The Prince Palatin Jean Adelphe de Deux ponts, Brother to the late King of Swedeland having fome pretenfions upon the Count de Leiningen one of the four Prefidents of the Imperial Chamber, waving the ordinary ways of Juftice, allaulted lately the fatd Count in his Caffle of Oberbroa with a party of ς or 600 Horfe and D. agoons, but the Count making a flour refiftance killed about 20 of his men, whereupon he commanded to fet fare to the Caftle at the four corners; the Count made his efcape out of the houle, leaving all his rich Furniture, Plate and other Goo s to the rage of the Soldiers, who there committed many dilorders.

From *Ratisbonne* they tell us, that the Diet is there prolonged for three moneths, and that they are falling upon the confideration of matters of great importance.

Paris, April 6. From Marfeilles we have confirmed to us the report from the Coafts of Barbary of the inhuma e dealing of these Tu ks with our Couful G. orge Durant, whom after feveral torments they burnt alive, with another Merchant his correspondent, upon pretence of a plot against the Government, feiling upon all our ships with their lading which could be found in their Port, with such other Goods and Merchandifes as were laden upon other ships on any French accoun, with all the Magazines and Stores of our Merchants, for which 'tis believed they may in little time be defired to give fatisfaction.

His Majesty has ordered all the Officers of his Forces defigned for the inccour of *Candia* immediately to depirt h nee for *Thoulon* in order to their imbarcation, whither the Duke de Navailles allo the General may in few days fet forwards

From Rochello we are adviled that the Count de Grance fome days fince pix to fea with three men of W.r, and fince the Sieur Gabaret with the like number, both if them defigned for the voyage to the Levant, though ordered to put in by the way at Portugal, whether a perfor is employed from this Court to compliment the Prince Regent with his Princels upon the late birth of a Daughter. From Breft they tell us of the arrival there the 23 path of the Sieur du Quefne, Lieutenant General of the lea-forces, who is to take polleting of the Prince a man of War of 70 Guns, and to command a imall iquadron for the guard of the fea-Coafts, to which are to be added two other ships which are now forwardly upon the stocks, to carty so Guas apiece, befides which are building there fome other thips of confiderable bulk and ftrength, whereof one to be of the fame fize with the Royal Louis, near finished at Thoulon, and to carry 1 20 Guns ; they are there bufily imployed about their Key, whereon are to fland about 30 Magazines for the ftoring, Furniture, and Building of thips.

The Count de Schomberg has lately publishe at Charenton his Matriage with Ma iamoiselle d' Aumale of the House d' Aucour, to whom His Majetty has been pleased in favour to the Count, as a Grand of Portugal, to give her the Priviledge of a Stool before the Queen, and to enter the Louvre in her Coach as a Dutchels; but will not have it pis into an Example. The Count with his Lady will by His Majeefties direction pals (ud.'enly into Portugal; to whole care will be committed the Concernments of the French Intereft in that Kingdom.

The 2d inftant the Marqu's de Gefures Captain of His Majesties Guards, was received as Duke and Peer in Parliament, upon the refignation of the Duke de Irefne his Father.

On Sunday 'aft departed hence the Count d' Harach, well fatisfied with his reception, having been preferred the day before his departure with His Majeflies Picture fet with Diamonds, to the value of 1 5000 Livres.

His Majefly is refolved to take away the Priviledge of Noblefs from all his Courts Soveraign, particularly from his Parliaments, Chambers des Comptes, and Courts of Aids and Moneys, unlefs the perfons pretending to it, canmake out their posseffion of fuch Charges for three defcents in a right line. Letters of the 20th path from Madrid, inform us, that the Cardinal d' Arragon after tome dayes private Conference with Don Juan at Guadalaxara, was returned with a Letter from Don Juan to the Queen Regent, in fubmitfive and respectful language, but in the end preffing her for the banishment of the Prefident of Caffille as a Creature of Father Nithard's; but whereas the Marquis d' Aytona. had also shown his inclinations to the interests of the taid Confessor, he had to great an effect for his person, that he should willingly forger what had been pait, and defire his fair correspondency and friendship; to which purpose be had particularly addressed another Letter to the Marquis himself.

From S:. Sebiftian Letters of the 23th paft tell us, that the Cohleffor was then there, expecting the arrival of feveral Coaches fent from Burdeaux to attend him; feveral Coaches are also hired and fent away from hence to conduct him hirber on his way for Vienna.

From the Netherlands we are told, that 20 foldiers of the Garrifon of Armentiers belonging to leveral Companies, having defarted their Colours, went together to Dixmuid, where offe ing their fervice, they were readily entertained by a Spanish Captain, and were marching thence with their Captain for fome other Spanish Garrifon 3 of which timely notice being given, 12 of their Officers from Armentiers went out, attended them on their march, charging them with fuch vigor, that they were prefently forced to render themfelves to their Officers : who carried them back with them, leaving the Spanish Captain, who made the greateft refiftance, dend upon the place.

Several hundred Malons and o her Labourers are lately fent to Aeth and other places of the New Longuest in the Netherlands, to work at the Fortifications.

Tarmouth Mars. 29. This day came into this Road a fhip of this Town from Marfeilles, her lading moltly B inftone and Almonds bound for Hambourgh; by a Merchant of this place arriving upon lier from the tame place we are informed, that off the North Cape they met with an Algier man of War of 36 Guns, who fent their boac aboard them, and made a ftrick fearch, but that the Mafter of this fhip and this Merchant going aboard the Turks map of War were civily Treated, and olfered a fupply of any necessfaries they could furnish them with, excusing the frickness of the fearch upon leveral abules put upon them by fuch of their Enemies as had pretended their fhips and goods to have been English. Lyme, Murch 29. Yefterday arrived here the Fellomfhip of this place in 9 weeks from Jamaica, informing us of the thiving condition of the Illiand; but tellingue, that on the 2d of January laft the Oxford Fregate was near Hifpaniola by fome misfortune blown up, with about 200 men aboard her and fome Officers.

Whitehall, March 31. His Majefty having been advertifed, that great quantities of Corn and Grain are imported, and more intended to be imported into his King-, dom of England, whereby the l berty for Transportation of C rn will be rendred useles to His Majesties Subjects, the Markets clogg'd, and the Corn of the Growth of this Kingdom under-fold, to the great discoursgement of Tillage and Husbandry, and diminution and sbatement of the Kents and Revenues of this Kingdom ; was gracioully pleased the 29th inst nt , with the advice of his Privy Council, to order his Proclamation to be iffued out : firictly torbidding and prohibiting all perfons whatfoever, Aliens and Denizens, and all other his Subjects, from and af er the publication of the faid Proclamation, to import or caufe to be imported into any part or place of this Kingdom any foreign Corn or Grain, of what nature or kind loever ; or to utter, barter, or fell the same, until His Majestics Plessure shall be declared, or other Order taken; upon pain of forfeiting all that by Law is forfeitable, and fuch pther punishment as by the Prerogative Royal may be iqflicted upon the Contemners of His Majeflies Royal Aythority.

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
