Second Vellel arrived here from Virginia confirms to us the great plenty and thriving condi tion of that place, but brings no other news of publick concernment.

On Sunday last came in here the Speedwell with one other of his Majesties Fregars, which failed a gain this morning for the Westward, stellgned Conyoys to several Newsoundland ships for the Streights.

Naples April 2. From Sicily all our Letters are full of altonishment at the greate flames which on the IL of the last month were thrown up by Mount Ætna with an Extraordinary Barthquake, by which many Villages have been ruined, and the City of Castania put into so great a fright, the fire and ashes being cast in great abundance within halfe a mile of them, that the whole Citty made up a devour Procession expening their most facred Re-diques at in a time of greatest danger and Calamity.

From Maltha, letters of the 15. of March tell us that the Count de St. Paul, having upon his arrivall from Candia been obliged according to Custom to make his Quarantine, was on the 22, of the foregoing month admitted to make his first Visit to the Grand master, who For the better avoyding all disputes in Ceremonials receiwed him in bed. And the 25, returned him his Vi-fit at his Lodgings. And that after many honours done him, he was with his Squadron put to sea, intending for Sicily, the Councel having Ordered 2. of their Gallies to wait on him for his Guard as farre as Mesfina.

Warfam, April 2. The people of Ukrania have been lately very tumultuous, but the Garrison of Bialacierkien being well succour'd and reinforced, we are the less concerned at their motions.

The Great Duke of Muscovy has freed and sent away all his Polish prisoners, the better to gain upon the affecting ons of this Nation.

The Nobility hold private correspondencies with the Palatinates, and are resolved to be upon their Guard during the time of the Election, 'tis said those of the upper Palatinates intend to keep themselves apart, and not to joyn with the body of those concerned in the Election, and to bring with their Waggons, with their Colours, En-fignes and Thumpers, the eather to form themselves into a

body upon any occasion.

Stockholme, April 6. The Envoye lately arrived here from the Tartars, had on Tuesday last his Audience from His Maj. sty, to whom he then delivered his Letters of Credence, which was the next day fent to the professor of the Eastern Tongues at Apfaler to be Frank ned; and gave His Mejeky & Factarian Horle, which is not wer transported hitter from Ponterania.

The Sigut Vorman, some time lince lent into Muscous, Mulely seromethy giving His Majesty this account; that the Grand Duke was resolved to receive an Ambassador Roin the Crown of Shedeland, and to come to all agree-ment for letting bounds to their Tefritories, the better to avoid all beure disputes and milunderstandings, but would not suffer that any Ambaffacocor publick Minister what-lower should e deavor to defraud him of his Rights.

Yesterday the body of the deceased Count de Pons was

with much Honour and Magnificence enterred, being followed by all the Horse and Foot Guards, by all the Court, and the Queen her felf, (the King never appearing at such folemnities, but at the interrment of one of the four principal persons of the Government of any of his Thiors) the folemoity concluding with two discharges of all the Great Guns, and as many Volleys from the Musquereers. Rome, April 6. The Popes Gallies are fitting up with

all imaginable, diligence for the expedition into the Levant, on whose Admiral is to be placed the Popes Banner, which is very rich, whereon are lively represented St. Peter and St. Paul, with Our Saviour between them, being the like as in former times was wont to be born by the Christian Princes in their wars against the Common Ene-

This week Don Vincenzo Rospigliosi, the Generalissimo, has for his encouragement received a Present from the Senate of Yenice, being a Golden Cup to the value of 6000 Ducats.

This week arrived an Express from Paris, assuring His Holiness of the incessant application of His most Chriflian Majesty in hastning forwards his succors for the relief of Candia, and that his-men were already at the mad

From Milan we are told, that the Queen Regent of Spain has ordered the present Governour to send 400 of his choicest soldiers to Finale, there to attend the a rival of the Spanish Gallies which are to joyn with the Italian iquadrons for the affistance of the Venetians.

The foldiers defigned for the Levant are marched from their Quarters to Civita Vecchia, whither are also sent all forts of Provisions and Ammunition with other necessaries for that great expedition.

Here is lately arrived a Gentleman belonging to the Conde de Prado, Ambassador Extraordinary from Portugal, who is fuddenly expected here, and for whom Cardia nal Orfino has ordered rich Coaches and Liveries to be made, and several Officers of the Pallace are commanded to go to Civita Vecchia to attend him and entertain him in the Popes name.

On Munday last was held a private confistory in the Vatican, where little other bufinels passed besides the proposal

of several vacancies in the Church.

This week by the Popes Order, Cardinal Rospigliosi caused an Edict to be publish'd in favour of all such Malefactors or Banditi, who shall offer themselves to expiate their Crimes by serving in this expedition for Candia, enjoyning them to give in a note of their Names and Crimes.

Bruffels, April 19. The daily advices we receive of the reinforcement of most of the French Garrisons, and the diligence they use in fortifying several places of their late Conquests, keep us upon our Guard, and oblige us likewise to take care for the security of our Frontiet Towns, and such as may lie nearest danger, and particularly to reinforce the Garrisons of Aix, St. Omers, pro. Dixmuid, with Meuport and Ostend, and many Waggons are ordered to be laden with Ammunition for the supply of such places as may stand in need.

