Vienna, Mart. 22. On Sunday 12st in the afternoon Collonel Pio drew up his Regiment of Foot confifting of 900 from men, in the Court of the Pallace in presence of the Emperour, who immediately began their march for Hungary, that Kingdom being now convinced of the necessity of having a force sent to defend them against the injuries of the lunks, and willing to receive an affiliance of Twelve thouland mens and accordingly several Regiments ate in readiness to march upon their fi st Orders: In the mean time His Imperial Majesty has nominated several perfens as his Commissioners to be sent into Upper Hungary, to whom he has lat ly added the Chancellour of Hungary and the Count de Rothal, who are instructed and furnished with sufficient Powers for the composing of all rifferences and disputes; the Emperour has also given, strict charge to all his Governours that they forbear to exact any thing upon that people, fince they have in testimony of their obedience complyed with his defires in admitting of the forces which are lending for the prefervation of that Countrey, against any attempts that might be feared from the Turks.

From Hungary they write of many prodigious sights which have appeared in the Air about two hours before the Sunariling, of which the people make leveral observations, and are in great apprehensions. They farther tell as that a great many of the Turks are got together about Zatinar, and that they have killed many Christians at

By the fame ships we are advised, that two Merchant ships and a Brigantine were lately cast away by storm in the Archipelage, all of them laden for Italy, confirming to us our former advices that the Captain of our Fleet Morofini having safely landed a very considerable fuccour of men and other necessaries in Candia, was with a squadron of stout ships gone to cruise about Morea to attend the passage of several ships of Barbary laden with succours of Men and Provisions for the relief of the Visiers Army intended for Caneus, and that there was a warm report that they had taken five of them and funk divers others, and had taken so ne hundreds of slaves, of which we expect a farther confirmation.

Upon information brought that 7 or 8000 French were upon their match towards planders, Orders were immediately dispatcht to all the Towns and Garrisons under the Spanish jurisdiction on that side, that they should be careful upon their Guards, so as not to lay a temptation before the French to invite them to attempt a surprize, and the Count de Salazar is to morrow to depart hence to take care of his Government of Truges.

Yesterday arrived here the Duke de Aerschot f.om Mons: 'ris believed the Prince de Aremberg may be suddenly recolled from his Government of the County of Burgundy, and the Comm nder File Keufue a Bourguignon sent Governour in his place, the better to comply with the hum urs of that people, in committing the case of them to

a person of their own Countrey.

The report which has for some time been received in France for currant, that the Duke of Lorrain had some intentions to refign his Government in favour to His mon Christian Majesty, proves but an empty rumour without any sounda ior. The Prince de Vaudemont has concluded a Martiage with Madamoiselle d' Elboeuf, and intends to folemnize it at Nancy wheehe now is, and from whence Father Nicholas Richard departed the 26th paft with the fumme of Two hundred thousand Crowns for the Prince Charles of Lorrain for the advancement of his pretentions to the Crown of Poland; greater fummes being promised upon his Election; the Duke of Lorrain has fent hither an Agent whom he formerly employed in his affairs at Ratisbonne, but the business of his negotia-

tion has it not yet made publick.

Eruges, April 7. The many Convoys which daily arrive from France, at Doudy, and other places of their late Conque its, with their great provisions of all forts of necesfaries for the War, keeps us every where on our Guards, and gives us jealousies lest the. Paris, April 10. By the way of Marfeilles we have Letters from Conftantinop'e which advile us, that the Sicut

d' Almeras arriving besore the City with three stout men of war, had cast anchor at the point of the Seraglio without entring farther, where he continued for e dayes, though with some difficulty and hazard, the Cuttent being there very violent, infomuch that several of their Cables broke, and the ships fell foul one of another with some damages that upon his arrival, the Sieur de la Haye the French Amballador lent his compliments to him, inviting him on shoar with his Officers, which he refuted, informing the faid Ambassador that his Orders would not permit him to leave his ship till he had first delivered him his aispatches, which he defired he would receive from his own hand aboard his ship, which the Ambassador sher some farther messages past between them complyed with: after some private conferences and the receipt of His Majesties Orders, the Ambassador returned again to his house, and immediately gave Order for the Imbarking of his Family, himself coming privately aboard, and set sail the 16th of February on his return homewards.

The Duke de Navailles has taken his leave of his Majesty in Order to his voyage for the Levant, and this day or to morrow fets forwards for Thoulen, but intends to pass by his own Estate in Guienne, which will

somewhat lengthen his journey.

His Majesty has lately written to the Great Master of Maltha, desiring him that the Chevalier de Vendosme, in regard of his Birth, Dignity and Meri s, might succeed in the charge of Great Prior of France, attenthe decease of the Commander de Louure; the Count de St. Paul was much fatisfied with his reception and entertainment he found at Maltha, from whence he was attended

into Sicily by two of their Gallies.

From Nancy we are told, that the Duke of Lorrain having ordered the Contract of marriage to be drawn up between the Prince de Vaudemont his Natural Son, and Madamoiselle d'Elboeuf, had himself signed it, desiring allo the Prince François his Brother, and Father to Prince Charles, to do the like; which he refusing because of the great advantages given by it to the Prince of Vaudemont, the Dake has so much resented it, that he has written into Germany to Countermand those returns of Moneys which were ordered and fetled by him for the advancement of the interest and pretentions of Prince Charles to his Election as successor to the Crown of Poland.

Salisbury, April 2. The 27th past, His Highness the Prince of Tufcany left Plymouth, and lay the rext night at Exceter, where he was complimented and attended by the Mayor and his Brethren, from thence he went the 29th to Exminfler, the 30th to Georgeington, and the next day to Dorchester; yesterday he arrived here, where he was attended by the Earl of Fembroke, with the Mayor and Aldermen in their habits.
