Madrid, Sept. 24. N. S.

THE King of Spain continues in very good Health, and went from hence this day with the Queen and the whole Court to the *Escorial*, where their Majesties intend to stay about 6 weeks. The Countess of *Berlipsis* is gone thither with the Court, and it's said, her Journey to Germany is put off for some time. The Cardinal de *Cordova* died here this week, after a few days Sickness, in the 46th year of his Age, and his Place of Inquisitor-General of Spain is given to Don *Balthazar Mendocça* Bishop of *Segovia*. The King has given the Order of the Golden Fleece to the Count of *Staremberg*, one of the Great Officers of the Emperor's Court. The Duke de *St. Juan* is made Vice-Roy of *Sardinia*, and the Marquis de *Villagarcia* Vice-Roy of *Valencia*. They write from *Cadix*, that the Ships which are fitting out there, in order to be sent with a Supply of Men, Arms and Ammunition to *Carthage* in the *West-Indies*, would be ready to sail in few days. The Count d'*Uzeda* is appointed to go to *Rome* with the Character of Ambassador from this Crown, and will begin his Journey thither in few days.

Venice, Septemb. 25. Signior *Soranzo*, Ambassador from this Republick to the Port, set sail on the 25th Instant for *Constantinople*. It's said, the Senate have sent Orders to Signior *Cornaro*, Captain-General of their Forces in the *Lewant*, to send hither three Regiments of the *Venetian* Troops now in the *Morea*, which are to be quartered in the Dominions of this Republick in *Italy*; and that as soon as the Fortresses of *Lepanto* and *Preveza* are demolished and evacuated by the *Venetians*, pursuant to the Treaty of *Carlowitz*, the Captain-General will come into the Gulph of *Venice* with part of the *Venetian* Fleet. A Merchant Ship, named the *Provident*, arrived here last Tuesday from *Smyrna*, the Commander of which says, That in his Voyage hither he met the Captain-General with part of the *Venetian* Fleet sailing towards *Corigo*. Our last Letters from *Andrinople* give an Account, that the Grand Signior being on his departure from thence for *Constantinople*, the Janizaries and Spahis refused to attend him, demanding their Arrears and a certain Sum of Money, which it's customary for them to receive from the Grand Signior on his Accession to the Government, and which has not yet been given them by the present Sultan; So that the Grand Signior was obliged, before he could appease them, to cause part of their Arrears to be paid, and to promise that they should receive the rest, and the Bounty-money they desired, on their arrival at *Constantinople*; And that his Journey to *Constantinople* was put off for some days on this occasion. These Advices add, that the number of the *Arabs* near *Babylon* who are in Arms against the *Turks* was grown so considerable, that the Grand Signior's Forces not being able to encounter them in the open Field, had intrenched themselves under the Walls of *Babylon*; and that the Grand Signior having received an Account thereof, had resolved to send more Forces to their Assistance.

Warsaw, Sept. 21. The Senate of this Kingdom are frequently assembled, having under Consideration how to raise the Sums of Money that are necessary for satisfying what is due to the Elector of *Brandenburgh*, according to the Agreement lately made concerning the City of *Elbing*; For repairing the Fortifications of *Caminiec*, and providing it with Artillery and Ammunition; And for paying part of the Arrears due to the Armies of the Crown, and of *Lithuania*, before they go into Winter-Quarters. The Crown General is gone from hence to *Rusland*, to be present at the Evacuation of *Caminiec*, (which the *Bassa* has promised to deliver up to the *Polanders* in few days,) and to give Orders about quartering the Forces that are at present encamped on that Frontier. The Cardinal Primate is gone to *Radziewsky*, where he expects the King's Approbation of the Agreement lately concluded with the Resident of *Brandenburgh*, and it's said, that as soon as he has received it, a Treaty will be drawn up in due form, and signed by the Cardinal, and the other Ministers of this Court who were joined with him in this Negotiation, and by the Elector of *Brandenburgh's* Resident; The coming of the other Deputies his Electoral Highness intended to send hither not being thought necessary; seeing this Matter is already fully adjusted.

Copenhagen, Octob. 3. The Count de *Gulderlew* having resigned his Place of Vice-Roy of *Norway*, the King has given it to Prince *Charles* of *Denmark* his Brother, and has appointed Monsieur *Gabel*, one of his Council, to act in that Kingdom as Deputy under his Highness, who will continue to reside at Court. We hear that the *Swedes* have fitted out 12 Men of War, 4 Frigates, and some other Vessels, which it's thought are design'd to carry over some Forces to their Territories in *Germany*; The like Preparations are continued on this side, and it's said, the King has thoughts of taking into his Service some of the King of *Poland's* German Forces. The King has put off his Journey to *Holstein* till after the Funeral of the late King his Father, and his own Coronation. The young Count of *Rouvenlau* is sent to *Vienna* with some Instructions relating to the Affair of *Holstein*, which gives hopes, that the Negotiations now on foot for accommodating Matters between the King of *Denmark* and the Duke of *Holstein*, are drawing towards a good Conclusion. The Duke of *Wurtemberg* took yesterday a Review of the King's Regiment of Foot-Guards, consisting of 22 Companies, which he found in a very good Condition.

