Rome, April 17. N. S.

THE Pope intended on the 11th Instant, being *Easter* day, to have appeared in Publick for the first time since his Illness, but the Weather proving cold and rainy, he was prevailed with to put it off till this day; Accordingly a Solemn Mass was sung this morning in the Chappel of the *Quirinal* by Cardinal *Norri*, after which the Pope was brought in an open Chair from his Chamber to a Gallery, from whence he twice gave his Blessing to the People, and at the same time a Discharge was made of the Cannon of the Castle of *St. Angelo*. The Pope has not yet recovered his Strength, nor could he long endure the open Air; He continues however his Resolution of going to *Nezuno*, and intends to be carried thither in a Chair upon Men's Shoulders. Cardinal *Cantelmi* seems at present to have the First Place in the Pope's Favour, and is very frequently in private with him. Prince *Anthony* of *Parma* arrived here the 10th Instant from *Venice*, and had Audience of the Pope on the 12th. The Count *de Lamberg*, Ambassador from the Emperor, having received an Express from *Vienna*, had Audience of the Pope on the 14th, and 'tis said acquainted him, that the Emperor does accept of *Monsieur Davia*, who at present is Nuncio in *Poland*, to reside with the same Character at the Imperial Court. 'Tis said, that by this Express, Orders are come to the Count *de Martinitz* forthwith to return home, without insisting to have an Audience of Leave of the Pope. The Bishop of *Warmia* is lately arrived here from *Warsaw*, and has had a Private Audience of the Pope, but the Errand he is sent upon is yet a Secret. Cardinal *Caslin* has begun to pay the usual Visit to the College of Cardinals, and has a very magnificent Train; The other Cardinals lately come hither from *France*, are preparing their Equipages in order to appear likewise in Publick. Great Application is made to the Pope by the Cardinals of his Creating, to obtain a Cardinal's Cap for Signior *Pignatelli*, his Kinsman, whom they intend to make the Head of their Party; which is strongly opposed by the *French* Cardinals, because he is not in their Interest. Signior *Casini*, Son to the Prince of *Belvedere*, is made Vice-Legate of *Urbini*.

Mitaw, April 23. The Detachment that was lately sent from the *Saxon* Camp before *Riga*, to oppose the Succours which are said to be marching from *Finland* to the Relief of that Place, continue intrenched on the other side the River *Dzina*; The *Saxons* keep the Town very closely blocked up, however the Country People find Means to supply it from time to time with Provisions, though not without great Hazard and Difficulty. The *Saxons* have not of late made any Attack against the Place, nor is it thought they will attempt any thing further before the return of *Monsieur Fleming*, their General, who is still at *Warsaw*.

Warsaw, April 23. The King of *Poland* has caused Letters to be sent to the Senators, who are out of Town, to hasten their coming hither, in order to consult with them about the Affairs of *Liesland*. An Envoy is lately arrived here from the Czar of *Muscovy*, and had Audience of the King last week. He has made Proposals for the Establishing of a Post from hence to *Moscow*, and other Parts of the Czar's Dominions. *Monsieur Duteron*, Envoy from the most Christian King, is arrived here from *Hanover*, and will have Audience of the King in few days. Major-General *Tramp* is lately come from *Copenhagen*, and has frequent Conferences with the Ministers of this Court, and 'tis said, they are treating of renewing the Alliance made between the Crowns of *Denmark* and *Poland* in the Year 1658. General *Fleming* is still here; It's reported, that before he left the Camp at *Riga*, he proposed to the Magistrates of that Place, That if they would Surrender to the King of *Poland*, their City should make a part of the Republick of *Poland*, and enjoy the same Privileges as the City of *Dantzick*; That the Garrison should be at their own Disposal, and Independent from the King or the Republick; That as to Matters of Religion, all things should continue in the Condition they are at present; And that they should be eased in the Taxes they used to pay to the Crown of *Sweden*; But these Proposals were rejected by the *Swedes*.

Vienna, April 24. The Imperial Court went yesterday to *Laxenberg*, to take the Diversion of Hunting. The Imperial Troops in *Bohemia*, are drawing together, under the Command of Count *Daun*, as are likewise those in *Silesia*, which will be commanded by Major-General *Hafeling*, and they are all to encamp during this Summer on the Borders of *Saxony*. Applications have been made to the Emperor, to desire he will permit some Recruits to be raised in the Hereditary Countries for the Service of the King of *Poland*, but he has refused it. A Resident is arrived here from *Warsaw*, but as yet keeps incognito. The Count *de Wells*, Envoy Extraordinary from the Emperor to the King of *Sweden*, is on his departure from hence to *Stockholme*. Letters from *Constantinople* of the 6th Instant say, the Imperial Ambassador continued his Conference with the Ministers at the Port, for adjusting all Matters concerning the Limits between the *German* and *Turkish* Dominions; That a Dispute was risen between the *Turks* and the *Venetians*, about settling their Limits; The *Turks* would have the Boundaries between *Bosnia* and *Ragusa* adjusted, and the Towns of *Popovo* and *Cattaro* evacuated by the *Venetians*, before they go on to settle the Limits near *Castelnewo* and *Risano*; And the

