**T**HE Queen-Dowager of England continues to have the chief Care of the young Princes and Princesses of Portugal, but finding the Air of the Place to which she removed upon the Queen's Death to be prejudicial to her Health, Her Majesty is returned to her own House. The Marquis of Aranches, formerly Ambassador from this Crown to the Emperor, being accused of having caused a Gentleman to be murdered during his Residence at Vienna, was lately brought to his Tryal here, and condemned to a Perpetual Banishment in the West-Indies, to give 40000 Livers to the Heirs of the deceased, and to pay besides a Fine of 4000 Livers, and the Costs of the Suit. Five Merchant Ships are lately arrived here from Rio Janeiro in Brazil, who among other Things have brought home 700 Pounds of Gold Dust, (whereas in former years they did not use to bring home above a 4th Part of that Quantity,) which the Portuguese found among the Sand of the Rivers that come from the Mountains to their Colony of St. Paul. And they write, that they not only expect to send home a far greater quantity of this Gold Dust next year, but have also hopes of discovering some new Mines in the said Mountains, in order to which they have already proceeded a great way in clearing the Ground through which these Rivers run, which is very woody, but proves a good arable Soil.

**M**adrid, October 9. The Court continues at the Escorial, where the King does frequently divert himself with Hunting, being in perfect Health. The Councils of Berlips is still at Court, and has fixed no time for her leaving this Kingdom. The Duke d'Uzeda, whom the King has appointed to be his Ambassador to the Pope, is gone from hence for Barcelona with his Lady, and all his Family, (except the Marquis de Belmonte his Eld. Son, who has lately married one of the Conde d'Oropesa's Daughters) where they will go on board the Duke of Turf's Galies, which are to carry them to Civita Vecchia, and the Duke of St. Juan makes use of this opportunity to go to Sardinia, of which Island he is lately made Vice-Roy. The Marquis of Villa-Garcia, newly made Vice-Roy of the Kingdom of Valencia, has Orders to repair forthwith to his Government. The Ambassadors of the Emperor, France, Venice, and Savoy, and several other Persons of Quality, are gone upon an Invitation from the Marquis of Leganes to his House at Morata near Toledo, where great Preparations are made for their Entertainment, and it's thought they will continue there as long as the Court is at the Escorial.

**Rome, Octob. 12.** The Prince of Monaco, Am-

bassador from the Most Christian King to the Pope, and Signior Erizzo, Ambassador from the Republick of Venice, are preparing for their Publick Entries, which they are to make in few days; Several Regulations have been made in relation to the Publick Entries of Ambassadors, to prevent for the future the like Disorders as happen'd lately at the Entry of the Ambassador of Tuscany, by the Dispute between the Imperial Ambassador and the Cardinal de Bouillon, touching Precedency. The Pope continues in good Health, and goes frequently abroad to visit divers new Buildings that are making by his Order in and about this City for its greater Beauty and Conveniency. A great number of Strangers do daily arrive here, to be present at the Jubilee.

**Vienna, Octob. 21.** Preparations are making for the Reception of the Dutcheis-Dowager of Hanover, who is shortly expected here from Modena, to be present at the Lying in of the Queen of the Romans her Daughter; Count Otting, Ambassador from the Emperor to the Port, began his Journey thither yesterday; And our Letters from Peter-Waradin of the 5th Instant say, the Turkish Commissioners who are to attend him, and defray the Charges of his Journey through the Turkish Dominions, were come to that Place to wait for his Excellency's Arrival, and that the Turkish Ambassador to the Emperor was expected at Belgrade on the 20th Instant.

**Frankfort, Octob. 29.** The Commissioners, who are to meet here in order to adjust the Pretensions of the Dutcheis of Orleans on the Palatinate, have had several Conferences, and Monsieur Hautois, Commissioner from her Royal Highness, having presented a Memorial containing her Demands, the Sieur Zachtman, Commissioner from the Elector Palatine, has desired some time to consider of it, and return his Answer, and Monsieur Obrecht, Commissioner from France, is gone in the mean time to pass a few days at Strasbourg. The Elector Palatine is expected in 8 or 10 days from New-stadt at Weynheim, where his Electoral Highness intends to make a short stay, and then to return to Dusseldorp. The Prince of Saxe-Zeitz, Bishop of Riab, passed two days ago through this City in his return from Cologne to Vienna.

