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Rome, Octob. 2. N. S.

THE Empetor having recalled Count *Martinitz*, his Ambassador at this Court, and appointed Count *Lamberg* to succeed him, the Pope has upon this Consideration consented to admit Count *Martinitz* to an Audience, which has for some time been refused him. The Ambassadors residing here do not visit the Queen-Dowager of *Poland*, because the manner of their Reception cannot yet be regulated between them.

Venice, October 9. The Senate having resolved to put their Frontier Places in *Dalmatia* into a good condition of Defence, Orders are accordingly sent to General *Mocenigo*, who commands their Forces in that Province, to take care that the Fortifications of the said Places be repaired and augmented, and the Magazines suppli'd with Stores, as shall appear to him to be necessary for their Security. We have Letters from *Smyrna* of the 10th of the last Month, which give an Account, that five *Turkish* Men of War were gone to *Egypt*, and that seven more, under the Command of the Captain-Bassa *Mezzomorto*, were sailed towards *Scio* to receive the Tribute of that and the neighbouring Islands which are under the *Turkish* Dominion. Three *Turkish* Gallies lay near the *Dardanelles*, who had Orders to receive on board Signior *Soranzo*, the *Venetian* Ambassador, and his Retinue, on their arrival there, and to carry them to *Constantinople*; It being agreed, that the *Venetian* Men of War which convoy his Excellency, shall not enter within the *Dardanelles*. We have Advice from *Constantinople* of the 30th of *August*, that the Grand Signior was daily expected there from *Andrinople*: part of his Seraglio being already arrived; That Count *Tekely* was in Disgrace, and had received Orders from the Port to retire from *Constantinople* to *Babadagi*, a small Place on the *Black-Sea*, from whence he is not to remove without express Leave from the Sultan. That a Body of 4000 Spahis and 15000 Janizaries were ordered to march to *Asia*, under the Command of the Bassa of *Natolia*, to suppress the Rebellion of the *Arabs* near *Babylon*, who continue together in very great Numbers, and have as it were besieged the *Turkish* Troops in those Parts, who not being able to keep the Field, are intrenched under the Walls of *Babylon*. These Advices add, that an Envoy Extraordinary from *Muscovy* was arrived at the Port with the Czar's Ratifications of the Truce of Two Years, lately concluded between him and the Sultan at *Carlowitz*, and that an Ambassador Extraordinary from the Czar was shortly expected. An Envoy from the Republick of *Ragusa* was likewise come to *Andrinople*.

Danzwich, Septemb. 10. Two Regiments of the King of *Poland's* Saxon Forces are lately arrived in these Parts, and several others are shortly expected, who will be employed in building a Fortrefs between *Felangen* and *Heiligens* for the De-

fence and Security of this Coast. They write from *Warsaw* of the 2d Instant, that the Senate were to meet in a fortnight to consider of the Means to give the Elector of *Brandenburgh* satisfaction, about the Payment of the Money due to him from the Crown of *Poland*, that so his Electoral Highness may evacuate the City of *Elbing*; pursuant to the Agreement lately concluded between the King of *Poland's* Ministers, and his Electoral Highness's Resident. They write from *Lemberg*, that the City of *Caminieck* was not yet evacuated, by reason of a Dispute concerning the *Greeks* who were settled there, the *Turks* desiring they may continue in possession of their Churches, and in the free Exercise of their Religion, which the *Polanders* will not consent to.

Vienna, October 7. Count *Oetting's* Servants and Baggage are embarking on the Vessels that are to carry them down the *Danube*, his Excellency intending to be going from hence on Monday next on his Embassy to the Port. A considerable Sum of Money was sent this week to *Hungary*, to be employed in carrying on the new Works near *Arat*; and Orders are sent to the Governors of the Frontier Places in *Transylvania* and *Upper-Hungary*, to give the Court a particular Account of the present Condition of their Fortifications, and how they may be improved. The Envoy from the Duke of *Lorraine*, sent to this Court to notify the Birth of his Son, has had his Audiences of Leave, and intends in few days to return to *Nancy*; and Count *Mollar*, whom the Emperor has appointed to make his Compliments to his Electoral Highness on this occasion, intends to accompany him thither. A Fire happened lately at *Neustadt*, which consumed a great number of Houses, and the Damage it has done is computed at above 300000 Florins.

Leipsick, Octob. 11. The King of *Poland* having left *Dresden* yesterday morning, lay last night at *Colditz*, about 6 miles from this Place; and arrived here this afternoon, being attended by the Bishop of *Cujavia*, Prince *Lubomirski*, Prince *Sapieha*, the Palatines of *Czernichow* and *Masovia*, the Crown Referendary, and divers other Persons of Quality of *Poland*. The Margrave of *Bareith* is also come hither, and the Queen of *Poland* is expected here to-morrow. The Magistrates of this City would have waited on the King at some distance from the Town, but he desired to come privately, by reason his Publick Reception might have been uneasy to this City in the time of the great Fair, which is held here at present, and occasions a great Concourfe of Strangers.

