

ring to take Possession of that Place with 2000 Men of the Emperor's Forces, who will have with them 20 Pieces of Cannon, 6 Mortars, and a great quantity of Ammunition. The Elector Palatine's Forces continue to work with great Application on the Repairs of Heidelberg, his Electoral Highness being expected there in the Easter Holidays.

**Hamburgh, March 16.** The Negotiations here for adjusting the Differences between the King of Denmark and the Duke of Holstein, continue in the same posture. Our Letters from Holstein say, the Danes in that Dutchy have again summoned the Country People to send in Horses for the Service of their Artillery, which are to be ready at Rensbourg the 18 of this month. Major-General Banner, who commands the Swedish Forces in Holstein, has lately taken a Review of them, and visited the new Forts; And has sent two Pieces of Cannon and 200 Men as a Reinforcement to the Garrison of the *Hufsummer Schantz*, and continues to prepare every thing in order to make a good Defence. The Letters from Copenhagen say, the Danish Fleet may be ready to put to Sea by the 25th of this Month; And that the Danes have got together a considerable number of Forces in Norway, which are divided in three Bodies, Commanded by General Wedel, General Wiebe, and General Ziegenan. They write from Stockholm, that the Fleet which the Swedes are fitting out at Carelsroome, is in great forwardness, and consists in the following Ships; Three Men of War of 84 Guns each, two of 80, one of 78, six of 72, two of 70, two of 64, two of 62, one of 52, two of 50, three of 48, two of 46, two of 44, two of 42, two of 36, one of 32, one of 26, one of 24, five of 18, and one of 12, nine Fireships, six Storeships, twelve Vessels and Tenders. The Letters from Dresden say, the Baron Welling, Envoy from the King of Sweden, was on his return home; And that the King of Poland would depart in few days for Poland.

**Hague, March 19.** The States of Holland met on the 17th Instant. Most of the Deputies of the Colleges of the Admiralty are arrived here, and the rest are expected in few days. The Count de Briol, Ambassador from the most Christian King to the States-General, arrived here yesterday from Paris, and this day he made a Visit to Monsieur Orlyk; He continues *Inognito*, his equipage not being yet arrived. The Sieur Tholodano, Envoy from the King of Morocco, will depart from hence in few days.

**Paris, March 20. N. S.** The King returned this day to Versailles from Marly; He has given Leave to the Dukes of Burgundy to make a Lottery of 20000 Livres, out of which 2000 are to be deducted for the Benefit of the Poor of Versailles, and the remaining 18000 are to be divided into 80 Benefit Tickets. An Edict was published this morning, to forbid the use of Gold or Silver in Cloaths, Coaches, or Household Furniture. The Marquis de Montespan has lately bought an Estate of the Duke de la Feuillade, which cost her 400000 Livres, and has given it to the Marquis d'Autin her Son. Orders are sent to the Marquis d'Uxelles, to deliver up Brisac to the Germans. They write from Nancy the 15th Instant, that the Body of the late Duke of Lorraine would shortly be brought in ther from L'apruck, to be inter'd with the Dukes of Lorraine his Ancestors. They write from Brest, that the Squadron which Monsieur de Pointis is to Command against the *Mosses of Sallee* is almost ready to sail, and consists in four Frigate, two Coasters, one Pulk, and one Bomb-Ketch, and that they are to take in Provisions for six months. The last Letters from Cadix say, the *Mosses* before Cadix had received a Reinforcement of 10000 Men, and their Supplies of Ammunition, and that they seemed resolved to continue the Siege of that Place with more Vigour than they have hitherto do. The Letters from Madrid of the 25th past say, the King of Spain had been indisposed to some days past, but was then much better.

**Desl, March 11.** His Majesty's Ship the *Portland*, came this morning thro' the Downs from Plymouth. There are now in the Downs, the *Anna*, Captain Bridges Commander, bound to the East-Indies; The *Victory*, Cap-

tain Blais, to Legborne, and several other outward-bound Merchant Ships.
