Rome, Octob. 17. N. S.

**T**HE Venetian Ambassa<sup>or</sup> had a Private Audience of the Pope this week, and intends to make his Publick Entry in few days. A Franciscan Frier is lately arrived here from Vienna, who after having had several Conferences with the Pope's Ministers, was yesterday a long time in private with the Pope himself; and it's said, he has Orders from the Emperor to Negotiate an Accommodation of the Differences between him and this Court. The Great Duke of Tuscany is shortly expected here to be present at the Jubilee, and a Palace in this City is preparing for him.

Venice, Octob. 23. The Senate are employed in making several Regulations in reference to their Forces, and have sent Orders to General Mocenigo, who Commands the Venetian Troops in the Mare, to review them, and to send hither an exact Account of the Condition they are in. The Duke of Mantua is gone from hence to Rovigo, but will return in few days to his Palace in this City. We have received Letters from Spalato in Dalmatia of the 17th Instant, which give an Account, that the Venetian and Turkish Commissioners appointed to settle the Limits between the Territories of this Republick and the Grand Signior, have agreed on the several Boundaries from Monte Grosso as far as Narenta, and have ordered a Line to be drawn for this purpose, and they hope to have quite finished their Commission before Winter.

Warsaw, Octob. 23. The Baron of Owerbeck arrived here some days ago from Berlin, being joined in Commission with Baron Werner, Resident from the Elector of Brandenburg, to finish the Treaty for accommodating the Business of Elbing; It's said, they have Orders from the Elector their Master to propose, That if the Republick will yield to him the City of Elbing, his Electoral Highness will not only release the Debt due to him by this Crown, but will likewise give the two Bailiwicks which he now possesses in Lithuania. The Sieur Lezimsky, Ambassador Extraordinary from this Republick to the Grand Signior, will begin his Journey to Turkey in few days; He has Instructions to give all the Assistance he can to the Ambassador the Czar of Muscovy is sending to the Port, in concluding a Peace, or prolonging the Truce between the Turks and the Muscovites, to which the Czar shews at present a great Disposition. Our Letters from Caminiec of the 27th Instant give an Account, that the Turks having surrendered that Place to the Poles on the 22d, the Suffragan Bishop of Chelm came the next day and took possession of the Churches, but would not suffer the Greeks to use any Publick Exercise of their Religion, as was allowed them by the Turks. The Greeks have writ to the Czar of Muscovy, and to the Hospodar of Moldavia, as being of the same Church, to complain of this Proceeding, and to desire they will intercede with the Re-

publick of Poland, that they may enjoy the same Liberty of Religion and Immunities as formerly. The Commissioners of Poland who took Possession of Caminiec, continue in that City, expecting the arrival of the Commissioners whom the Grand Signior has appointed to treat with them about settling the Limits between the Dominions of Poland and the Ottoman Empire.

Copenhagen, Octob. 31. The Body of the late King of Denmark was removed on the 26th Instant from the Room in the Palace where it lay in State, to the King's Chapel, which was done in the following manner; The King's Pages and other Servants having each a Wax-Torch in his Hand, and behind them a Row of the Guards, were placed on each side of the Long-Gallery between the said Room and the Chapel, through which marched first the Knights of the Order of Dannebrug, next the Royal Corps was borne by eight Colonels of Horse, a black Velvet Canopy with Silver Fringe being carried over it by six Lords of the Bed-chamber; Then followed the Prince of Hesse, and the Knights of the Order of the Elephant; that are in Town, the Chief Ministers, and other Persons of Quality. The Body being brought into the Chapel, was deposited in a stately Mausoleum, from whence 'tis to be carried on Monday sevenight to Roschild to be there interred. The King has not yet fixed the time of his departure for Holstein, but it's thought he may be going thither about 10 or 12 days hence. The Duke of Wirtemberg will leave this place in a day or two, in order to Command the Danish Forces in Holstein, which are to be joined by the Troops from Funen and Jutland. The Squadron of Danish Men of War under the Command of Admiral Stocken, which sailed from hence on the 24th Instant, was driven back the same day by contrary Winds, and continued at Anchor before this Place till the 29th, when the Wind changing, they put to Sea again, and we have since received no Advice concerning them.

Vienna, Octob. 24. The Count of Rarventlau, Envoy Extraordinary from the King of Denmark, continues to confer frequently with the Emperor's Ministers touching the Affairs of Holstein. Count Lemberg, whom the Emperor has appointed to be his Ambassador to the Pope, has received his Credentials and Instructions, and intends in a day or two to begin his Journey to Rome. Count Denhoff, Envoy Extraordinary from the Elector of Brandenburg, has left this Place on his return home. Our Letters from Peter-Waradin say, the Imperial Troops employed in building the new Fortifications near Aras, continued that Work with great diligence, and that the Turks on their side are building a new Fortress in a small Island in the Danube near Belgrade. We have Letters from Novi of the 11th Instant, which say, the Imperial and Turkish Commissioners and the Bassa of Bassania have had several Conferences there, in order to adjust the Differences concerning the Possession of that Town, and some other small Places on the

Borders of Croatia, but that they were yet come to no Resolution; So that it's thought this Matter must be left to be settled by Count Orting the Emperor's Ambassador to the Port, and the Turkish Ambassador to the Emperor, in the Meeting they are to have on the Frontiers near Salankemen.

