Pendennis, April 19. His last week came in several Vessels on their return from Burdeaux, laden with Wines and bound for London, having by storm lost company of a confiderable company which came out with them; two Dutch Merchants, one from Burdeaux laden for Middlebourg, the other from Ireland bound for Rotterdam, and one English thip f.om Malaga that came out with 17 or 18 other ships, who were for some time followed by Two Turks of 50 Guns apiece, with whom bare up two Dutch men of War, who after some hours chace came up with them, and its supposed raight be able to give a good account of them.,

Algiers, April 2. About a week fince arrived here four French men of War and one Fireship, under the Command of the Count de Vivonne, who demanded restitution of feveral French thips with their lading taken by Teveral Turkish Captains of this place, but had not satisfaction answerable to his expectation: they are again put to fea, being complyed with in some small concernments, onely leaving

the peace in the same state as sormerly.

A man of War of this place, supposed formerly to have been taken by the Du ch, is lately come in here, having been desperately engaged by three Dutch ships, and twice. boarded by them, but yet had the fortune to escape them; for which valour of his, the Captain has been well reward-

ed by this Government.

Madrid, April 3. This Court is full of joy for the Kings perfect recovery from his late dangerous distemper, and for the publick satisfaction has been publickly seen in the Court by the Foreign Ministers, and abroad by the peoples taking the Air for Lis divertifement. The Council is builty confulting of the best ways of eating the people from their burthen, and putting a remedy to the expensive way of living, endeavouring to regulate the excess too generally observed and practiced in Cloaths, having it under confideration to introduce a distinction of quality by the Habit, by which means all persons shall be confined

to their proper ranks and flations.

Nine persons have been lately nominated by Her Majesty the Queen Regent, to be a Council to consider of the peoples grievances, and to enquire into the actions of tuch as have been publickly employ'd: the persons named are the Cardinal d' Aragon, the President of the Council of Ca 'ill', Don Antonio Conteras, the Count de Vilembrofa, Don Antonio Moncalva, the Prelident of the Council of the Finances, Manuel Pontonga, with the Corregidor of this City and one Regidor: against which nomination Don Juan is faid to have made some exceptions of such persons of them as lrave received great advantages from their charges, and has proposed a lesser number, wiz. the Cardinals d' Aragon and Moncade, the Count de Castriglio, with the befere-named Corregidor and Regidor. Don Juan contiffnes as yet at Guudalaxara, but 'tis faid intends to divert himself for some days at Arajuez, one of the Kings houses of pl asure upon the Tigus.

The Queen has been pleated to conferre the charge of Colo el of the new Rogiment of Guard's upon the Marquis d'Aytonas the Great Master of Her Houshold, and that of t leutenant Colonel upon Don Rodriguer de Nexica,

formerly Lieutenant General of the Horie.

From Bavaria we are advised, that the thousand Soldiers which were railed by that Elector for the affiftance of the Republick of Venice, being on their march for the fer-vice, fell into a mutiny by the ways and abeing jealous. lest the Officer who had the command of them, had not dealt well with them upon the account of their pay, after many injuries and affronts, they forced him to distribute among a them the Mongy swhich were put into his hands

for 'two Moneths pay, which was not to have been given them-till their arrival upon the Venetian Territories.

Bruffels, April 26. From Cambray, we see told, that the French Forces both of Hotle and Foot, marching frequently in little distance from that place, keeps them upon their Guard, the greatest part of those forces coming fromwards Amiens, and amongst others, the Regiment of the Marchal de Turenne.

The French fo.ces are grown very numerous of late in all the Garrifons of their late Conquests, and preparations are faid to be making at Marimons with all diligence for the Recep ion of their Most Christian Majesties, with whom is expected a Guard of no less then 2,0000 men, which gives these Country's no small jestousie of their intentions.

On The stay last we were advised that the Marquis Ade Louvey Post-Matter General of France had put a stop to the Spanish Counter, upon pretence that the French Male had been totaled passage through our Territories, but being satisfied in this particular, was in little time distributed.

On Saturday last arrived here from France Monsteur de Vantelevos the Bed-chamber to His most Christian Majesty, bringing with him a Letter from His Majesty, with an enclosed from the Queen Regem of Spain to the Constable of Castille in order to suppression of rhose Imposts charged upon Goods and Merchandises passing into or exported from any of the places of the late French Conquests; to which the Constable returned a dilatory answer, that he would appoint Commissioners to Treat with him upons that subject, but desires that in lieu of it, the King his Master will take off the Consistation of such persons as live from their Estates, which he within their power.

