The Ratifications of the Treaty lately concluded here between the King of Poland and the Elector of Brandenburgh for accommodating the Affair of Elbing, are daily expected from Saxmy, where the King is at present. and from Berlin, in order to be exchanged; The and from being very well approved, both by faid Treaty being very well approved, both by the King, and by his Electoral Highness. Cardinal Primate went from hence on the 27th Instant to Lowitz, where he intends to continue till the King's return, who is expected here about the latter end of the next Month. The Sieur Lezinky, General of Great Poland, fet out from this place the 25th past on his Embassy to the Port. The Crown-General continues at Radom, where the General Officers are met to settle the Accounts of the Army, in which they have made a good Progress. Our last Advices from Cammie say, the Garrison there are plentifully supplied with Provisions by the Inhabitants of the neighbouring Country, and particularly by the People of Moldavia, who have now renewed their Trade with the Polaniers. The Governor of Caminies is coming hither, to give an Account to the Senate at their next Meeting of the Condition of the Fortifications of that Place, and to follicit the necessary Sums of Money to be employed in repairing and improving them.

Vienna, Jan. 2. The Arch-Duke Charles continues as well as can be expected in his condition, it being Nine days fince the Small-Pox came out very kindly. An Express was sent this week to Count Marigli the Emperor's Commissioner for settling the Limits with the Turks in Croatia, with the last Resolution of this Court con-cerning the Town of Novi and its Dependen-ties, which is, That if the Turks do insist upon the demolishing of that Place, the Emperor is willing to confent thereunto, provided he may be at liberty to build another Fortress not far from thence for the Security of his Frontiers, and that all that part of the Territory of Novi which lies on this fide the River Uma, be left to the Imperiability, which Proposal 'tis thought the Twks will comply with. Count Guide of Staremberg returned hither the 11st past from Hungary. The Turkish bither the 11st past from Hungary. Ambasiador continues his Journey to this Place, and is expected here in 10 or 12 days; He has with him a Train of 500 Persons, who are all destrayed at the Emperor's charge. The Count defrayed at the Emperor's charge. The Count de Zude's de, Envoy from the Emperor to the king of Point, is come hither from Warfaw, but will return to his Station in few days. Cardinal Sama Crue, Nuncio from the Pope, took his Audience of Leave of the Emperor on the 31st past,

on his return to Rome. The Count of Waltenstein, Envoy Extraordinary from the Emperor to the Court of Portugal, begun his Journey thicher yesterday. The Count of Levenstein went from hence yesterday for Francfort, where he is to reside as the Emperor's Commissioner, and to assist at the Conferences for settling the Dutchess of Orleans Pretentions on the Palatinate. The Bishop of Lerida, Ambassador from Spain, having taken his Leave of the Perfons of Quality at this Court, is now on his departure for Madrid

Diefden, Jan. 4. The King of Peland continues at Torgan, and intends in 5 or 6 days to go from rhence to Leipsiek, and to return hither about a fortnight hence, by which time 'tis supposed the States of Saxmy, who are still assembled, will have finished the Business before them, and in three weeks the King will begin his Journey to Warfaw. Monsieur d'Opdam, Envoy Extraordinary from the States-General, had Audience of Leave of the King of Poland on the 31it past, and will return to Berlin in few days.

Francfort, Jan. 10. A great number of Boats laden with Provisions are come hither from the Electorate of Mentz and the Bishoprick of Wartzburgh, for the Service of the Imperial Garrisons of Philipsbeurg, Friburg, and the Fort of Kiehl. The Count of Roynembourg, the Emperor's Envoy, went from hence some days ago to Aschaffembourg, co confer with the Elector of Mentz, and is expected here again in a day or two in his return to Vienna; The Count of Levenstein is coming hi-ther in his room, and the Conferences for fettling the Dutchels of Orleans Pretentions, at which he is to affist on the Emperor's part, are put off till

Hamburgh, Jan. 12. The Affairs of Holfein continue in the same condition, the Danes seem to wait only for the Weather's changing to a Frost to attack the Duke of Holftein's new Forts, and the Suedes appear resolved in such case to assist the Holsteiners. Twas reported 3 or 4 days ago, that some of the Suedish Regiments quartered in the Dutchy of Bremen were on their march to Holflein, whereupon the Danish Officers in Holstein immediately drew together a good Body of Horse, and sent out strong Parties to secure the Passes; But this proving to be a groundless Report, the said Troops are returned to their Quarters.
