OUR Advices from *Livonia* say, 15000 Swedes are coming from *Finland* to relieve *Riga*; The *Saxons* frequently send out Parties to get Intelligence of them, and give out, That their Number is not above 8000; That they have suffered very much in so long a March; And that they are still a great way off. The *Saxons* have not of late made any attempt against the Town, expecting Reinforcements from *Poland* and *Saxony*. The Garrison on the other hand are in expectation of being timely assisted by the before-mentioned Troops from *Finland*, and others that are coming from *Sweden*; They have lately sent out Boats Manned with Soldiers, to attempt the burning of the Bridge of Boats which the *Saxons* have made upon the *Dwina*, but have not yet been able to effect it, but they have taken several Boats laden with 400 Lafts of Corn, which the *Saxons* were sending to the *Dunamunder Fort*; The *Saxons* are likewise fitting out several Boats, and will put Soldiers in them, to give Chase to the small Vessels of *Riga*.

Stockholme, May 4. The King of *Sweden* and the Duke of *Holslein* are still at *Carelsroome*, to hasten the fitting out of the Fleet, which will be ready to sail in few days. The Regiments of Horse and Foot Guards, (the latter consisting in 2000 Effective Men) which were quartered in this Place, are marched to *Carelsroome*, and 'tis thought will be sent by Sea to *Livonia*. A great number of Seamen are sent from hence to serve in the Fleet.

Vienna, May 5. The Departure of the Imperial Court to *Luxembourg*, is again put off till the 10th Instant. The Count de *Wells*, Envoy Extraordinary from the Emperor to the King of *Sweden*, parted from hence yesterday for *Stockholm*, and the Count de *Straatman* will be going in a day or two in the like Quality to *Poland*; They have Orders to use their best Endeavours to accommodate Matters between these two Crowns, in which 'tis hoped they will have the better Success, because, according to our Advices from *Warsaw*, the Cardinal Primate, and the greatest part of the Senators, have no Inclination to join with the King of *Poland* in the War against *Sweden*. Orders are given for Recruiting all the Emperor's Forces, and for Remounting his Cavalry. The Imperial Regiments which are sent to the Borders of *Bohemia*, to observe the King of *Poland's* Troops in *Saxony*, are ordered to draw together, and it's said, that Prince *Eugene* of *Savoy* will Command them. The *Turkish* Ambassador continues his Conferences with the Emperor's Ministers; He has proposed, That the Matters in Dispute between the *Germans* and the *Turks*, concerning the Town of *Novi* and its Dependencies, may be laid aside till all the other Limits are settled, and that they should be then examined anew by the Commissioners; but the Emperor's Ministers are desirous this

Matter may be adjusted here in the first place. The Counts of *Geigersberg* and *Goldstein* were sworn this week of the Emperor's Council. Orders are given for repairing the Fortifications of *Brisac*, and a Regiment of Horse is ordered to march thither to reinforce the Garrison.

From the Danish Camp before Tonningen, May 11. We continue to keep the Town of *Tonningen* very closely blocked up, and in all probability shall lay a formal Siege to it as soon as we have received the Supplies of Cannon and Artillery we expect from *Geluckstad*. Yesterday about 6 in the morning, the Duke of *Wirtemberg* sent from our Camp a Detachment of five Companies of *Granadiers*, and several other Companies of Foot, making in all about 1000 Men, to attack an Outwork which the *Holsleiners* had cast up before the Western Gate of the Town. They marched thither accordingly along the Banks of the River *Eyder*, and in a short time forced the Enemy from their Retrenchment, who retired into the Town. And our Men immediately demolished this Work, and returned to the Camp, having in this Action only two Men killed, and an Officer and eight Soldiers wounded. General *Baumier* sent a Message lately to the Duke of *Wirtemberg*, desiring Liberty for the Boats belonging to the Town to go and fetch Beer at *Frederickstad*; but it was refused.

Frankfort, May 12. The Queen of *Poland* went from hence yesterday by water to *Embs*, being accompanied by the Dutchess of *Wolfembutel*, the Prince of *Ortingen*, and several other Persons of Quality. As the Queen passed by the City of *Mentz*, she was saluted by a Discharge of the Cannon of that Place, and Complimented by the Chapter, who designed her a very noble Entertainment, but she excused it. The Prince of *East-Frisland* is daily expected here, and will spend part of the Summer at *Svalbach*. The Elector Palatine's Forces quartered in the Palatinate are assembling about *Manheim*, to work on the Fortifications of that Place, which they intend to finish this Summer; His Electoral Highness is shortly expected here in his way to *Vienna*.

Cologne, May 11. The Elector of *Cologne* is still at *Breul*. 'Tis said, he has given Orders for buying up Horses to recruit his Cavalry, and that he intends to raise some new Regiments of Foot. The Bishop of *Munster* has begun his new Levies, and has given Orders for filling his Magazines with Ammunition. The Prince of *Lorraine*, Bishop of *Osnabrug*, is daily expected here from *Dusseldorp*. The Baron *Saffigh*, Great Marshal to the Elector of *Triers*, who has been some time at the *Hague*, came lately to *Dusseldorp*, where he had several Conferences with the Elector Palatine; from thence he passed through *Breul*, where he conferred with the Elector of *Cologne*, and he is since returned home.

