

Conclusion by the good Offices of the several Princes who have offered their Mediation. The Sieur *Goleczinsky*, who was sent some time ago with the Character of the King's Envoy Extraordinary to the Pope, and several other Princes of *Italy*, is returned hither, and has given the King an Account of his Negotiations.

Vicma, April 11. The meeting of the General Diet of *Hungary* at *Presburgh* is put off till the latter end of next Summer; and it's said, that in the mean time the Emperor will appoint Commissioners to settle divers Matters relating to that Kingdom; and that, among other Regulations they are to make, there will be one for removing the Imperial Chamber, and the other Chief Courts of Justice, from *Presburgh* to *Buda*, which Place is looked upon to be more convenient for this purpose, being situated in the midst of that Kingdom. It's thought, Count *Osting*, the Emperor's Ambassador to the Port, will scarce begin his Journey thither before next *August*, this Court desiring that the Conference at *Carlowitz*, for settling the Limits between the two Empires, may first be ended. The Emperor has appointed the Count *de Hoyos* to go with the Character of his Envoy to the Duke of *Modena*. The Dutchess-Dowager of *Havover* is now on her Journey to *Modena*, accompanied by the Count of *Gersdorf* and several of the Emperor's Servants, who are to attend her as far as *Roveredo*.

Huger, April 24. The Baron of *Caunitz*, Envoy Extraordinary from the Elector of *Brandenbourg*, had this day his Audience of Leave of the States-General, being introduced by the Heer *Bergefeyne*, and the Heer *Van Schurmans*, two of their Body, with the usual Ceremonies. Monsieur *Galdernalsin*, who is going for *England* to succeed the Heer *Cleverkiske*, Ambassador from the States-General to His Majesty of *Great Britain*, is to leave this place next *Tuesday*. The Count *de Gulsar* is shortly expected here in his way to *Sweden*, where he is going to reside with the Character of Ambassador from the Most Christian King, in the room of the Count *d'Avoux*, who is returning home. A Courier came hither this week from *Paris*, with some Dispatches to Monsieur *de Bonreps*, concerning the Tarffe between the French and the Dutch, which he has a Commission to adjust.

Paris, April 25. N.S. His Excellency the Earl of *Tersy* had yesterday his Audience of Leave of the Duke and Dutchess of *Orleans*, at the Palace Royal, being introduced by Monsieur *Zubert*, Intendant of Ambassadors to the Duke of *Orleans*. The Ambassador of *Morocco's* Audience of Leave, which was appointed for *Wednesday* last, is put off till to-morrow. Six French Frigats are appointed to Cruise on the Coast of *Barbary*, under the Command of Monsieur *de Reinguen*, who has Orders, in case the Emperor of *Morocco* does not agree to the Propositions made to his Ambassador by this Court, to fall upon the *Seymen*, and renew the War, so soon as the Truce shall be expired. Two Men of War are appointed to cruise from *Toulon* to *Taxe y Monneur de Ferole*, whom the King has named to be his Ambassador to the Port. The Dutchess of *Lotaring* being with Child, the Dutchess of *Orleans*, her Mother, designs about six weeks hence to go and visit her, which the Duke of *Orleans*, her Brother, intends to do the next week. The Dutchess of *Portland* will go in two or three days to the Waters at *Bourbon*, where the Duke her Husband, and the Princess of *Conty*, intend to sojourn about a Month hence. The Government of *New-France*, vacated by the Death of Monsieur *de Frontenac*, who died in *November* last at *Quebec* in *Canada*, is given to the Chevalier *de Celliers*, Brother to Monsieur *Celliers*, late Plenipotentiary of this Court at the Treaty of *Ryswick*.

Whitehall, April 17. The King has been graciously pleased to confer the Dignity of a *Baronet* of this Kingdom upon *John Stanley*, of *Grange*.
