Madrid, July 2. N.S.

**T**HE King of Spain was somewhat out of order on the 26th of the last Month, but having taken what was prescribed by his Physicians, this light Indisposition is gone off again, and his Majesty is now very well. He has appointed Commissioners to consider of the Proposals made by the States of the Spanish Netherlands for improving the Trade of those Countries, who are the Count de Monterey, Don Juan de Leyseca and Don Alexander Del Mier Counsellors in the Council of Castile, and the Marquis de Castel Moncaio and the Sieur Elsin Counsellors in the Supreme Council of Flanders. Don Melchior de Portocarrero is continued for three years in his Government of Peru; and the Count of Eril, who was named to be his Successor, is made Governor of Cadiz. The Flota bound to New-Spain, will depart from Cadiz in a few days; and 'tis said, the Galleons are to sail in the Month of October. We hear from the Coast of Gibraltar, that Preparations are making there for relieving the Town of Ceuta, which is still besieged by the Moors.

**Genoa, July 5.** Signior Justiniani returned hither on the 26th past from England, where he has resided with the Character of Envoy Extraordinary from this Republick. Divers Ships are come hither with Corn from Sicily, and other Parts. The Squadron of Gallies commanded by the Duke of Tursis sailed from hence last week for Barcelona. The four French Gallies that attended the Prince of Monaco in his Passage to Civita-Vecchia, returned hither the 2d Instant, and this day they sailed again for Marseilles. The Gallies of Malta are abroad, cruizing against the Ships of Tunis and Tripoli.

**Warsaw, July 4.** The Diet, after having spent several days in Disputes about the Choice of a Marshal, came at last to an Agreement therein on the first Instant, when they Elected the Sieur Slaka the Crown Referendarius, and the Staff was accordingly delivered to him by the Sieur Minski, Marshal of the former Diet. The 2d being a Holiday, the Diet did not meet; Yesterday the Deputies with their new Marshal were to have waited upon the King to kiss his Hand according to Custom, but those of Great Poland and Lithuania desired first, the King would give a Declaration in writing, that the German Forces which are quartered in Lithuania, and near this City, shall be sent away; And the Marshal of the former Diet was ordered to represent the same to him. The Cardinal Primate had yesterday a private Audience of the King, which lasted above two hours. 'Tis said, the King has sent

Orders to the Saxon Troops now in Lithuania, to march to Germany.

**Vienna, July 8.** Prince Eugene of Savoy intends shortly to go to Hungary, to visit the new Fortifications that are making at Buda, Esbeck, Arat, and other Frontier Places; and in the mean time divers Engineers are sent thither, to give Directions for carrying on these Works, and the Imperial Forces to be employed therein are drawing together. The Conferences in Hungary for settling the Limits are discontinued for the present, the Imperial and Turkish Commissioners expecting further Orders touching the Difficulties about the Town of Novi, and some other little Places on the Frontier, which it's believed will be soon accommodated. The Count d'Ottling is preparing for his Embassy to the Port, intending to begin his Journey thither about six weeks hence; he will go by the Danube as far as Rus beyond Nicapolis, and from thence by Land to Constantinople; Count Charles Lodowick of Sinzendorf is to accompany him, and to remain at the Port with the Character of Ambassador in Ordinary when Count Otting comes away. The Envoys from the Duke of Savoy, and the Electors Palatine and Triers, who were sent hither to Congratulate the King and Queen of the Romans on their Marriage, have had their Audiences of Leave, and are now returning home.

**Francfort, July 15.** It's said, Prince Lewis of Baden has received Orders from the Emperor, to give the necessary Directions for demolishing the remaining Arches of the Bridge over the Rhine near Brisack, the French having declared they are ready to evacuate that Town as soon as this Work is finished. The Castle of Heidelberg is fitting up for the Elector Palatine, who is expected there towards the latter end of the next Month. His Electoral Highness's Troops continue encamped near Mannheim, being employed in repairing the Fortifications of that Place. They write from Strasbourg, that the Marquis d'Uxelles having viewed the Fortifications of that Place, as likewise of Landau and Fort-Louis, is gone to visit the Fortifications of Hummingen, and other Places in Upper-Alsace.

**Brussels, July 21.** The Count de Prela, Ambassador from the Duke of Savoy to His Majesty of Great-Britain, is on his departure from this Place for Loo. The Count de Beygeick, who has for some time had the chief Direction of the King of Spain's Revenues in these Countries, will likewise shortly leave this Place and repair to Madrid, pursuant to the Orders he has lately received from thence. They write from the French Conquests, that they are going to add some new Works to the Fortifications of Winczberg.

1699, July 21. The King returned hither last Saturday from Dieren. The Earl of Rochefort, and Monsieur Geldermalsen Envoy Extraordinary from the States-General to His Majesty, are come to this Place from Zuysestein. The Earl of Albemarle is gone to the Hague to take his Place in the College of the Nobles; The Count de Dona, Envoy from the Elector of Brandenburg, is also returned to the Hague.

Hague, July 21. The States of Holland and West-Friseland met this day. The Heer Dyckvelt, who has lately been very much indisposed, is perfectly recovered, and is now at Utrecht. The Sieur Schuyman, Commissioner-General of the Admiralty in Friseland, is gone to wait upon His Majesty at Loo. The Sieur Galezki Ambassador from Poland, and the Sieur Gersdorf Resident from that Crown, having spent the last week at Amsterdam, to which Place they came from Loo, are returned hither. The Baron of Preylmeyer is shortly expected here from Brussels with the Character of Envoy Extraordinary from the Elector of Bavaria.

Paris, July 22. N. S. The Court continues at Madi, and will not return to Versailles till Saturday next. Monsieur Vauban has been to visit the Fortifications of Lisse, Ipres, and Furnes, and is gone to Dunkirke to do the like. The Letters from Havre de Grace say, two great Merchant Ships were arrived there from the Streights, being laden with Corn; which Supply comes very seasonably, Bread continuing very dear in most of the Provinces of this Kingdom.

Bristol, July 12. Yesterday came in here the Expedition, Capt. Christopher Scandred Commander, from Virginia, the Hope of Corke from Bilbao, and the Patience of Mynhead from Barbadoes. This day arrived here the Richard and Mary, William Franklyn Commander, from Virginia.

Deal, July 15. Yesterday Rear-Admiral Hobson, with a Squadron of His Majesty's Ships under his Command, sailed from the Downes to the Westward.

Westminster, July 13. The Parliament met this day, and was further Prorogued to the 24th of August next.
