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Rome, April 3. N. S.

**T**HE Pope held a Consistory on the 29th past, in which he gave the Caps to the Cardinals *Coassin*, *Santa Croce*, *Delfino*, and *d'Asty*. The new Cardinals have taken several Titles, viz. Cardinal *Giudice* that of *Santa Sabina*, Cardinal *Coassin* that of *Della Trinita di Monti*, Cardinal *Santa Croce* that of *Madonna del Popolo*, Cardinal *Delfino* that of *Santa Susanna*, and Cardinal *d'Asty* that of *San Martino di Monti*. The Most Christian King has recommended the Arch-Bishop of *Paris* to the Pope for a Cardinal's Cap, which 'tis believed will be given him at the next Promotion. Monseigneur *Gualtieri*, whom the Pope has named to go his Nuncio to the Court of *France*, is dignified with the Title of Arch-Bishop of *Athens*. The Pope intends to appear in Publick on *Easter-day*, and in the beginning of the next Month will take a Journey to *Port Anzo*, to view the new Works that are made by his Orders there. The Sbirri of this City having lately arrested some Persons near the Houses of some Foreign Ministers, their Servants rescued the Prisoners, and used the Sbirri so ill, that they dare not venture at present to do the like; So that the Foreign Ministers here seem resolved to maintain the Freedom of their Quarters, a Privilege which was abolished by Pope *Innocent* the Eleventh.

*Venice*, April 9. The Count *de Berka*, Envoy from the Emperor, arrived here the 4th Instant, and has since received the Visits and Compliments of the other Foreign Ministers, and will make his Publick Entry in few days. He has Orders to treat with the Ministers here, for adjusting the Differences between the Court of *Vien*na and this Republick, concerning the Limits of their respective Territories in *Croatia* and *Dalmatia*. The Prince of *Parma* is gone from hence to *Rome*. The Bishop of *Warmia* passed lately through this City in his Journey from *Warsaw* to *Rome*. Letters from *Constantinople* of the 28th of *February* give an Account, that on the 7th of that Month the Chevalier *Soranzo*, Ambassador from this Republick, had Audience of the Grand Signior; He went to the Seraglio on Horseback, accompanied by several *Turkish* Officers, and by his own Retinue; The Grand Visier received the Ambassador in the *Divan*, placed him on the Bench near him, and afterwards entertained him at Dinner; His Excellency and his Retinue were vested with Castans, and were conducted into the Sultan's Presence with the usual Ceremonies; And the Audience being over, his Excellency returned to his own House attended in the same manner.

From the Saxon Camp before *Riga*, April 8. N. S. General *Fleming* having received Orders from the King of *Poland* to come to him at *Warsaw*, accordingly parted from hence on the 7th Instant. We continue to keep *Riga* so closely blocked up, that nothing can be brought into the Town, and we hear there begins to be a scarcity of Provisions. The *Suedish* Garrison,

who came out of the *Dinamundar* Fort, marched from hence on the 4th Instant towards *Revel*; according to their Capitulation, consisting in 280 Soldiers, and 194 other Persons with their Arms, 4 Pieces of Cannon, and a Waggon laden with Ammunition. A Courier arrived here some days ago from *Muscovy*, since which the Report revives, that the Czar is sending a Body of his Forces into the King of *Poland's* Service.

*Mittaw*, April 9. General *Fleming* passed through this Place two days ago with the Colonels *Patcoul* and *Marwitz*, going from the Saxon Camp before *Riga* to wait upon the King of *Poland* at *Warsaw*. Since the taking of the *Dinamunder* Fort, nothing of moment has passed at *Riga*. The Letters from *Nerva* give an account, that 6000 Men are arrived in that City from *Finland*, who were employed in repairing the Fortifications, and were to continue in Garrison there; And that a Body of 10000 *Finlanders* are marching to relieve *Riga*, and are to be joined by a considerable number of Forces which will be transported by Sea from *Sueden* to *Livonia*.

*Dantzick*, April 14. The Senate of this City have resolved to send Deputies to the Court of *France*. Divers Waggoners are arrived here from *Poland*, laden with Arms and Ammunition for the Saxon Forces encamped before *Riga*; And 8000 Saxons are daily expected here in their way thither. Letters from *Warsaw* of the 6th Instant say, the Meeting of the Senate is put off for some time; And that the *Polanders* seem to have no Inclination to engage in a War with *Sueden*. The King of *Poland* is gone to pass some days at *Biolau*, and the Cardinal Primate is returned to *Louitz*.

