**T**HE Pope recovers his Strength every day, and continues his Resolution of going shortly to see the new Works that are made at Pott Anzo. When he gave Audience to Prince Anthony of Parma, he allowed him to sit on a Stool; Whereupon the Count de Lemos, General of the Gallies of Naples, as Grandee of Spain pretends the same Honour, and because it was not granted, is returned to Naples without taking Leave of the Pope. The three Princes, Sons to the late King of Poland, do also make the like Claim, and for that reason have not yet seen the Pope. They are gone from hence to see the City of Naples, as is likewise the Prince of Parma, Count Martiniz, Ambassador from the Emperor, is preparing to return to Vienna, without taking his Audience of Leave of the Pope, who could not be prevailed with to grant it, notwithstanding great Application has been made to him for that purpose. The Emperor has signified to the Pope, that he approves of Signior Davia, who at present is Nuncio in Poland, to reside with the same Character at the Imperial Court. Signior Pignatelli, who succeeds him at the Court of Poland, and Signior Aquariva, who goes Nuncio to Spain, have taken their Leave of the Pope, and are on their departure. Signior Cavaccio'i is appointed to go in the like Quality to the Court of Florence. The Emperor has recommended the Bishop of Passau to the Pope, in order to his being made a Cardinal at the next Promotion; The Arch-Bishop of Paris has the like Recommendation from France, the Abbot of Darnstadt from Spain, and the Prince of Sax-Zeitz, Bishop of Rast, from Poland.

Venice, April 30. The Prince of Lubomirsky, who has been at the Court of Savoy with the Character of Envoy from Poland, and came lately to this Place with a design to go to Rome, received an Express this week with Orders forthwith to return to Warsaw, and is accordingly gone thither. Signior Gabriello Zorzi, whom the Senate have named to be their Ambassador at Vienna in the room of Signior Loredano, has not yet accepted of that Employment. On the 19th Instant the Fishermen of this City met, according to Custom, in the Church of St. Nicholas, to choose an ancient Officer called *Doga* of the *Nicholaiti*; But there arose such a Contention among them, that they came to Blows, and divers were wounded; At last they made their Choice, and on the 27th Instant the same was confirmed by the Doge and Senate in the usual manner. This Officer was formerly in great Esteem, and sits in the Senate at the Doge's right hand; but he long since lost his Place in the Senate, and most of his other Privileges.

Mitsaw, May 1. We have an Account, that Colonel *Grisaff*, who at present Commands the Saxons encamped before *Riga*, has received certain Advice, that the Forces which are sent from Fin-

land to relieve the Town, are making the best of their way thither, and are to be joined in their March by some Forces which are to come by Sea from Sweden, so that these Succours will be much stronger than was at first reported; and that he has sent an Express to Warsaw, to give Advice thereof, and to hasten the March of the Reinforcements from Poland and Saxony; And in the mean time the Saxons are doing all they can to fortifie their Camp. On the 26th Instant, at night, about 400 of the Garrison of *Riga* went out in Boats, and attempted to destroy the Bridge which the Saxons have built over the *Dwina*, about half a mile from the Town, but they were timely discovered, and the Troops which guard the said Bridge firing upon them, obliged them to retire, with the loss of divers of their Men.

Warsaw, April 29. The Cardinal Primate arrived here the 25th Instant from *Lowitz*; he was the next day a long time in Private with the King of Poland, and has had several Conferences, with General *Fleming*, and with the Weywode of *Mariembourg*, who endeavoured to obtain a Promise from him, that he would use his Interest with the rest of the Senators, to dispose them to assist the King in making War against Sweden, but 'tis said, the Cardinal has declared he will not concern himself on either side till the Senate meets, and that he will then deliver his Opinion as he shall think to be most for the good of the Republick. The Crown General, and the other Senators that are out of Town, are daily expected. They write from *Lithuania*, that the Quarrels between the Houses of *Sapieha* and *Oginsky* are increased to that height, that they are raising Men, and 'tis feared they will come again to Hostilities.

Stockholme, May 1. The Dutches of *Holstein-Gottorp*, Sister to the King of Sweden, was delivered on the 29th past of a Prince, who was Christened the same day by the name of *Charles-Frederick*. The King and the Duke of *Holstein* are still at *Carelsroone*, where the Swedish Fleet is fitting out with all possible diligence.