Vienna, Sept. 26. On the 24th Instant the Count of *Denbess*, Envoy Extraordinary from the Elector of *Brandenburgh*, had a Publick Audience of the Emperor at *Ebersdorf*, and received from him, in the Name of the Elector his Master, the Investiture of the Fiefs which his Electoral Highness holds of his Imperial Majesty. Yesterday the Imperial Court came to this City; and this day Count *Osting*, Ambassador from the Emperor to the Port, had his Audiences of Leave of the Emperor and Empress, the King and Queen of the *Romans*, and the Arch Duke and Arch-Duchess. He went to Court with the same Retinue and Equipage, as he designs to have when he makes his Entry into *Constantinople*; His Excellency's Led-Horses in rich Harness, led by his Grooms, marched in the front; After them came 15 Pages, his Excellency's Master of the Horse, and other Servants, followed by his Trompes and Kerle-Drums all on Horseback, his Hautboys on foot, and the 2 Troops of Horse and 3 Companies of Foot which are appointed to attend him in his Journey as his Guards as far as *Salankemen*, marched next; and after them came the Secretary of the Embassy and the Interpreter, the Count of *Sintendorf*, and divers other Persons of Quality, who intend to accompany the Ambassador to

They, all very richly habited after the Turkish fashion, and then the Ambassador in his Coach, attended by his Heydukes, and three other Coaches with six Horses each. The Presents which his Excellency is to carry from the Emperor to the Grand Signior, consisting chiefly in Plate to a very considerable value are put on board the Vessels which he designs to make use of to carry him and his Retinue down the Danube to Salankemen, and all things are making ready for their departure, which will be in very few days, the Turkish Ambassador to the Emperor being (according to our last Advices from thence) already arrived at Belgrade. The Emperor has appointed the Count Marucca della Torre to be one of his Council. The Marquis Coisnon is made Colonel of a Regiment of Horse in the Emperor's Service. The Count of Molar is appointed to make the Emperor's Compliments at the Court of Lorraine on the Birth of the Duke of Lorraine's Son. The Emperor has made Choice of Count Lamberg to succeed Count Martinitz, as his Ambassador at the Court of Rome, who is recalled from that Employment, and in his stead, the young Count Windisgratz will be sent to Ratisbonne with the Character of First Deputy from the House of Austria, in the room of Count Lunberg.

Hamburgh, October 6. Our Letters from the Dutchy of Holstein say, the Rebuilding of the Holmer Schans, and the other Forts is discontinued by reason of the Rainy weather. Our Senate and Burgers, at their last meeting, agreed to lay a Tax of 5 per Cent. upon the Estates of all the Inhabitants of this City for several publick Occasions, and to forbid the Importation of Brandy into this place, and the Exportation of Corn. Our Letters from Dresden of the 4th Instant say, the King of Poland is returned thither from Teplitz, and 'twas said, he would go and pass a few days at Leipzick.

Brussels, October 9. A Placet has been published here, to take off the Prohibition of carrying Corn from one City to another in the Spanish Netherlands. Monsieur Dyckvelt intends to go from hence in a day or two to the Hague. The Count d'Ausel is gone from this place to his Government of Luxembourg.

Dieren, October 9. N. S. The King, who is, thanks be to God, in perfect Health, will return to Leo to morrow; His Majesty intends to be at the Hague, by the end of the next week, and then to embark with the first fair Wind for England.

Hague, Oct. 9. The Squadron of Men of War under the Command of Sir Cloudesly Shovel, which are appointed to attend His Majesty in his return to England, are arrived at the Goree, and the Yachts are come into the Maese. Deputies from the Admiralty of Zealand are come thither, and were yesterday in Conference with those of the States-General, and Deputies are likewise expected from the other Colleges of the Admiralty. The Count de Frise, and Baron Schutz Envoy from the Duke of Cell, are returned to this Place from Loo. The Prince of Nassau-Saarwech is expected here in 3 or 4 days from his Government of Boisleduc.

Paris, Octob. 10. N. S. The King continues at Fontainebleau; The Dauphin, the Duke of Orleans, and divers Persons of Quality, are gone from thence to Montargis, a House belonging to the Duke of Orleans, to take the diversion of Hunting the Wolf. The Price of Corn in this City is risen of late, notwithstanding we have had a good harvest. Our Letters from Thoulon of the 28th past say, they had Advice that Monsieur Ferieles the French Ambassador to the Grand Signior, who sailed from thence the last month, had touched at Malta, where having taken in fresh Provisions, he continued his Voyage to Constantinople, without visiting the Great Master of Malta, by reason of some Difficulties touching the manner of his Reception. They write from Rochelle of the 26th, that the Sieur Renault was sailed from thence for the West-Indies, with the Marine, a Man of War of 60 Guns, and a Frigate of 18.

Bristol, Septemb. 30. On the 28th Instant parted from hence the Ships called the *James and Mary*, the *Squirrel*, and the *Expectation*, bound to *Virginia*; the *Redemption* for *Gibraltar*, the *John and Susanna* for *Pensilvania*, the *Beginning* for *Carolina*, and the *Anthonny* for *Antegoa*. The *Bristol Pink* sailed from hence yesterday, and the *Faithful Prize* this day, both bound to *Virginia*.

Deale, October 3. His Majesty's Ship the *Wymouth* sailed from hence last night for the Coast of *Holland*. This morning came in here the *Levant Galley*, Capt. Thomas Commander, from *Malaga*, and the *Spring*, Cap. Boy Commander, from *Rome*.
