The KING has been graciously pleased to approve the following awards in recognition of gallantry displayed in flying operations against the enemy:

## Distinguished Service Order.

Acting Wing Commander Leslie Vero Everest

ATKINSON, D.F.C. (39407), No. 82 Squadron. In June, 1941, this officer carried out a low-flying attack on the Tripoli-Homs road demolishing a large factory. The following day he led a most determined attack on shipping in Tripoli harbour. As a result a 20,000 ton liner and a 12,500 ton motor vessel were severely damaged, while the complete har-bour organisation was disrupted; all the remaining ships sailed away later in the day. Wing Commander Atkinson also led successful attack on an aerodrome ten miles west of Tripoli causing large fires and ex-Amongst other damage inflicted, five aircraft were destroyed on the ground. This officer has proved himself to be a fearless operational pilot and has been responsible for the destruction of many thousands of tons He is a magnificent of enemy shipping. leader whose courage and determination have been of the highest order.

## Distinguished Flying Medal.

550557 Sergeant James Samuel Sargent, No. 82 Squadron.

In June, 1941, Flight Lieutenant Watkins and Sergeant Sargent were pilot and observer respectively of an aircraft which participated in an attack on an enemy convoy off Lampedusa. Attacking a 6,000 ton mer-chant ship in the face of heavy anti-aircraft fire, Flight Lieutenant Watkins was severely wounded in the legs during his run over the target. Nevertheless, he pressed home his attack, mast high, scoring hits on the objective. Enemy fighters then engaged his aircraft but, by skilful manœuvring, he enabled his rear gunner to resist the attackers. On the return journey, Flight Lieutenant Watkins fell into a stupor as a result of his wounds and Sergeant Sargent, who was unable to call the air gunner as the inter-
