

Duke and Dutchess of Lorraine, acquainting them that they intend to set out from Nancy on the 20th of November on their Journey to this City, where they design to continue *incognito*, till such time as the Duke of Lorraine performs the Ceremony of doing Homage to the King for the Duchy of Barr, which he holds from this Crown. The Marquis de Castel dos Rios, Ambassador from Spain, had yesterday a private Audience of the King at Versailles, as also of the Duke and Dutchess of Burgundy. The Court removed this morning to Marly, where the King intends to continue 10 or 12 days; The Apartments at Marly which belonged to the Duke and Dutchess of Orleans, are given to the Duke and Dutchess of Burgundy, another Apartment in the new Buildings which are making at Marly being appointed for their Royal Highnesses, who intend to continue some time at the Palace Royal. The Prince and Princess of Conde are gone to their House at Chantilly, and the Duke of Bourbon to his Seat at St. Maour, about two Leagues from this place. Notwithstanding the great Severities that are used against the French Protestants and new Converts who are taken attempting to leave this Kingdom, many of them do still endeavour daily to get away; And an Account is particularly come from the Sea Ports, that divers of them have been lately seized on board Dutch Merchant Ships who were ready to sail for Holland; and that the said French Protestants were immediately committed to Prison, in order to be sent to the Gallies, and the Ships on board which they were found are seized, and their Cargo confiscated.

Plymouth, Octob. 17. This day the Squadron of His Majesty's Ships commanded by Admiral *Sylmar*, with about 30 Sail of Merchant-men from the *Streights*, passed by this Place to the Eastward.

Kensington, Octob. 20. Don Lewis d'Acunha, Envoy Extraordinary from the King of Portugal, had Audience this day of His Majesty, to notify the Death of the Queen of Portugal, being introduced by Sir Charles Costrell Master of the Ceremonies.

London, October 20. The Lord Mayor, Recorder, Aldermen, and Sheriffs of London, being attended in the usual manner, went this day from *Guilshall* to *Kensington* in the forenoon to wait upon His Majesty, where by the Recorder they in a very Dutiful manner did Congratulate His Majesty's Safe Return. His Majesty was Graciously pleased to express his favourable Acceptance of their Affections, and did earnestly Recommend to them the Careful and Vigorous Execution of the Laws against all Prophaneness, Debauchery, and Ill Livers; And also, that effectual Care be taken to Provide for the Poor, so that they may not be necessitated to wander about the Streets for Relief. And then His Majesty was pleased to confer the Honour of Knighthood upon *Charles Duncomb* and *Jeffrey Jeffreys Esq;* the present Sheriffs, and *William Wickers Esq;* Alderman.

The Right Reverend Father in God the Lord Bishop of London, accompanied by the Clergy of London and Westminster, went likewise to Kensington to pay their Duty to His Majesty, and Congratulate his Safe Arrival; And His Majesty received them very Graciously.