Venetians on the other side would begin with settling the Boundaries near *Cattaro*, *Castelnovo*, and *Risano*. The Czar of *Muscovy's* Envoy was still treating with the Port in order to prolong the Truce, or make a Peace between the *Muscovites* and the *Turks*, but had as yet made little Progress in his Negotiation. The Great Ambassador of *Poland* was arrived at *Silivrea* in his way to *Constantinople*, being attended by a Train of about 700 Persons.

From the Danish Camp before *Tonningen*, May 3. We continue to Bombard the Town of *Tonningen*, notwithstanding we have, ever since our coming before this Place, laboured under the Inconveniencies of a very bad and rainy Season. Our Bombs have ruined several Houses in the Town, but they have not yet set fire to any of their Magazines, by reason of the great Care which the Besieged have taken, to place them in Vaults under ground. They still ply us very warmly with their Cannon, and this night a Cannon Bullet fell into the Duke of *Wurtemberg's* Tent, but did no Mischief. Major-General *Harboe* is gone from hence to *Reimborg*, to fetch a farther Supply of Bombs and Ammunition.

Dresden, April 30. Eight Regiments of the King of *Poland's* Forces quartered in *Saxony*, have Orders to be in a readiness to march to *Livonia*. The Queen of *Poland* went from hence this week to use the Baths at *Emb*.

Berlin, May 1. The Ceremony of the Marriage between the Prince of *Hesse-Cassel* and the Electoral Princess of *Brandenburg*, is put off till the 6th of the next Month. The Elector of *Brandenburg* went this day from *Oranienbourg* to *Potsdam*, where he is to have an Interview with the Dukes of *Saxe-Gotha*.

Hamburg, May 4. Lieutenant-General *Welling*, who lately resided at *Dresden* as Envoy from the King of *Sweden*, went from hence this day to *Stockholm*. The Danes continue to Bombard *Tonningen*, but their Bombs have not yet had any great effect. They write from *Bremen*, that a Camp is marked out on the Borders of that Dutchy, between *Baxscheide* and *Hornburg*, for the Troops which the King of *Sweden* and the Princes of the House of *Lunenburg* are sending to the Assistance of the Duke of *Holstein*. The King of *Denmark's* Officers oblige the Receivers of the Duke of *Holstein's* Revenues to pay to them what Money they have in their hands, and turn out of their Employments those who refuse to comply with these Orders.

Hague, May 7. A Body of 8000 Men of the Forces of this State are shortly to draw together on the Borders of *Overysse*, to join the Forces of *Lunenburg*, if the State of Affairs in *Holstein* do require it. The Squadron of Dutch Men of War, ordered to be fitted out for this Summer's Service, will put to Sea about the latter end of this Month. The Sicur *Pretorius*, Envoy from the Duke of *Courland*, is lately arrived here from *England*. The States of *Holland* and *Westfriesland* continue assembled. The Deputies of the Admiralty of the *Mase*, who came hither to confer with them, are returned to *Rotterdam*.

Paris, May 8. N. S. The King returns this day from *Mary* to *Versailles*. The Count de la *Mark* is going to marry the Duke of *Rohan's* eldest Daughter. The Count de *Cosse*, now Duke de *Brisack*, took his Place in the Parliament of *Paris* two days ago, as Duke and Peer of *France*, at which Ceremony were present, several of the Princes of the Blood, and divers other Persons of Principal Quality.

The Pope has given Power to the Order of *Malta*, to apply a Third Part of their Revenues in *France* and elsewhere, to repair their Gallies, and build new ones in the room of those they have lost. They write from *France*, that the Negotiation for settling the Pretensions of the Dutchets of *Orleans* on the *Patinate*, is continued there with good Success, and that they have now more hopes than ever of adjusting that Matter.

Plymouth, April 28. His Majesty's Ship the *Adventure* arrived here the 25th Instant from the *Strait*, having on board Captain *Delorval*, who has lately concluded a Treaty with the King of *Morocco* for the redemption of the English Captives in *Barbary*, together with two *Moor*s, whom the said King has sent to *England*.

Deal, April 29. The *Neptune*, Capt. *Lesley* Commander, arrived here yesterday from the *East Indies*, in the *George*, Capt. *Peacock*, from the *Strait*.
