

Frankfort, August 8. The Disturbances which were like to have happened in our Neighbourhood, on the occasion of the Disputes between the Landgrave of Hesse-Darmstadt and the Count of Nassau Weylbourg, are happily prevented by the Interposition of the neighbouring Princes, and the Landgrave and the Count have agreed to abstain from all Hostilities, and to submit the decision of their Difference to the imperial Chamber at Weizelaer; And accordingly the Troops of the Elector Palatine, which were marching to the Count's Assistance, passed yesterday through this Place in their return to Mannheim. We have received Advice, that the Elector Palatine is come to Coblenz to visit the Elector of Trier, and intends in few days to continue his Journey from thence to Weizelaer.

Hamburg, August 11. We have an Account from Holstein, that the Swedish Troops which marched from Wisnar on the 4th Instant, came to Kiel the 7th, and continuing their march, arrived the next day at Husum, and yesterday at Tonningen; And that the Duke of Holstein's Forces, to the number of about 5000 Men, were drawing together in order to join them. The Danish Forces that are quartered about Glückstadt and Itzehoe have not yet begun to move, but have Orders to be in a readiness to march on the first Notice they shall receive.

Loos, August 14. The Differences between the States-General, and the Elector Palatine and the Bishop of Munster, concerning the County of Bentheim, being accommodated, the Baron de Vahlen, Envoy from the Bishop of Munster, left this Place on Wednesday last in order to his return home.

Hague, August 14. The States-General have sent a Letter to the Elector of Brabant, to Congratulate him on the Birth of his Son. A Gentleman belonging to Don Quiros, the Spanish Ambassador, arrived here yesterday from Brussels, being sent to the Baron of Lillieroot, Ambassador from Sweden, with a very fine Jewel which the King of Spain has presented him with, for the Pains he took in the Mediation of the Peace of Ryswick. The Count de Tallard, Ambassador from France to His Majesty of Great-Britain, is come hither from Utrecht, and has taken a House in the Neighbourhood of this Place, where he intends to reside during His Majesty's stay at Loos.

Paris, August 15. N. S. The Court is returned from Marli to Versailles, where his Excellency the Earl of Manchester, Ambassador Extraordinary from His Majesty of Great-Britain, is to have a private Audience of the King to-morrow. The King's Statue was erected on Thursday last in the Place of Louis the Great with a great deal of Solemnity, and in the evening there was a very fine Firework. The Duchess of Orleans's Journey to Lorraine is quite off. The King has sent Orders to the Marquis d'Uxelles to march with some Forces into the Palatinate, unless the Elector Palatine complies with the Payment of the 200000 Livres, which he is to give yearly to the Duchess of Orleans till her Pretensions on the Palatinate be adjusted.

Plymouth, August 6. His Majesty's Ship the Bridgwater and Discovery sailed from hence last Thursday for Ireland; The Friendship of this place, John Salmon Master, and the Rebecca of Southampton, Robert Winter Master, sailed from hence the same day for Cadiz, and the Hopeful Galley, Thomas Bæren Master, for Oporto. The George, Thomas Blake Master, arrived here yesterday from Virginia. This day came in the Antegoa Merchant, Anthony Herwant Master, and the Hopeful, Thomas Luzenbary Master, both bound from London to New-England.
