Some nights later, Pilot Officer Donkersley attacked \mathbf{I} of $\mathbf{2}$ ships, escorted by destroyers, setting the vessel on fire. Later, it was learned that the ship had sunk. The success which attended his efforts deprived the enemy of much fuel so vital for the battle in Africa.
