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Rome, Nov. 7. N. S.

**O**N the 31st of the last Month the Pope was taken very ill of a Feaver, and a violent Head-ach, but yesterday he was somewhat better, and his Feaver abated, however his Recovery is very much doubted by reason of his great Age. The Cardinals that were in the Country, upon this News, came immediately to Town, and they are all very busie in forming Parties against the next Conclave. The Resident of *Tuscany* has notified to this Court, that the Great Duke his Master intends to come hither in the beginning of the next Month, in order to be present at the Jubilee.

*Venice, Novemb. 20.* A Merchant Ship arrived here this week from *Zant*, by which we have an Account, that Signior *Soranzo*, Ambaffador Extraordinary from this Republick to the Grand Signior, had put into that Island, and failed again from thence on the 25th of the last Month, in order to continue his Voyage to *Constantinople*. Several Pieces of Cloth of Gold, and divers other Things of Value, have been sent from hence to Signior *Grimani*, Commissioner from this Republick for settling the Limits in *Dalmatia*, to be presented to the *Turkish* Commissioner there. Our last Advices from thence say, they proceeded in the execution of their Commission, and have almost finished the Matters they met about. Letters from *Rome* of the 14th Instant tell us, the Pope had that day made a Promotion of Cardinals; and that his Feaver continued, with a very violent Pain in his Head.

*Warsaw, Nov. 6.* The Senate have met several times, to consider of the new Proposals made by the Elector of *Brandenburgh's* Deputies for accommodating the Affair of *Elbing*, but they are yet come to no Resolution therein. Prince *Alexander Sobieski* continues on the mending hand, and intends shortly to begin his Journey to *Rome*. The Castle is fitting up against the King of *Poland's* return from *Saxony*, and an Apartment is preparing for the Queen, who it's said will come with him.

*Copenhagen, Nov. 17.* On the 12th Instant, in the evening, the Body of the late King of *Denmark* was taken from the Chapel of the Palace, where it had lain several days, and was carried in great Pomp to *Roskilde*, to be there interred with the Kings his Predecessors. The Proceeding begun with a Squadron of the Horse-Guards, after whom came the Court-Marshal on Horseback in a long Mourning-

Cloak, who distributed among the People a great number of Medals with the late King's Head, and an Inscription suitable to the occasion. Next followed 39 Coaches with 6 Horses in deep Mourning, each attended by 12 Footmen with Torches in their hands; in these were the Duke of *Wirtemberg*, and the Ministers and Councillors of State. Then came 24 of the King's Pages on Horseback, with their Governor before them, all with long Mourning-Cloaks; the Members of the Royal-Academy on Horseback, the Kettle-Drum-Major with 12 Trumpets sounding a mournful March; 20 Led-Horses with black Housings reaching to the ground, and having the King's Arms embroider'd thereon; These Horses were led each by two Lieutenants, and a Captain of Horse marched before each of them, bearing a Banner with the Arms of the several Provinces of this Kingdom. Next a Standard was born by 9 Gentlemen, on which were the Arms of the late King, and his Titles, in Letters of Gold; two other Banners, the one all Red, and the other with a White Cross, the Field Red, the one born by five, and the other by three Gentlemen; Then came Monsieur *Haxhausen* Master of the Horse, having on the late King's Armour, upon a white Horse richly Harnes'd; and after him two Horses with white, red, yellow, and blue Feathers upon their Heads, each led by two Captains; the great Mourning Standard born by a Person of Quality, assisted by six other Gentlemen; 3 Led-Horses with black Housings, on which were embroider'd the Arms of *Denmark*; 15 Gentlemen of the Bedchamber on Horseback with long Mourning-Cloaks; One of the Principal Officers of the Court representing the High-Marshal, with a Marshal's Staff in his Hand; Then the Body of the late King in an open Chariot drawn by 8 Horses, a black Velvet Canopy done round with a rich Silver Fringe, being born over it by 24 Counts, all Gentlemen of the Bedchamber. The present King, with the Princes *Charles* and *William* his Brothers, came next in a Coach drawn by 8 Horses, the Count *d'Ablesfeld*, Great Chamberlain, being on Horseback by the Coach side, the rest of the Kings Pages and Footmen went before and behind the Coach, and two Files of Halbardiers walked on each side; and a Squadron of the Horse Guards closed the March. In this Order they marched out of the City,

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
