Saint Edmundsbury and Ipswich has been duly given in the manner and within the time prescribed in the Statutory Rules aforesaid:

And whereas no appeal has been made to His Majesty in Council within the period of one month after the date of the said public notice in accordance with the provisions of the said Measures against the said Scheme or any part thereof by any person who has made objection as aforesaid to the said draft Scheme:

And whereas the said Scheme has been approved by His Majesty in Council:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to affirm the said Scheme and to order that the Benefices therein recommended to be united