**Hamburg, Octob. 30.** Our Letters from Copenhagen of the 27th Instant give an Account, that

that the *Danish* Squadron of Men of War, commanded by Admiral *Stocken*, was still before that Place, being detained by contrary Winds. The late King of *Denmark's* Funeral was performed there on the 26th. Preparations were making for the King of *Denmark's* Journey to *Holstein*, the time of which was not yet fixed. The Commanders of the *Danish* Forces quartered in *Funen* and *Jutland*, had received Orders to keep their Troops in a readiness to march on the first Command they shall receive. The King of *Denmark* has declared, that he expects from the Nobility and other Persons of Quality, and from the Merchants, a Voluntary Advance of such Sums as they shall be able to lend him, for which a yearly Interest shall be allowed them till the Principal is repaid; And a Loan is likewise demanded of the several Cities and Towns of that Kingdom. We have no fresh Advices from *Sweden*. The Troops employed in building the Forts in *Holstein*, use their utmost diligence to put them into a Posture of Defence, that they may march to their Winter-Quarters. They write from *Leipsick*, that the King and Queen of *Poland* were gone from thence to *Torgaw*.

*Hague*, November 3. The Baron *de Stecken*, Envoy from the King of *Denmark* to his Majesty of *Great Britain*, who came hither some time ago from *England*, has had several Conferences with the Deputies of the States-General, and it's said, Monsieur *Crauenburg*, one of the Members of the Council of State, will be sent on the part of this State to *Denmark* to join with the Ministers of the other Princes who endeavour to accommodate Matters between the King of *Denmark* and the Duke of *Holstein*. One of the young Princes of *Holl* Sons to the Landgrave of *Holl-Cassel*, who lately came hither from *Germany*, is gone to *England*. The Prince of *Nissa-Sax-Bruck* is gone from this Place to his Government of *Bass-I-Duc*. The States of *Holland* and *West-Friseland* are adjourned to the 10th of this Month.

*Paris*, November 4. N. S. The King went last Monday from *Versailles* to *Marly*, and intends to continue there about a Fortnight. Monsieur *de Bonrepos*, Ambassador from this Crown to the States-General, has obtained leave to quit that Employment, and to return home, on account of the ill State of his health; and the Count *de Briot*, who resides at present in the quality of Ambassador from *France* at the Court of *Savoy*, is appointed to succeed him. The Count *de Tallard*, Ambassador to his Majesty of *Great Britain*, arrived here this week from the *Hague*, and will remain in few days to *England*. The Marquis *de Villa-Cerf*, who died some days ago, is succeeded in his Office of Steward of the Household to the Dutchess of *Burgundy* by the Marquis of *Villa-Cerf* his Son. The scarcity of Money, and the excessive price of Provisions, do still continue; and divers Families have been ruined of late, by the breaking of several eminent Merchants here. They write from the Provinces of this Kingdom, that the number of the new Converts that refuse to go to Mass increases daily, and that they persist in their refusal with that Courage and Resolution, as gives no small trouble to the Intendants, and other Officers, who are appointed to put in execution the Orders of the Court concerning them. Letters from *Aras* give an account, that 18 Women were lately taken near that place, as they were endeavouring to make their escape out of the Kingdom, of which being convicted, they were committed to the Prisons of that City, in order to be punished according to the King's late Edicts.

*Plymouth*, October 24. Yesterday arrived here His Majesty's Ship the *Sorlingus* from *Cadiz*, a Dutch

Man of War bound home from *St. Tybes*, and the *White Swan* of *Queenborough*, *Martin Meichs* Master, likewise bound home from *St. Tybes*, and this day came into this Port, the *Fortunate St. John* of *Harre de Grace*, *Robert Duverger* Master, bound home from *Newfoundland*, and the *Mary* of *Bourdeaux*, *James Touzé* Master, bound to *Rotterdam*.

*Deal*, Octob. 27. The *Dorrell*, Capt. *Hide* Commander, bound to the *East-Indies*; the *Smyrna Factor*, Capt. *Saunders*, for the *Straits*; the *Venetian*, Capt. *Robinson*, for *Venice*; the *Stratford* Frigate, Capt. *Thompson*, for *Cadiz*; the *America*, Capt. *Graves*, for *Virginia*; the *Griphin*, Capt. *Philips*, for *Guinea*; and divers other outward-bound Merchant Ships, are come down the River. Yesterday came into the *Downes*, the *Reward*, Capt. *Bennet*, from *Smyrna*; the *William and John*, Capt. *Sutton*, from *Barbades*; the *Upton* Galley, Capt. *Campbell*; the *Hope* Galley, Capt. *Hawkes*, from *Naloga*; and the *Concord*, Capt. *Bowers*, from the *Straits*; And this day arrived here the *Constantinople* Merchant, Capt. *Humphreys*, from the *Levant*.

*Kensington*, Octob. 28. The King went last Thursday to *Hampton-Court*. His Majesty intends to be to-morrow at *Windsor*, and so continue there till Tuesday next.
