Lisbon, April 6. N. S.

Advice being come, that the Moors, after a year's Siege, have taken *Mombaca*, a Fort belonging to the Portuguese, on the Coast of *Africa*, and that 'twas feared they would go and besiege *Mozambic*, the Fortifications of which Place are very much out of repair, three Men of War are sent thither with Supplies of Men, Money, and Ammunition.

Madrid, April 22. The Court is now at the *Escorial*, and will remove from thence the next week to *Aranjuez*. The *Sieur Garpegni*, Envoy from the Elector of *Triers*, had Audience of Leave of the King and Queen yesterday, and intends in few days to return to *Germany*. The Duke of *Meis*, Ambassador from this Crown to the Emperor, has also taken his Leave of the King, and intends very soon to begin his Journey to *Picenna*. The *Marquis de Harcourt*, Ambassador from *France*, will set out from hence in 8 or 10 days, and return to *Paris*. They write from *Cadiz*, that they continue with great diligence to fit out the Men of War, which are to sail from thence with Supplies of Men and Ammunition to the *West-Indies*; And that Orders are given for equipping the Galeons, which may begin their Voyage thither in *September* next.

Mittau, April 26. The *Saxon* Forces before *Riga* have removed their Camp to the other side of the *River Dwina*, leaving only a small Detachment on this side, and they have cast up several Works for the better defence of their Camp against the *Suedish* Succours that are coming to the Relief of the Town; which in the mean time is so closely blocked up, that the *Livonians* cannot supply the Inhabitants with any Provisions. A Party of 300 Horse are sent from the Camp, to put the neighbouring Country under Contribution, and to get Intelligence concerning the March of the Succours before-mentioned, who are said to have passed by *Nerva* the 19th Instant, consisting in the Regiments of Horse of *Ferfen*, *Rebinder*, *Horne*, *Macdell*, *Ammer*, and *Budberg*; and the Regiments of Foot of *Welling*, *Ferfen*, *Fink*, *Rusler*, *Schlippenbag*, and *Cloth*, with whom are joined 3000 *Finlanders*.

Warsaw, April 26. The Cardinal Primate and the Crown General are expected here from the Country the next week, as are likewise the rest of the Senators that are out of Town, so that 'tis thought the Senate may assemble in the beginning of the next Month; and then 'will be resolved, Whether the Republick of *Poland* shall engage in the War with *Sweden*, which the *Polanders* do generally seem to have little inclination to. The Negotiations are continued between the King of *Poland's* Ministers and the *Danish* Envoy, for the making of a stricter Alliance between the two Crowns. The *Sieur Beuchling*, Councillor of State, is arrived here from *Dresden*, with a considerable Sum of Money to pay the *Saxon* Forces in this Kingdom.

Copenhagen, May 4. The Squadron of Men of War lately fitted out in this Port have taken in all their Provisions, and have their Complement of Men, so that they are in a readiness to put to Sea upon the first Orders they shall receive. The King's Journey to *Holstein* is again put off; And there is great likelihood, that the Negotiations at *Hamburg* for accommodating the Affairs of *Holstein*, will be very soon renewed; and carried on with better Success than formerly. The Count de *Chamilly*, Ambassador from *France*, went thither this week to be present at the Treaty.

Stockholm, April 24. The King of *Sweden* and the Duke of *Holstein* are gone to *Carelsroon*, to view the

Fleet which is fitting out there, and will be ready to put to Sea in few days. A Body of 8000 Men, who were quartered in the Neighbourhood of this Place, are marching to *Carelsroon*, to be there embarked, and sent to *Livonia*. The Count de *Dhona*, Envoy from the Elector of *Brandenburgh*, has had Audience of Leave of the King, and is returning home. The King has made the *Sieur Ackerhielm* his Secretary of State, and a Commissioner of the Chancery.

From the Danish Camp before *Tonningen*, May 6. After having in six days time fired above 5000 Bombs into the Town, we began on the 3d Instant to cease Bombarding it, and have since only made now and then a discharge from our Batteries, to harrass the Forces within the Place, by keeping them continually allarmed. Our Bombs have ruined the greatest part of the Town, but we do not hear that they have killed or wounded above 7 or 8 of the Soldiers or Inhabitants. Part of the Garrison was employed to put out the Fire of such Bombs as they could come at, before the Fuzees were quite burnt out, by throwing wet Ox-Hides upon them. We expect a considerable Supply of Ammunition from *Geluckstadt*, and then 'tis said we shall either Bombard afresh, or formally besiege the Place. But we hear, some Overtures have been made of a Negotiation at *Hamburg*, for adjusting Matters between the King of *Denmark* and the Duke of *Holstein*, which may probably put a stop to all further Military Proceedings on this side.