The High-ways are grown formewhat better fecured than formerly, good Guards being every where employ'd, and such foldiers do are taken committing any Robberies,

are immediately executed.

Paris, April 19. The Alby of St. Germains which was vacated and fell into the diposal of His most Christian Majesty upon the late Marriage of the Duke de Vernueil, has been by His Majesty conferred on King Casimir for his more honourable maintenance since his resignation of the Crown of Poland.

The Brince of Conde is much concerned at a Libel knely publishe in Foland, pretending to do right to the Duke of Neuburg as to his pretentions to that Crown, but in some places falling too severely upon him the Prince of Conde and his-son.

The 12th instant, the Prince of D. nmark was introduced by the Sieur Bonnevil, to take his leave of both their Majesties, and on Tuesday last departed hence well satisfied with the honourable Reception he found in this Court.

From Chartres we are tolds that the River of Eura having for leveral years been stopped up, but lately by the industry of the Sieur Colbert made Navigable as far as Nogent le-Roy; on the 6th instant, three great Vessels land with Corn passing out of that Port, the Great Guns were discharged with some Volles of shors the people by their acclamations testifying their joy for the hopes they have of the restoration of their Frade.

The Sieur de la Hay our Ambassadour, has written from Larissa, that he is assured by that Court that the French Merchants shall for the suture be admitted to Trade into the Levant, upon the same tearms as those of other Nations, and thas all extraordinary Impositions on them shall be taken off, and that the Grand Segnior is willing to keep a good correspondency with the Crown of France. This notwithstanding, our preparations are still advancing for the succour of Candia; but som Thoulan we are informed, that the Fleet cannot be in readiness to put to sea before the end of the next Moneth, by reason of the difficulty of storing it with Victuals sufficient for the people that are sent on board for 6 Moneths.

Father Nithard, the Spanish Inquisitor-General, was in his passage by Bayonne treated there by the Count de Guiche with all possible civility, according to Mis Majesties directions.

From Madrid we are told, that Don Juan has dismissed his Officers and Soldiers, and de'ivered them to be provided for by the General of the Horse, who had disposed of them into Quarters; and that the Commissioners appointed to compose all matters for his satisfaction, and the ease of the people, have had several conferences, and that Don Juan infils much upon the calling to account such persons as have been publick Receivers, and for the regrenchment of the extraordinary Fees and allowances of

many publick Ministers.

Faris, April 24. Upon the frequent instances and applications of the Marquis de Villars in the Court of Spain, the Queen Regent has at the last sent hither to His Maelesty the Letter which the wrote to the Constable of Capitille, by which he is ordered to suppress the Offices for imposing Taxes and Customs upon such Merchandises—aspass into or come from any of the Towns of our late Conquests in the Natherlands, which His Majesty on Friday last lent away by an Express with other Letters of Compliment to the Constable of Cassille.

On Saturday last arrived here a Courier Extraordinary from the Pope with a Letter written by His Holinesses own hand to His Majesty, as likewise with instructions to his Nuncio, pressing the revocation of the Decree of the Council made against the pretended priviledges of the Re-

Ligious.

Letters of the 3-inflant from Madrid ssiure us, that the young King is perfectly restored to his health, and such as desire it are without scruple admitted to see him. That Don Juan is yet at Guadalaxara, and that since the late agreement made with him, all things continue peaceable and quiet.

Fother Mithard having taken his resolution to pass by Lyons intending for Italy, His Majesty has given Order for his honourable reception and entertainment in that City, and that he be Treated with the Title of his Ex-

cellency.

From Marseilles, Letters of the 9th instant inform us, that the Count de Vivonne is lately returned from the coasts of Barbary with the squadron under his Command, having had satisfaction on his demands from the Corsairs of Algiers and Tunis, who have promised to observe punctually the late Treaties made with them, and to comply with what His most Christian Majesty shall reasonately design from them.

From Nancy we are advited, that the Duke of Lorrain had laid an extraordinary Taxe upon his Subjects for the railing a large fumme of Moneys to be sent to Prince Charles his Nephew, to encourage his presentions to the Crown of Poland; but upon their great complaints of the impoverish condition of his Countrey, which rendred them unable to supply him with such summes as were requised from them, the Duke has been pleased to take off the Taxes, and to supply the young Prince from some other stock.

Prince Prancis has upon second thoughts comply'd with the Duke in figning the Contract of the Prince de Vaudemonts marriage, and has great hopes of the success of the Prince his son in the approaching Election to the Crown of Poland.

Portsmouth, April 15. Several ships are here fitting up. The Nonesuch is riding at Spitthead. Here is lately put in the Arms of London, Captain Godfrey Commanders, having in Holland laden Corn bound for Genoua, but having sprung a Leak was forced to make this place, and may in little time put out again to sea in pursuance of her voyage.
