

adjust the Dispute arisen between the Commissioners for settling the Limits concerning some small Places that are to be restored by the late Peace.

**Hamburgh, October 20.** An Extraordinary Courier arrived here last Saturday from Vienna, with some Dispatches for Count d'Eck, Envoy from the Emperour, who, immediately after the receipt of them, sent away two Expresses, the one to the Court of Denmark, and the other to the Court of Sweden, with Letters relating, as is supposed, to the Affair of Holstein, which the Emperour and several other Princes are endeavouring to accommodate. In the mean time we hear from Sweden that the Regiments which lay at Carelsroom, in order to be sent to Pomerania, had orders to embark the 21st Instant; and from Denmark they write, that the Squadron of Danish Men of War put to Sea on the 17th Instant, having Orders, as 'twas said, to oppose the Swedes, in case they attempted to transport any Forces to Pomerania. Our Letters from the Dutchy of Holstein say, the Duke of Holstein's Forces continue to work with great application on their new Forts, notwithstanding the great Inconveniences they suffer from the cold and rainy weather we have at present, and that they have already put some of these Fortifications in a posture of Defence.

**Hague, Octob. 22. N. S.** The King was present on the 20th Instant in the Assembly of the States-General, where the State of the Forces for the ensuing year was presented to them, and ordered to be sent to the several Provinces. This day His Majesty was in the Assembly of the States of Holland and Westfrisland. The Deputies from the several Colleges of the Admiralty continue assembled here, and confer frequently with the Deputies of the States-General touching several Matters relating to the Fleet. Count Demas, late Envoy from the Elector of Brandenburg to the King, has had his Audience or Leave of His Majesty, and will go from hence in 2 or 3 days on his return to Berlin. The Sieur Mells has presented his Credentials to the States as Resident from the King of Poland.

**Hague, Octob. 24. N. S.** The King intended to embark yesterday morning for England, and the Yacht's were accordingly fallen down to the Pits, in order to receive His Majesty on Board; But the Wind coming about to the South-West as it still holds, His Majesty continues here with a Resolution to embark with the first fair Wind. His Majesty has been pleased to appoint the Right Honourable the Earl of Selkirk to be his Envoy Extraordinary, to Compliment the King of Denmark upon the Death of the late King his Father, and his own Accession to the Crown.

**Paris, Octob. 24. N. S.** The King, accompanied with the Dauphin, the Duke and Duchess of Burgundy, and the Dukes of Anjou and Berry, returned on the 22d Instant from Fontainebleau to Versailles; and the Duke and Duchess of Orleans came to the Palace Royal in this City. The Marquis de Cascaes, Ambassador from the King of Portugal, arrived here last Sunday from Holland, and has since had Audience of the King. The Marquis de Villacerf, Steward of the Household to the Duchess of Burgundy, and Surveyor-General of the King's Buildings, died here last Sunday; The King has granted to his Widow a Pension of 6000 Livres a year during her Life. Major-General De la Fare, whom the King had lately made Governor of Schelstadt in Alsace, died some days ago, and that Government is given to Monsieur Prechar. Monsieur de Laubnie, Major General, is made Governor of the Fort of New Brisac in Alsace.

**Bristol, Octob. 14.** The Nightingale, Tho. Swayn Master, from Nevis, and the Supply from Newfoundland, arrived here last Thursday. This day came in here the Friendship of this Port, John Rogers Commander, from Norway, and the Susanna of Brighthelmstone from Rotterdam.

**Deale, October 17.** This Morning arrived here the Anne Galley, Captain Creens Commander, from Malaga, who says, that he left Vice Admiral Aylmer with the Squadron of His Majesty's Ships under his Command about 30 Leagues to the Westward of Silly, so that it's thought they may by this time be in the Channel. The Mull Frigate, Captain Whitehome Commander, arrived here yesterday from Lisbon; The Goshfreight, Capt. Harrison Commander, and the Herne, Capt. Allen, both for the East-Indies; The Delavall commanded by Capt. Minster, and the Paget Frigate by Captain Williams, both bound to Guinea. The Lowther Galley,

Capt. Lowther, for Cadiz, The Lawrell, Capt. Benker, for the Straights; And divers other outward-bound Merchant Ships are now under sail for the Westward.

**Whitehall, Octob. 18.** The King went on board the William and Mary Yacht in the Mase on Monday last, about Three in the Afternoon; and yesterday at Eleven in the Morning His Majesty landed at Margate, being attended in his Passage by several other Yachts; and a Squadron of Men of War under the Command of Sir Cloudesly Shovel. His Majesty lay last night at Canterbury, and came this Evening to Kensington. The General Joy for His Majesty's Safe Return, was expressed in London and Westminster, (as 'twas likewise in the other Places thro' which His Majesty passed) with Ringing of Bells, Bonfires, Illuminations, and other Demonstrations of Zeal and Affection.

The Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty having received a Paper dated the 14th of this Month, signed by the King, giving an Account, That several Parcels of Merchandise Goods have been carried to, and brought from foreign Parts, in His Majesty's Ships which have been sent to the Sea; Their Lordships do give Notice, That if the Persons who wrote the said Paper will attend them at their Office, and make out what Headedges, he shall have all fitting Protection and Encouragement.
