Rome, April 3. N. S.

THE Spanish Alliance Pacquet-boat arrived here the first Instant from *Falmouth*. They write from *Cadiz*, that great diligence is used there in fitting out eight Men of War designed for the *West-Indies*. We have an Account from *Lisbon* of the 27th past, that the *Lisbon Merchant*, Capt. *Milleson* Commander; the *Deborah*, Commanded by Capt. *William Hodder*; and Eleven other English Merchant Ships, were come into that Port.

Rome, March 20. The Pope being perfectly recovered of his late Illness, intends in few days to appear in Publick, and will shortly go to see the new Works made at Port *Anzo*; He has conferred upon Signior *Reffa*, a *Milanese*, the Government of *Civita-Vecchia*, and has given to Cardinal *d'Asi* an Abbey in the Kingdom of *Naples*, worth 500 Ducates a year. The Princes *James*, *Alexander*, and *Constantine Sobiesky*, are come hither to see the Queen-Dowager of *Poland* their Mother, and the Pope has sent 'em a Present of Refreshments. The Great Duke of *Tuscany* is daily expected here: Count *Martiniz*, the Emperor's Ambassador, prepares for his return to *Vienna*; The Pope does still refuse to admit him to Audience, and this is said to be the Reason why the Emperor has not yet signified his Acceptance of one of the Persons proposed to be sent with the Character of Nuncio to the Imperial Court. Signior *Pignaselli* will be going in few days to *Poland*, where he is to reside as Nuncio; 'Tis said, great Endeavours are used to get him made a Cardinal, and that Cardinal *Cantelmi* has offered to resign to him the Arch-Bishoprick of *Naples*.

Venice, March 26. The Dutchess-Dowager of *Hannover* arrived here this day in her return from *Vienna* to *Medina*. Prince *Anthony* of *Parma* is come hither from *Parma* in his way to *Rome*. A Post is lately settled between this Place and *Constantinople*; The Letters will be carried by Sea to *Dalmatia*, and from thence over Land to *Constantinople*. The Senate have received Advice from *Dalmatia*, that the Sea has washed away the Foundation of part of the Fortifications of *Castellone*, a Place belonging to this State, that one of its Towers and about 50 fathom of the Wall is fallen thither, whereupon a Ship is ordered to be sent thither with Materials to repair the same.

From the Saxon Camp before *Riga*, Mar. 22. N. S. Every thing being ready for storming the *Dunamund* Fort, Major-General *Carlowitz* was appointed with a Detachment of 1500 Men for that Service; Who accordingly on the 23d Instant, about two in the morning, began the Attack. A Lieutenant with 40 Men got upon the Wall, but not being timely assisted, they were all cut off; And among the rest of the Party, the Enemies Cannon being laden with rusty Pieces of Iron, Nails, &c. made a great Slaughter; Their Cannon broke likewise the Bridge of Boats we had laid over the River *Dvina*, and by this means not

only divers of our Men were drowned, but the Saxons on this side the River were hindered from assisting those on the other; which occasioned the failure of our Attempt. In this Action we had 200 Men killed, and a greater number wounded; Major-General *Carlowitz* was very much wounded, and died some hours after; The Colonels, *Braunser*, *Marwitz*, and *Heydeler*, were also wounded, with about 40 other Officers. General *Fleming* was not discouraged by this ill Success, but resolved to storm the Fort a second time, and yesterday by break of day 1000 Men advanced in order to make the Assault, and at the same time the General sent a Drummer to Colonel *Budberg* the Governor, to Summon him to Surrender, and to let the Garrison know, That if they deferred it till another Assault was made, he would give them no Quarter; The Governor called his Officers together to consult what they should do, and the major part not thinking themselves in a condition to withstand another Storm, and wanting particularly Ammunition, 'twas resolved to capitulate; The Governor desired that he and his Garrison (consisting in 600 Men) might retire to *Revel*, but this was refused; And all he could obtain was, That as soon as Shipping could be provided, they should be sent to *Sueden* or *Finland*, and that in the mean time they should continue in our Camp. General *Fleming* since the taking of this Fort has changed the name of it to *Augustusberg*, and placed therein a Garrison of 600 Men under the Command of Colonel *Zachlerne*. We are now making Preparations to attack the Town, which General *Fleming* intends to take if possible without bombarding it; and 'tis believed, that in a day or two we shall begin with the Attack of the Cittadel.