**Dresden, October 30.** The King and Queen of Poland are come from Lipsick to Torgaw, and intend after a short stay there, to go to Hamburg. A Marriage was concluded at Lipsick between Prince Charles-Lewis, eldest Son to the Margrave of Brandenburg and Brother to the Queen of Poland, and a Daughter of the Duke of Saxony.

**Berlin, Oct. 31.** The Elector of Brandenburg returned hither the last week from Pomerania and is since gone to Oranienburg. His Electoral Highness's Journey to Prussia is uncertain. Mr. Strey, Envoy Extraordinary from His Majesty of Great-Britain, had his Audience of leave of the Elector of Brandenburg at Oranienburg on the 28th Instant, and the day following had Audience in like manner of the Elector and the rest of the Electoral Family; and he intends to set out from hence on the 2d of the next Month in order to return home by the way of Holland. Monsieur Opdam Envoy from the States-General is gone to Torgaw, to compliment the King of Poland on the part of the States.

**Hamburg, Nov. 3.** We have received Advice, that the Squadron of Swedish Men of War, with the four Regiments of Foot that went on board them at Carlskrona, are arrived at the Isle of Rugen, on the Coast of Pomerania. In Holstein the Duke's Forces continue to work on their new Forts, and have begun to furnish them with Artillery. In the mean time 'tis discoursed, that a Treaty will be shortly begun here for accommodating this Affair.

**Brussels, Octob. 30.** A Placet was published here this day by Order of the Elector of Bavaria, taking notice, that two Pamphlets have been spread about, as Copies of two supposed Treaties, pretended to have been made between his Electoral Highness on one part, and the States-General of the United Provinces on the other; the one dated August 28, 1698. and the other supposed to have been concluded since, but not dated or signed, and a Reward of 3000 Pistoles, and the keeping his name secret, is promised to any person that shall discover the Author of these Libels; And the Council of Brabant have likewise declared the said Papers to be False, scandalous, and Seditious, prejudicial to the King of Spain's Service, and to the Honour and Reputation of his Electoral Highness, and ordered that they should be burnt by the common Hang-man, which was accordingly performed yesterday. The Letters from Lisse give an account, that the Conferences about settling the Limits between the French and Spanish Territories in the Netherlands, are drawing to a good Conclusion, the Principal Matters in dispute between the French and Spanish Commissioners being adjusted.

**Hague, Novemb. 6. N. S.** The Baron of Lillieroot had a Conference on the 2d Instant with some Deputies of the States-General, and the Affair of Holstein is said to have been the Subject of it. Don Ercorac de Quiros, the Spanish Ambassador, intends in 2 or 3 days to return to Brussels, and has already sent his Equipage thither. Monsieur de Bonrepas, Ambassador from France, is preparing for his return home, and the Marquis de Bonse, his Nephew, is to continue here, and to have the Care of the Affairs of that Crown, till the Arrival of the Minister whom the Most Christian King shall appoint to succeed him. Monsieur van der Hulst, Envoy from the States-General to the Czar of Muscovy, has received his Credentials, and will begin his Journey to Moscow in few days. An Order has been published here, containing several Regulations relating to the new Marine Regiments, which are to be under the Direction of the Colleges of the Admiralty.

**Dublin, Oct. 21.** Yesterday being the Anniversary of the Discovery of the Irish Rebellion in the year 1641, was observed in the accustomed manner; The Nobility and Chief Officers waited upon the Lord's Justices to Church, and were entertained at Dinner by their Excellencies. The Great Guns of the Castle were fired, with other Demonstrations of Joy usual on the like Occasions.

**Portsmouth, Oct. 31.** Admiral Aylmer, with the Squadron of His Majesty's Ships under his Command, lately returned from the Sweights, came last Friday to an Anchor at Spithead.

**London, Octob. 30.** This day Sir Richard Levee, Elected Lord Mayor of this City for the year ensuing, went by Water to Westminster, being accompanied by the late Lord Mayor, Recorder, Aldermen and Sheriffs, and attended by the several Companies in their Barges; and having been sworn before the Barons of the Exchequer; returned to Dorset Stairs, from whence they passed with the usual Solemnity to Guild-Hall, where a splendid Entertainment was provided, at which were divers Lords of His Majesty's most Honourable Privy-Council, the Judges, and other Persons of Quality.
