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Alicant, Sept. 7. N. S.

Admiral Aylmer, with the Squadron of English Men of War under his Command, arrived here yesterday in 21 days from *Genova*; He saluted the Town with 13 Guns, and a like number was returned. This afternoon the Governor of this Place visited the Admiral on board his Ship. The said Squadron will sail from hence in few days for *Cadix*.

Cadix, Sep: emb. 14. The *Penzance* Man of War Capt. *Wyat* Commander, arrived here the 4th Instant, and sailed again the same day to join the Squadron of Men of War commanded by Admiral *Aylmer*. On the 8th, 10th, and 11th Instant, several Merchant Ships came in here from *England*, and sailed again yesterday for the *Streights*. This morning the *Betty* Man of War, commanded by Captain *Lambert*, put in here from cruising. Monsieur *de Relingue* continues in this Port with 5 French Men of War.

Corunna, Octob. 10. We have Letters from *Madrid* of the 30th past, which give an Account, that the King and Queen of *Spain* were gone to the *Escorial*. The Countess of *Berlips* will not begin her Journey to *Vienna* till the Court is returned to *Madrid*, which may be about the beginning of the next month. We have received Advice from *Cadix* of the 20th of *September* last, that Admiral *Aylmer* with the Squadron under his Command was arrived there, and would sail in 4 or 5 days for *England*; and that the *Spaniards* are raising 400 Soldiers in those Parts, with a design to send them to the *West-Indies*. The Spanish Alliance Packet-boat arrived here last night with one Mail from *Falmouth*.

Venice, October 3. The Senate have chosen Signior *Giralamo Duodo* to go as Ambassador from this Republick to the Court of *Spain*, in the room of Signior *Aluisio Mocenigo*, who is recalled from that Employment, having accomplished the usual term of 3 years, which is appointed by the Republick for their Ambassadors to continue abroad. The three German Regiments which lately returned hither from the *Morca* having perform'd their Quarters, are come from the *Lazaret* to the *Lido*, and several Vessels lie there ready to transport them to *Verona*, from whence they are to march to *Germany*. Our last Advices from *Dalmatia* give an Account, that the Conferences for settling the Limits are continued by the *Venetian* and *Turkish* Commissioners with good Success, the Limits being already settled from the Sea-shore as far as *Cettina*. These Letters add, that the Germans do still keep Possession of the County of *Litca*, and that the Proveditore of *Slm* had caused the Chevalier *Sinibald*, who commanded in the Castle of *Zuonigrad*, to be secured, for having delivered the same to them without making any Defence. Our last Letters from *Cragna* say, part of the Grand Signior's Ser-

aglio was arrived at *Constantinople*, and that he himself was expected there by the middle of *August* last.

Warsaw, Sept. 29. The Cardinal Primate continues at *Radzieowsky*, expecting the return of the Express he sent to *Germany*, to acquaint the King of *Poland* with the Agreement lately concluded between him and the Resident of *Brandenburgh*, about the Business of *Elbing*; And in the mean time he has writ to several Senators that are gone into the Country, desiring them to return hither, because he intends, as soon as he has received the King's Approbation of the said Agreement, to assemble the Senate to consider of proper Methods to raise the sum of Money that is in pursuance thereof to be paid to the Elector of *Brandenburgh*. We have received an Account from *Lemberg*, that the *Turks* having removed all their Artillery, Baggage, and Ammunition from *Caminnic*, the Bassa of that Place writ a very obliging Letter to the Commissioners of *Poland*, who continue encamped near that Place with the Troops they design to put in Garrison there, thanking them for having assisted him and his Garrison with Men and Horses in the removing of their Goods, and assuring them that he will march out of *Caminnic* upon the first Notice he shall receive, that the *Turks* are put in Possession of the Fortresses on the Borders of *Moldavia* which the *Polanders* are to restore to them. The Crown General continues at *Lemberg*, and has assigned the several Quarters for the Army of *Poland*; and the Troops, who are encamped on that Frontier, will begin to march thither as soon as *Caminnic* is delivered up to the *Polanders*.

Stockholm, Octob. 3. The King of *Sweden* and the Duke of *Holstein* having reviewed the Forces quartered in several Parts of this Kingdom, are returned hither. A Placet has been published here, for laying a Tax on all the Subjects of this Crown according to their several Abilities, which will bring in a very considerable sum. Four Regiments of Foot are marched from the Neighbourhood of this Place to *Cavellserone*, in order to be transported from thence to *Pomerania*; They are to embark on the 12th Instant, and a Squadron of Men of War under the Command of Vice-Admiral *Rosenvelt* are ordered to convoy them.

Copenhagen, Octob. 10. The time of the King of *Denmark's* departure from hence for the Duchy of *Holfen* is yet uncertain. In the mean time the new Levies are continued, and the Commanders of the Danish Forces have received Orders to add 10 Men to each Company of Foot and Troop of Horse; His said, Directions are also given for equipping 14 Men of War, besides the 12 frigates which were before ordered to be fitted out. The King has made Brigadier *Grisiose* Major-General of his Troops in the Kingdom of *Norway*. The Duke of *Wurtemberg* is gone from hence, to review the Danish Forces that are quartered in *Zeland*.