On Friday the Baron de Bergeich returned hith r from Lile to cake care of his private affairs, but with a to confer with the Confedble about his and the reft of the Commissioners Negotiation with the French, with whom they are not as yet (after so much time spent) come to any refolution.

From Paris we are told, that above 16000 men are entermped near Paris, all of them expert and well Trained foldiers, in readine's romarch upon the first Orders to attend His Majesty pinto the Nutherlands. We are also informed that 1000 French of the old body of the Militia liad lately passed the Rivet of Somme, with Two stout Regiments of Hosse, with other smaller troops and Companies intended as recruits Fisher about 1 foothers formerly designed for some were infew days expected to follow, and that a great Train of Artillery and other necessaries lie in readingles at Doway and Arras.

The Count de Marfin has lately received from the Queen Regent, his re-establishment in his former Charge and employment, as Camp-Master General of the Armies belonging to His Catholick Majesty in the Netherlands, with all the profits and priviledges which he formerly enjoyed.

Hague, April-27. The Swedish Ministers are in daily contenence about the conclusion of the Treaty of Garranty, for confirmation whereof, they daily expect the arrival of a Courier from Stockholms with some farther instructions.

Some Commissioners are lately dispatche hence for Muestricht to affest at the forming a Process against those p-rions that are priseners there, as having had their hands in the death of Monsieur Istersum.

The States Having some time since sent a Letter to the Queen Regent of Spain, desiring the payment of a summe of Moneys dut to the Prince of Orange from that Crown, by vertue of the peace made at Munster, the Queen has been pleased to return an answers affuring the States of the payment thereof as soon as conveniently it can be done.

The States have fately published a Decree, forbidding all persons whatfoever, Inhabitants in the united Provinces, to serve any strangers in their fishing for Herrings or Whales 3 of 10 sell or lend out to them any Vessels, or

any materials belonging thereunto, under the penalty of confication and such other punishment as they shall think fit to inflict upon them.

The rest of the Provinces have at length agreed with this of Holland for the recruit of our forces, the fitting out a Fleet for the Summer Guard, and the forming of a flying Army to be in readiness upon any occasion.

On Munday last marched in here Captain Dorps Troop of Horse, which is to continue here in Garrison in the room of the young Count de Dona's lately sent from hence to

From Swifferland we are told, that the greatest part of those Cantons have agreed to maintain their antient alliance with the Crown of France, and have received Moneys for the payment of their Pentions, resolving, not to contract any other to its prejudice; but with this reserve, that if the Crown of Spain shall happen to be invaded by France, the Spaniards shall have the liberty of raising men within their Cantons soft their desence.

By His Majesties order, several new ships are building for the encrease of his Fleet, but no Guns are sent aboard any of them but those which have been lately cast, which are observed to be of more use, and will be better preserved from Rust then any of the older.

The Drums are both here and in other Cities beating up for Voluntiers, which its given out are to serve onely as recruits for the old Regiments, which are to be kept up complete.

From Lorrain we are told of the late arrival of a Courier from Prince charles of Lorrain, affuring the Duke of the Emperous good in entions of promoting his Interest at the Election of a Successor to the Grown of Poland.

From the Khine we are told, that the Prince Adolph John having lately caused a French Tradesman, suspected to be a Bankerout, and of dishonest principles, to be Arrested within the Dutchy of Deux-Ponts; the Governour of Philipshourg having notice thereof, sent out a party of Horse, who forcibly entred the Castle to which he was committed prisoner, and delivered him; upon which information, Montieur de Vaubrun Nogent, designed Envoye to his Highness the Elector of Brandenbourg, was ordered immediately to set sowards, and on his way to endeavour to settle a right understanding between the Prince Adolph and those other persons with whom he has had disputes.

Tarmouth, April 21. Yesterday sailed hence about 20 ships bound for Sunderland and Newcastle. This day arrived a ship of this place from Gallipoli, laden with Oyls, and is now at Auchor in these Roads, where is also riding the Forrester Fregat, one ship of this Town bound for the Streights, and some Colliers.