Hamburg, May 14. There has passed nothing considerable at *Tonningen* for these last 3 or 4 days, except the taking of one of the Outworks of that Place by the *Danish*, who expect the Artillery and Ammunition which the Duke of *Wirtemberg* has sent for from *Geluckstad*, before they attempt anything further. Our Letters from thence say, General

Banner, who Commands in the Town for the Duke of *Holslein*, called the Burghers together, and Exhorted them to continue faithful to his Highness, promising, That all the Losses they had or should sustain by the Siege and Bombarding, shall be made good to them, and that their Loyalty shall moreover be abundantly Rewarded; to which they returned an Assurance, That they will on all Occasions join with the Garrison in their Common Defence, and will expect the very last Extremity before they think of Surrendring. Thirty Waggon are hired here for the King of *Sweden*, which 'tis said are to be employed in bringing Ammunition from *Pomeran*. Our Letters from *Dresden* say, the Forces designed to be sent from *Saxony* to *Livonia*, are marching to *Guben*, in the Territory of *Launitz*, which Place is appointed to be their General Rendezvous, and that they are to continue there till farther Order.

Brussels, May 17. The Magistrates and Burghers of this City waited upon the Elector of *Bavaria* on the 14th Instant, and acquainted him, That they have consented to pay their Quota of the Subsidy of 120000 Florins, granted some time ago to the King of *Spain* by the Province of *Brabant*. Deputies are come hither from the States of *Hainault*, to acquaint his Electoral Highness, that the said States have consented to give the King a Subsidy of 200000 Florins. The Marquis de *Bedmar*, and the Prince of *Israel*, are gone to *Ostend*, to give Directions for repairing the Ports and Fortifications of that place. The Count de *Waxham*, Governour of *Courtray*, died some days ago, and the Elector of *Bavaria* has given the Government to the Baron of *Courieres*, Colonel of Foot, whose Regiment is given to *Montieur Caetano*. They write from *Munich*, that the Count de *Tilly* is gone from thence to *Cell*, being appointed by the Duke of *Cell* to have the Chief Command of his Cavalry.

Hague, May 18. Admiral *Alemond* is expected here next week, to take his Leave of the States-General before he goes to Sea. The Squadron he is to Command consists in 12 Capital Ships, besides Fireships and other smaller Vessels; and on board the same are two Regiments of Marines, and several Companies drawn out of other Regiments, making in all about 4000 Men. The Land Forces which the States are sending to assist the Duke of *Holslein*, continue their March to the Frontiers of the Province of *Overyssel*, where they are to continue till farther order. The States-General have caused a Placet to be published, for laying a Duty of one *Stiver* per Pound on all Foreign Syrups imported for one Year, to commence on the first of *June* next.

Paris, May 19. N.S. The Court removes to morrow to *Mevly*, where the King intends to continue 8 or 10 days. An Order is lately published, commanding all Persons that have been concerned with the Farmers and Collectors of the King's Revenues, to produce their Receipts to the Intendants, and the Commissioners, appointed for that purpose in the several Provinces of the Kingdom; which is done, the better to discover the Advantages which the said Farmers and Collectors have made of the King's Money, in order to lay a Tax upon them. Letters from *Briss* of the 10th Instant say, *Montieur Pointy* failed from thence that day with the Squadron of Men of War under his Command. We have Advice from *Thoulon* of the 2d Instant, that *Montieur de Chateauf*, is an Ambassador from this Crown to the Grand Signior, arrived there the day before from *Constantinople*. Here is a Report, that the Powder in the Magazine at *Thoulon* has accidentally taken fire, and blown up the said Magazine, and done a great deal of Mischief to the Town, of which we expect to hear further by the next Letters from thence.

Bristol, May 7. The Mary Ann of this place came in here yesterday from *Leghorne*, and this day arrived the *St. Peter* from *St. Sebastians*.

Deale, May 9. The Smyrna Merchant, Capt. Jackson Commander, from *Smyrna*; the *Martha*, Capt. Lawrence, from *Leghorne*; the *John* and *Ann*, Capt. Backwell, from *Virginia*; and the *Barbara*, Capt. Meyers, from *Barbadoes*, arrived yesterday in the Downs.

Hampton-Court, May 7. This day the Chevalier *Giraldi*, Envoy Extraordinary from the Great Duke of *Tuscany*, had publick Audience of the King, being conducted in His Majesty's Coach by *Sir Charles Cottrell*, Master of the Ceremonies.

Whitehall, May 10. The Chevalier *Giraldi*, Envoy Extraordinary from the Great Duke of *Tuscany*, had Audience this day of their Royal Highnesses the Princess and Prince of *Denmark*, and of his Highness the Duke of *Gloucester*, being conducted by *Sir Charles Cottrell*, Master of the Ceremonies.