Warsaw, March 25. The King of *Poland* arrived in this City the 23d Instant. The Cardinal Primate and the Crown General, the Great General of *Lithuania*, and several other Great Officers of the Crown, are daily expected here, and immediately after their arrival the Senate will meet. The King's Guards are ordered to the Camp before *Riga*, and began their March yesterday, and 'tis said, the King intends to be going thither in few days.

Vienna, March 27. Orders are sent to *Hungary* for continuing the new Works at *Arat*, *Peterwaradin*, and some other Frontier Places in those Parts, as soon as the Season will permit. The Conferences between the Imperial and Turkish Commissioners in *Hungary* for settling the Limits, are to be renewed in the beginning of the next Month.

Francfort, April 4. The Town of *Brisac* was evacuated by the French on the 1st Instant, and General *Thungen* took Possession of it in the Emperor's Name with a Garrison of 5000 Germans. The Count *d'Arco*, to whom the Emperor has given the Government of that Place, is daily expected there from *Vienna*. They continue to work with great Diligence in repairing *Heydelberg*, the Elector Palatine intending to come thither in the Spring.

Hamburg, April 6. The Danish Forces which were quartered in the Province of *Ditmarsia*, began to march yesterday towards *Sleswick*, where they are to have their Rendezvous, and a considerable Train of Artillery is getting ready at *Rensbourg*. The discourse continues, that the King of Denmark will come to *Holstein* about the middle of this Month, to Command his Forces in Person. The Count *d'Ahlefeld* is come hither from *Copenhagen*, in his way to *Dresden*, to which place 'tis said he is sent to receive the 8000 Men which the King of *Poland* has agreed to put into the King of Denmark's Service. The Count *de Raventlau* is daily expected here from *Copenhagen*, the King of Denmark having (according to our last Advices from thence) ordered him, to return forthwith to the Emperor's Court. General *Welling* is come hither from *Dresden*, where he resided with the Character of Envoy from *Sueden*.

Hague, April 9. The States of *Holland* and *Westfriseland* adjourned yesterday till after the Holidays. The Deputies from the several Colleges of the Admiralty, who came hither to consult with the Deputies of the States-General upon several Matters, have ended their Conferences, and are returned home. The Marquis *de Bouac*, Envoy from the Most Christian King to the Princes of the House of *Luxemburg*, is on his departure to *Hanover*. The Count *de Frise* is likewise going thither with the same Character from the King of *Sueden*. We have fresh Letters from *Muscovy*, which say nothing of the Czar's sending any Troops to the Assistance of the *Saxons* before *Riga*. The Czar was gone to *Wronitz*, to give Directions for the building of divers Men of War, which he intends to send by the *Black-Sea* against the *Turks*, in case they refuse to prolong the Truce lately concluded at *Carlowitz*.

Paris, April 10. N. S. An Express arrived here yesterday, with the News of the Death of the Duke of *Barr*, Son to the Duke of *Lorraine*; And the Court are shortly to go into Mourning on this occasion. Monsieur *Chamillard*, Comptroller of the Finances, has signified to the Farmers of the King's Revenues, that the King expects a free Gift from them, according to their several Abilities, towards the discharging of the Debts he was forced to contract during the War. The Bishop of *Montpellier*, and divers other Prelates, are come hither to assist at the General Meeting of the Clergy, which is shortly to be held at *St. Germans in Laye*. The Town of *Brisac* was evacuated by the French on the first of this Month; Monsieur *de la Chatardie*, the French Governor, about 7 in the morning, delivered the Keys of the Town to General *Thungen*, and then marched out with his Garrison, and the General immediately brought in 2000 Men of the Emperor's Troops, and as many more were expected in few days. The same day the Magistrates complimented General *Thungen*, who caused the Emperor's Arms to be put over the Gates in the place of those of *France*.

Deal, April 2. The *Lucretia*, Captain *Ball* Commander, from *Jamaica*, the *Essex*, Captain *Barrington*, from *England*, and the *Hart*, Captain *Porter*, from *Alicant*, arrived in the Downs the 31st past. And yesterday came in the *Gynerous Jenny*, Capt. *Read*, from *Maryland*, and three other Merchant Ships from the *Streights*. There are in the Downs, the *Canterbury*, Captain *Kingsford* Commander, and the *Albe-*

marle, Captain *Bewee*, bound to the *East-Indies*, and divers other outward-bound Merchant Ships.
