The KING has been graciously pleased to
 approve the following awards in recognition of
 gallantry displayed in flying operations against
 the enemy:—

Bar to Distinguished Flying Cross.

Flight Lieutenant John Easton McFALL, D.F.C.
 (40181), No. 6 Squadron.

In May, 1941, during the enemy advance
 in Libya, this officer performed splendid work
 in conveying vital information to the various
 commanders. During the action he landed
 beside a battery of artillery which, by his
 timely warning, was able to move to a better
 position. Flight Lieutenant McFall dis-
 played outstanding gallantry and devotion to
 duty throughout a difficult period.

Bar to Distinguished Flying Cross.

Pilot Officer Arthur John HODGKINSON,
 D.F.C. (45333), No. 219 Squadron.

Bar to the Distinguished Flying Medal.

Pilot Officer Hodgkinson and Sergeant Dye
 have flown together in many night fighting
 operations as pilot and wireless operator re-
 spectively. Both have displayed exceptional
 skill and keenness which, combined with ex-
 cellent team work, has resulted in the destruc-
 tion of at least 6 enemy aircraft at night.

Distinguished Flying Cross.

Squadron Leader Arthur Thomas Drake
 SANDERS (33095), No. 264 Squadron.

This officer has taken part in many opera-
 tional missions against the enemy. On one
 occasion he carried out a very fine recon-
 naissance of Wilhelmshaven in the face of
 intense anti-aircraft opposition and under
 appalling weather conditions. As a squadron
 commander he has proved himself to be a
 fine leader and a determined pilot who has
 contributed in a large measure to the many
 successes obtained by his squadron. He has
 recently destroyed two enemy aircraft at
 night.

Acting Squadron Leader Ronald Ogilvy
 Maurice GRAHAM (72159), Royal Air Force
 Volunteer Reserve, No. 101 Squadron.

In May, 1941, this officer led a formation
 of aircraft which attacked a convoy of enemy
 shipping near Boulogne. Although the con-
 voy was sailing within the protective range
 of its own land anti-aircraft defences Squad-
 ron Leader Graham brilliantly executed a
 most determined attack. In the face of in-
 tense fire from the convoy escorting vessels
 and land defences, he descended to an ex-
 tremely low level and obtained two direct hits
 on the largest vessel in the convoy. It was
 subsequently learned that this vessel was
 sunk. On a previous occasion he commanded
 a flight which operated with much success
 against enemy shipping. Squadron Leader
 Graham has carried out numerous operational
 missions and throughout has displayed great
 leadership, courage and determination.
