

from the Most Christian King, is gone from hence to Hesse-Cassel, to make a Compliment from the King his Master to that Court, upon the Marriage of the Landgrave's eldest Son to the Electoral Princess of Brandenburg. The Elector Palatine's Forces in the Palatinate have begun to march from their Quarters, in order to work on the Fortifications of Heidelberg, Mannheim, and the other Places.

Hamburg, April 30. The Ministers of the Princes who have offered their Mediation for accommodating the Differences between the King of Denmark and the Duke of Holstein, continue to employ their good Offices for this purpose. They have had several Conferences with the Danish Ministers, to whom they represented, That the King of Denmark's Forces having taken and demolished the new Forts, which were the occasion of this Rupture between him and the Duke, they could not but believe he would consent to a Cessation of Arms, that a Treaty may in the mean time be carried on for adjusting all Matters between them; of which they delivered a Project, containing among other Conditions, That the Duke may rebuild the *Holstun* Fort, and maintain 4000 Men for the Defence of his Territories. And the Danish Ministers having intimated to the Mediators, That the Duke of Holstein might prevent the Bombarding of *Tonnungen*, by sending home all the Swedes that are in his Service; the Mediators acquainted his Highness's Ministers therewith, who returned for answer, That the Duke their Master could not deprive himself of so considerable an Assistance, since it looked as if the Danes only proposed this to weaken the Garrison of *Tonnungen*, that so they might the easier make themselves Masters of that Place. Our Advice from *Holstein* say, the Danes began to bombard *Tonnungen* on the 26th Instant; But finding their Batteries were not near enough to the Fort, they spent the next day in removing them, and on the 28th they began to bombard afresh. The Belieged made a Sally on the 27th, in which they killed and wounded about 100 of the Enemy, and took some Prisoners. They write from *Hannover*, that the forces of the House of *Luttenburgh* are ordered to begin their March towards *Holstein* to morrow. The letters from *Bremen* say, the Swedes have marked out a Camp in that Duchy for an Army of 20000 Men.

Hague, May 4. The States of Holland and West-Friesland are to meet again to morrow, and Deputies are expected from the Admiralty of the *Muse* to confer with them. The *Sieur Pratorius*, Envoy from the Duke of *Caroline*, arrived here this week from *England*. The Count de *Envois*, Ambassador from *France*, will make his publick Entry in few days.

Paris, May 5. N. S. An Order made by the King on the 20th inst is now in the Press, forbidding the Importation of Stockings of the Manufacture of Foreign Countries, whether Silk or Woolen, into any other Parts of *France*, but *Calais* and *St. Valery*, where the same Duties are to be paid for the same as were laid upon them by the Tariff of the Year 1667. Which Order is to take Place on the first Day of June next ensuing. The Marquis d'Uxelles, who at present has the Chief Command of the King's Forces in *Alsace*, is arrived here from thence.

Deale, April 27. Last night came into the Downs, the *Ann*, Captain *Uphoke* Commander, bound home from the *West-Indies*; and the *Martha*, Commanded by Captain *Raynes*, came down the River, being bound to the *East-Indies*.

Whitehall, April 27. By a Ship arrived from the *East-Indies* we have received Letters, giving an Account, that Sir *William Norris*, His Majesty's Ambassador to the *Great Mogul*, with 4 English Men of War, commanded by Capt. *Warren*, arrived the 20th of September at *Metzlepattam*, on the Coast of *Coromandel*, and that great Provision was made by the Governor in Chief of that Province (under the *Great Mogul*) for his Reception, with all imaginable Demonstrations of Friendship and Respect.