Frankfort, May 6. The Queen of *Poland* having left *Bareith*, where she had continued some days, arrived yesterday at *Wertheim*. She was Complimented in the name of the Elector of *Triers*, by the Baron of *Schomborne* his Brother, who is to conduct her in her Passage through His Electoral Highness's Territories; and she is expected here this Evening. The Magistrates of this Place intended her a Reception suitable to her Quality, but she excused it, intending to be *incognito*. The Landgrave and Landgravine of *Hesse-Dramstadt* are hourly expected here, and design to accompany her to *Eubs*, at which Place she will spend part of the Summer to use the Waters. The Bishop of *Munster*, *Paderborne*, *Hildesheim*, and *Osnabrug*, have given Orders for recruiting their Forces, and for filling their Magazines with Ammunition, which is thought necessary on account of the present State of Affairs in the North.

Hamburg, May 7. The Negotiation for adjusting the Differences between the King of *Denmark* and the Duke of *Holstein*, is continued with great application. The Mediators had lately a Conference with the *Danish* Ministers, in which they represented to them, That the King of *Denmark's* Forces having taken and demolished the Duke's new Forts, they did not question but he would now consent, that the Treaty for accommodating these Matters should be renewed, and they declared, That if the King of *Denmark* continued in his design to take *Tonningen*, and thereby make himself Master of all the Duchy of *Holstein*, the Princes and States their Masters would

be obliged to assist his Highness. The Danish Ministers thereupon ask'd, Whether in case the King their Master should comply with this desire, and enter upon a Treaty, the Duke would do the like; and it being answered, He would, they immediately sent away an Express with an account thereof to Copenhagen, upon the return of which, 'tis hoped the Conferences for that purpose will be again set on foot. The Count of Guldenlow is come from Copenhagen to Primmberg, having resolved to retire from Publick Business, and to spend the residue of his Life in that Place.

Hague, May 11. The French Ambassador has had several Conferences with the Pensioner, and some other publick Ministers here, concerning the present Posture of Affairs in the North, and has acquainted them, that the King his Master will employ the Offices of his Mediation for composing these Differences. The Burghers of this place, on the occasion of the yearly Fair here, appeared yesterday according to Custom in Arms, and marched through the principal Streets of the Town, and saluted the Magistrates and Foreign Ministers as they passed by their several Houses: They first passed by the House of the French Ambassador and saluted him, being at one of his Windows; whereupon the Ambassadors of Sweden and Muscovy caused their Doors and Windows to be shut up, and the Burghers passed by without saluting them. Being come to the House of Mr. Stanhope, Envoy Extraordinary from His Majesty of Great-Britain, they saluted him with particular Marks of Respect, and the Envoy presented them with 4 Pieces of Wine, and gave a very handsome Entertainment to their Officers. The Prince of Hesse-Cassel is lately arrived here from England. There are Advices from Constantinople, which say, the Envoy of Muscovy is returned home, without having concluded any thing as to making a Peace, or a longer Truce, between the Czar his Master and the Port.

Paris, May 12. The King being very much displeas'd at the late Conduct of the Cardinal de Bouillon at Rome, has sent him Orders forthwith to return to France, and to continue in his Abbey of Feurnus, near Lyons, till farther order; The Abbe de Vaubrun, his particular Friend and Correspondent here, has likewise received the King's Commands to repair to Sarrau, a House belonging to his Grandfather in the Province of Anjou, and not to remove from thence. A Lottery is making here, of Ten Millions of Livers, consisting in 400000 Tickets, to be delivered out at two Lewis d'Or's each. This Money is to be sunk, and the Prizes are to be certain Annuities for Life, to be paid by the Town-house of Paris. Some days ago Monsieur de Boufflers, a Relation of the Marshal de Boufflers, killed the Marquis d'Oxembry, only Son to Monsieur Brcmar, President of the Parliament of Paris, for which he is fled.

Plymouth, April 30. Yesterday put into this Port, the Hopewell of London, Josias Dursford Master, bound to Hamburg; the Oporto Frigate, William Rowland Master, for Oporto; and the Two Brothers, Thomas Montgomery Master, and the Robert and John, John South Master, both of London, and bound home from Legkerne.