Copenhagen, May 8. The Duke of *Wurtemberg*, having sent an Express hither, to acquaint the King, that he had Bombarded *Tonningen*, but not having the Effect he expected, he desired his further Directions, whether he should formally attack the Town; This Courier was immediately sent back with Orders to the Duke, to use all possible Means to make himself Master of that Place. The Danish Fleet is in a readiness to put to Sea, and has on Board 4000 Land-Forces. The Admiral has received his Instructions, but they are sealed up, which he is not to open till he comes off the Isle of *Bornholme*; But 'tis reported, that the main Fleet is to continue near that Island, to observe the Swedish Fleet; And that a Squadron, composed of the lightest Ships, will be sent to cruise on the Coast of *Livonia*, to hinder the Swedes from sending any Succour thither by Sea. A Merchant Ship is come in here from *Coningsberg*, the Master whereof reports, that in his Passage hither he met with several Transport-Ships, having on board 3000 Swedes, who

who are to join the Troops from Finland, designed for the Relief of Riga. The Margrave of Baden-Durlach is lately arrived here from Sweden. Our Letters from thence say, their Fleet, which is fitting out at Carelsbroock, is in great forwardness, and will put to Sea in few days.

*Vienna, May 1.* Several Imperial Regiments are marching to Bohemia and Silesia, and 'tis said, Prince Eugene of Savoy is going thither to Command them, and will have under him Count Guico of Staremberg. The Bishop of Raab is arrived here from Warsaw, and has given the Emperor an Account of his Negotiation; The Count de Straatman, who was Plenipotentiary from the Emperor at the Treaty of Ryswick, is appointed to go to Poland in the room of Count Zedelinsky, the Emperor's Envoy at that Court, who is returning home.

*Francfort, May 9.* The Queen of Poland arrived here the 6th Instant *incognito* from Wertheim; She intends to morrow to continue her Journey to Embz, and will be attended by the Elector of Metz's Servants as far as Lobenstein. His Electoral Highness is expected in few days at Mentz from Bamberg.

*Hamburg, May 11.* The Danish Forces before Tonningen are employed in raising new Batteries, intending as soon as the Supplies of Artillery and Ammunition, which they expect from Geluckstadt, are arrived, to batter the Place, in order to make a Breach, and to attempt the Town by Storm. The Garrison desired of the Duke of Wirtemberg, That their Boats might be permitted to go for Beer to Frederickstadt, but he refused it. Orders are given, for adding 10 Men to each Troop of Horse and Dragons of the King of Denmark's Forces in Holstein. The Duke of Hanover has been at Stoltzenau, to review some Regiments of Horse encamped near that Place, and these Troops, with the rest of the Forces which the Princes of the House of Lunenbourg are sending to the Assistance of the Duke of Holstein, will very soon begin their march to their General Rendezvous.

*Hague, May 14.* The Forces of this State, which are to join with those of the House of Lunenbourg, being 3 Regiments of Horse and 6 of Foot, are marching to the Frontiers of Overysse, and are to be quartered in that Province, that they may be at hand to march towards the Country of Holstein; if there be occasion. Orders are given, to hasten the fitting out of the Dutch Squadron for this Summer's Service.

*Paris, May 15.* N. S. Monsieur de Ponchartrain, Chancellor of France, took the Oaths on the 9th Instant as Commander and Secretary of the Order of the Holy-Ghost. The next day the Marquis de la Vrilliere was sworn into his Office of Secretary of State. Yesterday the Bishop of Paris held here an Assembly of the Clergy of his Province, to choose Deputies for the General Assembly of the Clergy of this Kingdom, which is to meet the 25th Instant, and the Bishop of Meaux, and the Abbé Bossuet his Nephew, were elected. The States-General of the Dutchy of Burgundy are to meet at Dyon on the 22d Instant, and the Prince of Conde is gone thither upon this occasion. They write from Rome, that the Cardinal de Bouillon is preparing to return to France, in pursuance of the Orders he has received from Court, and that he has obtained a Bull from the Pope, by virtue of which he may be chosen Dean of the College of Cardinals when ever that Place becomes vacant, altho' he be not then resident at Rome.

Plimouth, May 5. On the 1st Instant arrived here, the *Ant* Galley of London, Edmund Creamor Master, bound home from Malaga; and the Elizabeth of London, Jacob Palfon Commander, from Faro. The Martha of London, Abraham Lawrence Master, came in on the 2d from Leghorne; and this day the John and Ellen of London, John Moor Master, from Malaga, but last from Falmouth, put into this Port, being bound to Dantzick.

*Dantzick, May 7.* His Majesty's Ship the *Falmouth* arrived here the 5th Instant from Jamaica. There are at present in the *Downes*, the *Martha*, Captain Raines Commander, bound to the *East-Indies*, and several other outward-bound Merchant Ships.
