

the French have given order to their Receivers to bring in what Moneys they have received upon confiscation of the Estates of such persons as live from their said Estates under the Spanish jurisdiction and service.

The Vedor General and the President of Flanders are this week gone for Spain.

The Duke of Neubourg has given order to all his Nobility to prepare themselves to follow him in an handsome equipage in a voyage he intends to make towards Poland.

On Saturday the insolency of some Spanish Soldiers in affronting some Citizens, occasion'd a tumult in one quarter of the City, which might have occasion'd much mischief, had it not been timely compos'd by the Officers and Magistrates.

Brussels, April 19. The daily advices we receive of the reinforcement of most of the French Garrisons, and the diligence they use in fortifying several places of their late Conquests, keep us upon our Guard, and oblige us likewise to take care for the security of our Frontier Towns, and such as may lie nearest danger, and particularly to reinforce the Garrisons of Aix, St Omers, Ipré, Dixmuid, with Newport and Ostend, and many Waggon are ordered to be laden with Ammunition for the supply of such places as may stand in need.

The High-ways are grown somewhat better secured than formerly, good Guards being every where employ'd, and such soldiers as are taken committing any Robberies, are immediately executed.

Paris, April 19. The Abbey of St. Germain's which was vacated and fell into the disposal of His most Christian Majesty upon the late Marriage of the Duke de Verneuil, has been by His Majesty conferred on King Casimir for his more honourable maintenance since his resignation of the Crown of Poland.

The Prince of Conde is much concerned at a Libel lately published in Poland, pretending to do right to the Duke of Neuburg as to his pretensions to that Crown, but in some places falling too severely upon him the Prince of Conde and his son.

The 12th instant, the Prince of Denmark was introduced by the Sieur Bonneuil, to take his leave of both their Majesties, and on Tuesday last departed hence well satisfied with the honourable Reception he found in this Court.

From Chartres we are told, that the River of Eure having for several years been stopp'd up, but lately by the industry of the Sieur Colbert made Navigable as far as Nogent la Roy; on the 6th instant, three great Vessels laden with Corn passing out of that Port, the Great Guns were discharged with some Volleys of shot; the people by their acclamations testifying their joy for the hopes they have of the restoration of their Trade.

The Sieur de la Hay our Ambassadour, has written from Larissa, that he is assured by that Court that the French Merchants shall for the future be admitted to Trade into the Levant, upon the same terms as those of other Nations, and that all extraordinary Impositions on them shall be taken off, and that the Grand Signior is willing to keep a good correspondency with the Crown of France. This notwithstanding, our preparations are still advancing for the succour of Candia; but from Thoulon we are inform'd, that the Fleet cannot be in readiness to put to sea before the end of the next Month, by reason of the difficulty of storing it with Victuals sufficient for the people that are sent on board for 6 Moneths.

Father Nithard, the Spanish Inquisitor-General, was in his passage by Bayonne treated there by the Count de Guiche with all possible civility, according to His Majesties directions.

From Madrid we are told, that Don Juan has dismissed his Officers and Soldiers, and deliver'd them to be provided for by the General of the Horse, who had dispos'd of them into Quarters; and that the Commissioners appointed to compose all matters for his satisfaction, and the ease of the people, have had several conferences, and that

Don Juan insists much upon the calling to account such persons as have been publick Receivers, and for the rerenchment of the extraordinary Fees and allowances of many publick Ministers.

Paris, April 24. Upon the frequent instances and applications of the Marquis de Villars in the Court of Spain, the Queen Regent has at the last sent hither to His Majesty the Letter which she wrote to the Constable of Castille, by which he is ordered to suppress the Offices for imposing Taxes and Customs upon such Merchandises as pass into or come from any of the Towns of our late Conquests in the Netherlands, which His Majesty on Friday last sent away by an Expres with other Letters of Compliment to the Constable of Castille.

On Saturday last arriv'd here a Courier Extraordinary from the Pope with a Letter written by His Holiness own hand to His Majesty, as likewise with instructions to his Nuncio, pressing the revocation of the Decree of the Council made against the pretended privileges of the Religious.

Letters of the 3 instant from Madrid assure us, that the young King is perfectly restored to his health, and such as desire it are without scruple admitted to see him. That Don Juan is yet at Guadalaxara, and that since the late agreement made with him, all things continue peaceable and quiet.

Father Nithard having taken his resolution to pass by Lyons intending for Italy, His Majesty has given Order for his honourable reception and entertainment in that City, and that he be Treated with the Title of his Excellency.

From Marseilles, Letters of the 9th instant Inform us, that the Count de Vivonne is lately returned from the coasts of Barbary with the Squadron under his Command, having had satisfaction on his demands from the Corsairs of Algiers and Tunis, who have promised to observe punctually the late Treaties made with them, and to comply with what His most Christian Majesty shall reasonably desire from them.

From Nancy we are advis'd, that the Duke of Lorraine had laid an extraordinary Tax upon his Subjects for the raising a large summe of Moneys to be sent to Prince Charles his Nephew, to encourage his pretensions to the Crown of Poland; but upon their great complaints of the impoverish'd condition of his Countrey, which render'd them unable to supply him with such summes as were requir'd from them, the Duke has been pleas'd to take off the Taxes, and to supply the young Prince from some other stock.

Prince Francis has upon second thoughts comply'd with the Duke in signing the Contract of the Prince de Vaudemont's marriage, and has great hopes of the success of the Prince his son in the approaching Election to the Crown of Poland.

Portsmouth, April 15. Several ships are here sitting up. The Nonesuch is riding at Spitthead. Here is lately put in the Arms of London, Captain Godfrey Commander, having in Holland laden Corn bound for Genoa, but having sprung a Leak was forced to make this place, and may in little time put out again to sea in pursuance of her voyage.
