Madrid; April 1. N.S.

HE King of Spain has not yet disposed of the Office of President of the Indies, vacant by the Death of the Count of Andanero, for which there are divers Candidates; the chief of whom are the Conde d'Aguilar, and the Duke d'Uzeda, the former supported by the Almirante of Castile, and the latter by the Conde d'Oropesa. It's faid, the Duke de Moles, late Ambassador from this Crown to the State of Venice, will be made Superintendant of the King's Revenues. The Marquis dos Rios, whom the King has appointed to be his Ambassador to the French Court, has received Orders to hasten his departure, and will leave this Place about a fortnight hence. Our Letters from Cadiz. of the 20th of March fay, the Experiment Galley arrived there the 18th from the Canaries, and brings an Account, that Captain Warren, with the Squadron of Men of War under his Command, had touched at the Madera's, and having supplied themselves with Wine and fresh Provisions, proceeded on their Voyage to the East-Indies. The Poole Man of War, Captain Granby Commander, arrived at Cadiz the 20th from Cruizing on the Coast of Sally. The Coventry and Sorlingues are gone from thence to the Streights. Don Pimien-:a, lately made Governor of Carthagena, departed from Cadiz the last week with two Men of War and a Petache, bound to Carthagens, having on board a Reinforcement of 500 Soldiers, and a Supply of Provisions and Ammunition for that Garrison. They write from Malaga, that the Stratford Frigat, the London Merchant, the Anne Galley, the Morley Galley, and the Quaker Ketch, arrived there the 21st past from England; and on the 21st have a fine fight the 24th, two English Men of War came in fight of that Place, but soon after stood off again to

Rome, April 4. A Consistory was held last Mondinals Arguin and Morigia. There have been several Meetings at this Court, to regulate some Matters of Ceremony between the Queen-Dowager of Polind, and the Cardinals and other Prelates; And tis agreed, that in the Visits which the Cardinals make her than Stall he allowed Chairs to Gron make her, they shall be allowed Chairs to sit on, as was practifed when the late Queen Christina of Sweden was here; But the Cardinals further demand, That the same be not allowed to Ambas-Edors, and that they may only have a Stool, which it's faid the Ambassadors will not con-

sters to acquaint them therewith. Yesterday died here Signior Farsetti, who was esteemed the richest Prelate at this Court; by his Death are become vacant the Office of Clerk of the Chamber to the Pope, and several other very profitable Places; It's thought, Signior Zaudedari will succeed him as Clerk of the Chamber.

Signior Carlo Pisani, Prove-Venice, April 10. ditor-General, or Admiral of the Venetian Fleer, having served the two Years for which time that Office is usually given, has, according to Custom, refigned the same, and Signior Antonio Nani is chofen to succeed him. Signior Grimani is gone from hence for Dalmatia, to confer with the Turkish Commissioners, in order to settle the Limits between the Dominions of this State and those of the Grand Signior. We had a Report some weeks ago, that there was a Contagious Sickness in Dode matia, upon which our Magistrates gave Orders for all Ships coming from thence to observe a strict Quarantain; but having fince received certain Advice that this was a groundless Report, the said Order is taken off. They write from Dalmatia, that the Turks in those Parts having received an Account of the Conclusion of the Peace, and that several small Places are by the Treaty to be restored to them, they sent to the Venetians, and demanded, that they might be immediately delivered up; to which Answer being made, That this could not be done till fuch time as the Limits were fettled by the Commissioners who are to meet for that purpose; The Turks thereupon assembled some Troops together, and would have forced their Passage into the said Places, but the Morlacks on that Frontier drawing into a Body, marched against the Turks, and obliged them to retire with the loss of about 600 of their Men.

Warfaw, April 8. The King continues his Re-folution of holding a General Diet here on the 15th of June; And we hear from feveral Parts of Poland and Lithuania, that the Lesser or Provincial Diets are already men to chuse their Depu-ties to be sent to the said General Diet. The Senate have met several times about the Affair of Elbing; And tho some of the Senators look upon the Honour of this Crown to be so much concerned therein, that they think a War ought to be immediately declared against the Elector of Brandenburgh; yet others, and those the greater Number, are for more moderate Counsels, and are of opinion, That they ought first to try the Success of the Treaty, which is proposed to be set on foot for this purpose; and which in all probability will now in a short time be begun at Danctent to, and they have writ to their feveral Ma. zick, and it's hoped will be brought to a happy
