to the intensity of the flames and smoke which filled the cockpit, Wing Commander Robinson saw no hope of bringing the fire under control, and therefore ordered his crew to abandon the aircraft. While preparing to follow them himself, the fire abated. Undeterred by the difficulty of the flight which involved crossing the Alps and flying many hundreds of miles over enemy occupied territory, Wing Commander Robinson continued alone, completed the return journey, and landed his large 4 engined aircraft successfully in this country despite very adverse weather, accomplishing a most praiseworthy and skilful feat of airmanship. feat of airmanship.

Distinguished Flying Cross.

Acting Wing Commander Ernest Louis Acton Walter, A.F.C. (32237), No. 113 Squadron.

During the past 3 months Wing Commander Walter has taken part in many operational sorties. In November, 1942, he led an attack from low level against enemy shipping off Akyab. In the face of strong opposition from anti-aircraft defences and enemy fighters direct hits were obtained on 2 enemy vessels. This officer's skill and courage under difficult and hazardous circumstances have been an inspiration to all.

Squadron Leader The Honourable Brian GRIMSTON (84667), Royal Air Force No. 156 Squadron. Volunteer Reserve,

Squadron Leader Grimston was captain of an aircraft engaged in operations against Turin on the night of 11th December, 1942. Throughout the greater part of the outward flight, he was forced to fly blind, owing to extremely adverse weather. Only by exercise of the greatest coolness and tenacity was this officer able to surmount the difficulties of the Alpine crossing, reach the target, and complete his mission. On the return flight, the state of the weather exacted the most superlative airmanship and navigational skill. Squadron Leader Grimston finally made a successful landing in this country. In the course of numerous operational sorties, this officer has evinced superb skill and exceptional courage. Squadron Leader Grimston was captain of an evinced superb skill and exceptional courage.

Flying Officer Ross Herbert Bertram (Can/J.6396),
Royal Canadian Air Force, No. 38 Squadron.

In October. 1942, this officer was the pilot of

harbour. Displaying great skill and determination
he made a successful attack scoring at least one
hit on the target. His determined attack contributed much to the combined effort of the operation which achieved the destruction of the vessel.

Flying Officer Philip Gustave Freberg (Can/J 6659), Royal Canadian Air Force, No. 7 Squadron. This officer, as navigator, has participated in a

number of operational sorties during which he has displayed a high standard of courage and tenacity. Flying Officer John Stuart Rowland MULLER-

Rowland (103497), Royal Air Force Volunteer Reserve, No 60 Squadron. Flying Officer Muller-Rowland has made many

reconnaissances deep into Burma and brought back recontains accept into burnha and brought back information of great value. On 2 occasions recently, he participated in low level attacks against enemy shipping off Akyab. Despite strong opposition from air and ground defences this officer pressed home his attack with great determination. He has proved himself to be a splendid leader and has set a fine example to his fellow pilots.

Pilot Officer Ernest Brazier Cozens (Can/J.16010), Royal Canadian Air Force, No. 218 Squadron. Pilot Officer Cozens has participated in a large

Pilot Officer Cozens has participated in a large number of operational sorties. One night in December, 1942, he was captain of an aircraft detailed to attack a target in North-West Germany. When approaching the objective his aircraft was held in a cone of searchlights and baily damaged by anti-aircraft fire. Despite this, Pilot Officer Cozens, displaying great determination, flew on and bombed the target from a very low level. On the return journey the bomber was 'again hit by anti-aircraft fire and the starboard inner engine caught alight. Descending to roo feet, a fuel tank was jettisoned, and the fire extinguished. Pilot Officer Cozens then flew his aircraft safely back to base. He is an outstanding officer whose only desire is to engage the enemy His quiet determination and courage have been a fine example to other members of his crew.

Pilot Officer Peter Eastcott (Can/J.9563), Royal Canadian Air Force, No 221 Squadron.

On the 26th October, 1942, Pilot Officer Eastcott was navigator in an aircraft which led a formation detailed to make a daylight attack on an enemy ship in Tobruk harbour. The outward flight, a distance of several hundred miles over the sea, was made only a few feet above the water, and complete surprise was achieved. At least 3 hits were scored on the vessel which was destroyed. This officer displayed navigational skill of a high order. skill of a high order.
