Madrid, Octob. 21. N.S.

HE King of Spain has enjoyed an un-interrupted Health fince his being at the Escurial; The Court will return from thence in the beginning of the next month. They write from Cadix, that a Spanish Man of War of 50 Guns, and a Petache of 100 Tuns, failed from thence on the 16th Inftant with Arms, Ammunition and Stores for Carthagens, and 'tis faid, the Galleons will depart from Cadiz for the

West-Indies early in the Spring, Caranna, Nov. 3. The Spanish Expedition Pac-Caranne, Nov. 3. quet-boat arrived here yesterday from Falmouth, and put to Sea again this day. Our Letters from Madrid of the 21st of the last month say, the Court was still at the Escurial, and that the King of Spain continued in very good health, and in-tended to return to Madrid on the 2d Instant. They write from Lubon of the 20th past, that Monsieur Relingues, with the Squadron of French Ships under his Command, came in there the 13th

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Milan, Offeb. 14. The Difference between the Cantons of Switzerland and this Government, concerning the Demands of the Suiss Regiments in the Service of this State, are not yet adjusted, and it's said, the Cantons have resolved to send a Deputy to Madrid, to follicite the Payment of what is due to them. The Marquis Ariberty making some Pretentions to the Town of Melgrate, and its Dependencies situate in the Territory of Cre mona, which the Count of Stanga was in Possesfion of by virtue of an Investiture from the Emperor, he obtained an Order from the King of Spain to the Prince of Vaudemont our Governor, to affift him with a sufficient number of Forces to take Possession of the said Town; But upon fresh Application to the Court of Spain, the Matter is Put into a way of Accommodation, and the Parties concerned have agreed, That in the mean time the Town of Melgrate and its Dependencies shall be sequestred, and put into the hands of the Duke of Parma. The Prince of Vaudement intends to go from hence in a day or two to spend fome time at Caftellazzo.

Rome, Office. 20. Count Martinitz the Imperial Ambassador having received Advice, that Count Lamberg, who is appointed by the Empefor to succeed him in this Station, would in few days begin his Journey hither, he is preparing for his return to Vicana, and has already fent away part of his Equipage; His Excellency has not yet had the Audience which the Pope (in confideration of his being recalled) promifed to give him: In the mean time the Franciscan Frier lately arrived here from Vienna, continues to confer frequently with the Pope's Ministers touching an Accommodation of the Differences between the Emperor and this Court, relating chiefly to forme Imperial Fiefs in the Ecclesiastical State, which the Pope lays claim to, and it's faid, he has al-

ready made a confiderable Advance in this Negociation. The Pope being informed, that divers Strangers have come of late to the Port of Anzo, but there being no publick Houses where they could lodge, they were obliged to go to Nettano, a few miles beyond it, he has ordered feveral Inns to be built for the Conveniency of Travellers and others who refort to that place, which he defigns to make a commodious Sea-Port Town. A Dispute is risen between this Court and the Duke of Save, occasioned by the Pope's having made Abbot Tomari Arch-Priest of Ast, which Benefice the Duke of Savor's Officers would not permit him to take Possession of, pretending 'tis in the disposal of the Duke their Masser; And a Congregation of the Cardinals of the Palace has met several times to consider of this Matrer, touching which they have yet taken no Resolution. The Cardinal de Giudice had an Audience last week of the Pope, whom he acquainted with the Death of the Cardinal of Cordous, and that the King of Spain has appointed the Bishop of Segovia to succeed him as Inquisitor-General of Spain, which Choice the Pope seems very well satisfied with, and has ordered a Bull to be forthwith dispatched for confirming it.

Venice, October 26. The Senate have still under confideration the regulating the State of their Forces both at Sea and Land, and have sent Orders to General Mocenigo, to see that the Fortifications of their Frontier Places in Dalmatia be repaired and put into a good Condition of Defence, and that there be sufficient Garrisons in them. Our last Advices from Spalato say, General Mocenigo was still there, and that divers Families of the Morlagues who live now in the Turkish Dominions, have desired that he would appoint them other Habitations within the Territories of this Republick, in compliance to which, he has given them a large track of Land not inhabited near Singh. The Venetian and Turkish Commissioners for regulating the Limits continued to execute their Commission, and intended in few days to remove from Narenta to Castelnovo to settle the Boundaries on that side. By a Ship which parted from Smirna about the middle of the last Month; and in her Voyage hither touched at Napoli di Romania, we have received Letters from the Morea, which give an Account that Captain-General Cornaro was then at Porto-Porro, where he had taken a Review of the Forces in the Neighbourhood of that Place. which he found in a good Condition; and that he had fent some small Parties of Horse to suppress the Robbers in the Southern Parts of the Morea, who were together in great Numbers, and had done sonfiderable Damage to the In-

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