Vienna, October 3. The Ministers of this Court are frequently assembled, to consider of the present Condition of the Emperor's Revenues, and of the Means to raise the necessary Sums to supply the present Occasions, and they have resolved to farm out several Branches of his Revenue. The Count de *Denhoff*, Envoy Extraordinary from the Elector of *Brandenburgh*, has had his Audiences of Leave of the Emperor and Empress, of the King and Queen of the Romans, and of the Arch-Duke and Arch-Duchesses, and intends in few days to return to *Betha*. The 1st Instant being the Arch-Dukes Birth-day.

day, (which he entered into his 15th Year,) he was Complimented thereupon by all the Persons of Quality at this Court. The Count d'Orting, Ambassador Extraordinary from the Emperor to the Grand Signior, has sent away part of his Servants with his Equipage to Peter-Waradin, and intends to be going himself on Monday or Tuesday next; The Count of Zinzendorf, who accompanies him, has a Commission to succeed his Excellency in that Character, in case he dies before he has finished his Embassy. 'Tis said, the Ambassador is particularly charged to Solicit at the Port, that the Roman Clergy may be put in possession of the Holy Sepulchre at Jerusalem, and that all Pilgrims may have free Access to it. The Commissioners who are appointed to conduct the Turkish Ambassador hither, and to deliver the Charges of his Journey, are gone to Peter-Waradin to receive him on the Frontiers, and Orders are sent to the Governors of that place, Effack, Stoelweyffenburgh, Raab, Altenbourg, and all the other Towns thro' which this Ambassador is to pass, to treat him with all the Respect due to his Character. The Count de Lemberg, chosen by the Emperor to be his Ambassador to the Pope, has sent Orders to his Servants at Ratisbonne, to begin forthwith their Journey to Rome, and will himself be going thither about 3 weeks hence; The Emperor has not yet declared who shall succeed his Excellency as First Commissioner of the House of Austria at the Imperial Diet; but 'tis said, the young Count Windesgratz stands fairest for that Employment. Our Letters from Peter-Waradin say, the Imperial Troops continue to work with great diligence on the new Fortifications in those parts; and that the Turks on their side are repairing and augmenting the Fortifications of Belgrade, and have begun to Fortify a small Island in the Danube, lying near the mouth of the Save.

Hamburgh, Octob. 13. Our Advices from the Dutchy of *Holftein* say, the Forces that are employed by the Duke of *Holftein* in building the new Fortifications in those Parts, had put the two Forts called the *Holmer Schans* and the *Hufsummer Schans* into a good Posture of Defence, and were making a Line of Communication between them, and they were ordered likewise to make a Retrenchment to cover the Fort and Sluice of *Stapelbuhne* on the *Eyder*. They write from *Pommern*, that Orders were given for raising 1100 Men in that Country to recruit the *Swedish* Forces. We have an Account from *Cetz* of the 10th Instant, that the Duke of *Cetz* was returned thither from *Loe*. Our Letters from *Leipsick* of the 11th say, the King and Queen of *Poland* were come thither from *Dresden*.

Loe, Octob. 15. N.S. The King returned to this Place last Saturday from *Dieren*, and His Majesty intends to go from hence to morrow, to lie that night at *Soesdyke*, and to be the next day at the *Hague*; And if the Wind be fair, His Majesty will embark for *England* about the middle of the next week.

Hague, Octob. 16. N.S. His Majesty came from *Loe* this morning, and will be here to morrow in the evening. Monsieur *Dyckvelt* return'd hither this week from *Brussels*; and Mr. *Hill*, His Majesty's Envoy Extraordinary to the Elector of *Bavaria*, is expected from thence to morrow. The Squadron of Men of War appointed to attend His Majesty in his return to *England*, continue at Anchor off the *Goree*; and Sir *Cloudfly Shovell*, who Commands them, is come to this Place. The Envoy of *Portugal* had Audience this day of the States-General, to whom he notified the Death of the Queen of *Portugal*.

Paris, Octob. 17. N.S. The Dauphin and the Duke of *Orleans* are returned from *Montargis* to *Fontainebleau*; from whence the whole Court is expected at *Versailles* on the 22d Instant. The new Comptroller-General of the Finances continues at *Fontainebleau*, where frequent Consultations are held concerning the Means to raise new Supplies for the King's Service, which is found to be a very difficult matter at present, that Money is more scarce than it has been at any time during the War. The King has resolved to create a *Lieutenant de Police* in every City of this Kingdom, which Places are to be sold, and 'tis proposed to raise thereby a considerable Sum of Money; And it's said, a Tax will be laid on all those Persons in Publick Offices who bought their Employments during the War, because they have proved more Profitable to them than was expected, and consequently were sold at too cheap a Rate. The King has made the Baron de *Poinis*, who commanded the Ships that were sent during the

War on the Expedition against the *Spaniards* at *Carthagen*, one of the Flag-Officers of his Fleet.

Plumouth, October 8. The Anchor and Hope of *Amsterdam*, Peter *Anaraws* Master, sailed from hence yesterday for the *Canaries*. This day came in here His Majesty's Ship the *Pendennis* from *Portsmouth*.

Bristol, October 7. Yesterday sailed from hence the *Success* of *London*, Capt. *Gawby*, for *Croizack*; and the *St. Off*; and the *St. Matthias*, both for *Norway*. This day sailed the *Elizabeth* and *Sheba*, John *Kenner* Master, for *Neris*.