*Vienna*, April 10. The Regiment of *Styrum*, and several other Regiments, are ordered to join those said in our last to be marching from *Moravia* towards the Frontiers of *Saxony*, and 'tis said, that this Reinforcement will increase the Forces which Count *Dann* is to Command in those Parts, to the number of 15000 Men, who are to observe the Motions of the Saxons, and are to encamp near *Lausniz*. Count *Guido* of *Staremburg* President of the Council of War, and Count *Schlick*, are appointed by the Emperor to be his Commissioners to treat with the *Turkish* Ambassador, and have already begun to confer with him; And they have agreed, That all the Couriers he sends to *Constantinople*, shall be furnished by the Emperor's Officers in all the Places of the Emperor's Dominions through which they shall pass with Horses and all other Necessaries; And that the Couriers that are sent hither by Count *Oetting*, shall in like manner be provided for by the Grand Signior's Officers in their Journey through the *Turkish* Territories. The Elector and Electores Palatine are shortly expected here; And an Agent is come hither to settle some Matters of Ceremony concerning their reception at this Court. The Count of *Wells*, whom

whom the Emperor has appointed to go with the Character of his Envoy to the Court of Sweden, has received his Dispatches, and will begin his Journey in few days. They write from Peterwaradin, that there has happened a Fire at Belgrade, which consumed the greatest part of the Suburbs of that City; And that the Turkish Commander at Belgrade had sent to the Governor of Peterwaradin, to desire him to permit the Turks to buy Timber in the Dependencies of his Government to rebuild the Houses destroyed by this accident, which was granted. Letters from Constantinople of the 12th of March say, the Muscovite Ambassador had made as yet but very little Progress in his Negotiation for prolonging the Truce between the Czar his Master and the Grand Signior, and that it was believed, he would shortly return home, the Grand Signior having referred the further Treaty of this matter to his Ambassador at this Court.

**Reusburgh, April 19.** The Duke of Württemberg having taken *Federickstadt* by storm, demanded of the Town a Contribution of 4000 Dollars, which the Burgers, who might be prevailed from being plundered, readily consented to give. And Colonel *Mardewelt*, and the Garrison that were in it at *Plue* for the Duke of *Hulstein*, are sent Prisoners to *Reusburgh*. Major-General *Fuchs* marched from *Federickstadt* with a Detachment of Danish Forces on the 14th Instant, and on the 16th began to attack the *Schwabstetter Fort*, which was defended by 300 *Hessians* under the Command of Colonel *Medera* till the 16th, when they capitulated, and could obtain no other Condition, than that the Officers of the Garrison should have liberty to retire whither they pleased, and the Soldiers should be made Prisoners. Major-General *Fuchs* having taken this Fort, marched to attack General *Banner*, who is posted under the Walls of *Tönningen* with a Body of 3000 Men, but found him so strongly entrenched, that he thought fit to give over this Design, and he is now marching to attack the *Rössstetter Schans*. The King of Denmark is shortly expected here from *Copenhagen*; And in the mean time all things are getting ready for the Bombarding of *Tönningen*.

**Hawover, April 17.** The Duke of *Cell* came hither on the 11th Instant from *Cell*, and having spent some days at this Court, went to *Wexhausen* to confer with the Prince *Christian of Holstein*, who is lately arrived from Sweden. The Electors of *Brandenburgh*, who has been here some time, returned to *Berlin* the 14th Instant. The Forces of this Electorate are in a readiness to march, and are ordered to take Quarters near the *Elbe*, but it is believed, they will not pass that River before the Danes do actually attack *Tönningen*. And it is reported, that a Treaty is on foot for adjusting the Differences between the King of Denmark and the Duke of Holstein, and the Kings of Sweden and Poland; And that all Parties appear so well inclined therunto, as to give great hopes of a good Success of this Negotiation. The King of Prussia's Envoy to the Elector of Hanover has taken his Audience of Leave, and is returned to *Warsaw*.

**Frankfort, April 18.** A Courier who passed through this City going to *Brussels* reported, that Prince *Lewis of Baden* died on the 12th Instant at *Stuckeworth* in *Bohemia*. The Letters from *Cassel* say, the Landgrave and Landgravine of *Hessi-Cassel* intend to go next week to *Berlin*, to be present at the Marriage of the Prince of *Cassel* their Son with the Electoral Princess of *Brandenburgh*.

**Hamburgh, April 20.** The Letters from *Copenhagen* of the 17th Instant give an Account, that the King of Denmark was Crowned at *Fredricksburgh* on the 15th Instant with great Solemnity; And that he intends on the 22d to begin his Journey to *Holstein*. They write from *Stockholme* of the 9th, that the Swedes are fitting out their Fleet with great diligence, and have laid an Embargo on all Ships in their Ports, except those that are employed in fetching Corn from *Revel*; And that Shipping was preparing for transporting Troops to *Livonia* to relieve *Riga*; The Duke of *Holstein* is suddenly expected in these Parts from Sweden.

**Hague, April 23.** The Baron of *Lidderoot*, Ambassador from the King of Sweden, is frequently in Conference with other Foreign Ministers residing here, and his said Negotiation is carrying on by them for adjusting the Differences in the North. Mr. *Stanhope* arrived here yesterday from England with the Character of Envoy Extraordinary from His Majesty of Great-Britain to the States-General. General *Cochran* came hither some days ago, and has been several times in Conference with the Deputies of the States-General, about repairing and augmenting the Fortifications of some of their Frontier Towns.

**Paris, April 21.** N. S. Orders are sent to *Marseilles* for striking out several Gallies. By the late Edict against making use of Gold or Silver in Household Furniture or Wearing Apparel, all Persons are obliged to give an Account to the Officers established for that purpose of the quantity and quality of all

the gilt Furniture, Fringes, Galoons, and Laces they be and particularly of the weight and fineness of all them. The Duke de Nevers's Son is going to Marry a Daughter of a Marshal de Noailles.
