

We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in consideration of the benefaction (consisting of a bequest) which has been secured for the permanent spiritual benefit of each of the parishes and benefices mentioned in the schedule hereto, which benefaction is in each case described in the schedule, do hereby, in pursuance of the Act of the 29th and 30th years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter 111, grant, subject as hereinafter mentioned, out of our common fund to such benefice one yearly sum or stipend of the appropriate amount stated in the schedule, to be calculated as from the date specified therein and to be payable in four equal portions on the 1st February, 1st May, 1st August and 1st November in each year: Provided always that any

quarterly portion of such yearly sum or stipend shall be payable only after the production to us in such form as we may from time to time require of a certificate under the hand of the Bishop of the diocese that a curate duly licensed by such Bishop has been employed within the parish of the benefice and that such further condition (if any) as is indicated in the footnote to the schedule has been satisfied: Provided also that this Instrument which has been executed in several parts, one part for each diocese concerned, shall operate only as a single grant in favour of each of the benefices specified in the schedule.

WAR DAMAGE ACT, 1941.

SECTION 7.

The War Damage Commission hereby give notice that they have, for the purpose of giving effect to directions given by the Treasury under sub-section (1) of section 7 of the War Damage Act, 1941, and under the power conferred upon them by sub-section (2) of the said section, specified the following class of works for making good war damage:—

Works costing more than £100, to be executed for making good war damage sustained by any one hereditament situated within the following area:—

In the County Borough of Swansea, an area comprising Alexandra and Castle Wards.

The War Damage Commission also give notice that they, under the power conferred upon them by the aforementioned sub-section, impose on any person, who proposes to execute for making good war damage any works (other than temporary works) of the above specified class, an obligation to inform the War Damage Commission of the proposal, and thereafter to furnish to them such particulars of the proposed works as they may require in any particular case.

In this notice a "hereditament" means either a hereditament as appearing in the rating valuation list, or, in the case of a hereditament which is exempt from rating and does not appear in that list, the hereditament so exempted provided that where there is more than one occupation of a single building, the hereditament shall be the building.

This Notice should be read in conjunction with the Notice which appeared in the London Gazette on the 19th August, 1941. The conjoint effect of these two Notices is that within the two Wards now specified, all works costing more than £100 or ten times the net annual value, whichever is the less, should be submitted to the Commission. In the remainder of the area of the County Borough of Swansea, all works costing more than £1,000 or ten times the net annual value whichever is the less, should likewise be submitted to the Commission.
