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Plymouth, April 9.

**H**ere is lately put into this Port one vessel of this place from *St. Maloes*, two small vessels laden with Corn, and one ship put into the sound from *Falmouth*, some time since designed for the *East-Indies*, but by the way received some injury from a Corsair of *Algier*, which put a stop to her voyage.

*Deal, April 12.* There are now passing from the Downs to the River of *Thames* Merchant ships, whereof 3 from *Virginia*, 2 from *Lisbonne*, one from *Gallipolis* and another from *Zante*, leaving behind them still riding in the Downs one *East-India* ship intended also for the same River, and one from *Gallipolis* bound for *Hambourgh*.

*Lisbonne, March 26.* Yesterday in the morning were found murdered in several parts of the Town seven persons whereof one a Knight, and person of quality. The Spanish Ambassador has been lately dangerously ill of a disease in his Stomach, supposed an Imposthume, but is again upon recovery.

There is building a great Tribunal for the Trial and Examination of the Jews by the Inquisitors or Tryers of the Faith, on Sunday next they are to appear before their Judges.

*Stockholm, March 30.* Here is lately arrived a ship from the *Tatars* living upon the River *Volga*, a people who are not subject to any discipline, nor under the Government of the *Cham*, who had his audience the 28th, but as yet the subject of his negotiation is not said.

Upon some complaints made at the late Assembly of the States of this Kingdom of the growth of Popery and the ill consequences which might attend the toleration of several Religions, they were pleased to resolve, that all children whether of the reformed or Roman Catholick religion should for the future be brought up and instructed in the Lutheran principles: which is now putting in execution, and this is Act for that purpose solemnly read on Sunday last in all the Churches of this place.

*Iegoon, April 2.* This week arrived here the *Leopard* Fleet from *Smirna*, and the *Golden-leece* from *London*, *Gadis* and *Genova*.

By Order from the Great Duke of *Florens* here are now embarking upon a great *Genouefe* ship about 60 men designed for the reinforcement of the *Popes* Companies in *Gandia*, but to be transported by this ship to *Zante*.

A ship lately arriving from *Smirna* informs us, that there have lately arrived at *Gandia* above 40 ships and Barks with about 5000 men and great quantities of Provisions and Ammunition, by which means 'tis hoped that place may be in a condition to defend it self till the greatest succours shall arrive.

*Copenhagen, April 2.* The 22 past arrived here his Excellency the Earl of *Carlisle*, Ambassador to the Court of *Sweden* on his way thither; who thought he appeared here under no publick Character, passing by onely as a private person, was brought into the Town by the *Heer Guldens* Viceroy of *Norway*, afterwards visited by the other Ministers, and since received by their Majesties and the Prince with all possible marks of kindness and esteem as having been formerly well known to this Court; he has since his arrival here delivered to His Majesty a Letter from His Majesty of *Great Britain* sent after him since

his departure from *England*, being a return to a very obliging and kind Letter sent to the King of *Great Britain* his Master from this King, which being received with extraordinary kindness, His Majesty has been pleased at the instance of the said Earl of *Carlisle* to cause his Orders to be dispatched to all his Ports, and particularly to his Custom places and Havens of *Norway*, for the restoring the English Trading to any part of his Kingdoms or Dominions to the same priviledges which they formerly enjoyed according to the Treaty concluded in the year 1660.

The Viceroy of *Norway* 'tis believed, may in little time be employ'd hence into *England* under the Character of Ambassador from this Crown. This day embarked upon a man of War the Earl of *Carlisle* in pursuance of his voyage to *Stockholm*.

*Genova, April 2.* The ship called the *Increase* arriving here from *Lisbonne* and *Aleante* gives us no other news but that the Turkish ships from *Barbary* are cruising after prize, and have lately plundered a small English Privateer which was from hence homewards bound.

From *Turin* we are advised, that there lately passed by that City 2 Couriers extraordinary, both of them intended for *Rome*, one of them from *Lisbonne* informing that the Count *de Prado* designed Ambassador from that Court to his Holiness, was preparing for his voyage and might have departed from *Lisbonne* about the middle of *March*, the other from *Madrid* giving an account of the state of affairs of that Court in reference to the composition of all affairs with *Don Juan* of *Austria*.

A quarrel lately happening in the Duke of *Savoy's* Antichamber between the Count *della Trinita* and the Baron *di Valgran*, they immediately challenged one another into the field, and met near the great Court of the Castle, where they began to give proofs of their valours one to the other; but some Officers of the Guards coming accidentally in separated them, which procedure of theirs was so ill resented at the first by the Duke, that he commanded them to be proceeded against with all severity, but upon several addresses since made to him has been pleased to pardon them.

*Madrid, April 3.* Since the indisposition of the Cardinal *d' Aragon*, for which he was obliged to be let blood, the *Popes* Nuncio has taken much pains with the Duke *d' Alba* and the Cardinal *Moncada*, for adjusting all affairs relating to *Don Juan*, by whom it is particularly agreed that His Highness shall not come farther this way than *Guadalaxara*, but shall go from thence to his Priory of *Consuegra*, from whence he may send his proposals for the reformation of the Government, the advantages of the Publick, and the good and benefit of the people; the Queen Regent having already appointed a Council for the Regulation of all things, to the full content and satisfaction of his Highness: A Regulation is now publishing, by which a reformation is to be made of the great Luxury used in Coaches, Buildings, &c. and an abatement to be made in the Payments and Customs for Merchandises upon their entry in the Cities, and the Registers ordered to be brought in for the better regulation of them.

His Highness has desired that an Inquiry be made into the accounts of such persons as have had the charge of *Money* belonging to the publick.

The Gallies will certainly depart the next Moneth for the *West-Indies* under the Command of *Don Manuel de Bagnuelos*.