Francfurt, Octob. 14. The Bishop of *Osnabrug* passed yesterday through this Place, going to *Nancy* to visit the Duke of *Lorraine* his Brother. The Elector Palatine is gone from *Weynheim* to *Nieusadt*, and intends shortly to return to *Duseldorpe* by Water, having for that purpose sent for his Yachts from thence. The Sieur *Hautais* is daily expected here from *France*, being to act as Commissioner from the Dutcheffs of *Orleans* in the Conferences, which are shortly to be held between the Ministers of the Emperor, the Most Christian King, and the Elector Palatine, for adjusting the Business concerning her Royal Highness's Pretensions on the Palatinate. They write from *Ratisbonne*, that the *Danish* Envoy residing there has notified to the Imperial Diet the Death of the late King of *Denmark*.

Hamburgh, October 16. The Dukes of *Swerin* and *Strelitz* are expected here about the middle of

the next month, when the Conferences will be renewed for settling the Pretensions they both make to the Succession of the late Duke of Mecklenbourg Gustraw. The Duke of Holstein's Forces continue to work with great Application on their new Fortifications in the Duchy of Holstein, but it's thought, the cold and rainy Weather which is coming on will oblige them shortly to retire to their Winter Quarters. They write from Stockholm of the 6th Instant, that the King of Sweden and the Duke of Holstein intended to go in a day or two to Carelsroone, to review 4 Regiments of Foot which lie there ready to be transported to Pomeran. From Copenhagen of the 13th Instant we have an Account, that the time of the King of Denmark's departure for Holstein continued uncertain. The Danish Men of War lately ordered to be fitted out, were all ready to put to Sea; and the Marine Regiments that are to go on board them had Orders to be in a readiness to embark on the first Notice that should be given them. The new Levies in Denmark are continu'd with good Success. The King of Denmark has given the Command of his Forces in Norway to Monsieur Wedel, who was on his departure from Copenhagen for that Kingdom. Our Letters from Dresden of the 12th Instant say, the States of the Electorate of Saxony continue assembled, and have already consented to several of the King of Poland's Demands; And that the Prince of Furstemberg, and divers other Persons of Quality, were gone to attend the King of Poland at Leipzick. We have Letters from Moscow of the 17th of September which give an Account, that the Czar of Muscovy was at Azoph; and had caused several new Fortifications to be raised for the greater strength of that Place, and that he continued his Preparations both for Sea and Land, which makes it thought he has no Intention to prolong the Truce between him and the Turks.

Hague, Octob. 20. N. S. The King arrived here from Loo on Saturday last, and intends to embark for England on Friday next, if the Wind be fair. His Majesty, since his arrival here, has received the Compliments of the States-General, and of the States of Holland; And has been taken up with the Publick Affairs, more particularly in relation to the State of the Forces for the ensuing year, which is to be settled to morrow in the Council of State, and presented to the States-General. Baron Steken, Envoy from Denmark, had Audience of the King last Sunday, and notified to His Majesty the Death of the late King of Denmark, and the present King's Accession to the Crown. Baron Tettau, who succeeds Count Dhona as Envoy from the Elector of Brandenburg to His Majesty, arrived here from Berlin the same day, and had Audience of His Majesty yesterday. Mr. Hill and Monsieur Dyckvelt are come hither from Brussels. The Princess-Dowager of Nassau is daily expected here from Germany.

Paris, Octob. 21. N. S. The return of the Court from Fontainebleau to Versailles continues fixed for the 22d Instant. The new Buildings are continued at Marli, in which a great number of Workmen are daily employed. The scarcity of Money, and want of Trade, occasions frequent Bankrupts in this City, several of the most eminent Merchants and others having failed of late for very great Sums. The Edicts and Declarations against the Protestants and new Converts in this Kingdom, are every where put in execution with the utmost Rigour. At Ste. Foy in Guienne, about 12 Leagues from Bourdeaux, three Women who refused to go to Mass, were lately condemned to go bare Foot and bare Headed, with Ropes about their Necks and Torches in their Hands, through the principal Streets, and afterwards to be shaved by the Common Hangman, and imprisoned during their Lives. And Accounts of the like nature come daily from other parts of the Kingdom.

Plymouth, October 13. Yesterday arrived here the *Suzanna of Topham*, Abraham Tilmore Master, from Newfoundland. This day came in the *Owner's Adventure*

of London, Robert Barrington Master, bound from Stockholm to Vienna.

Deale, Octob. 12. The *Trumbull Galley*, commanded by Captain Duffield, sailed last Tuesday from the Downs, being bound to the *East-Indies*. The *Betsy*, Capt. Binn Commander, bound for *Legburne*, and the *Belemont*, Captain Mason, bound for *New-England*, came from the River yesterday, and will forthwith proceed on their intended Voyages.
